

RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



At the end of this month (the evening of February 25th), with Jews around the world, we will celebrate Purim. It was just this time last year when the pandemic began to spread; the megillah reading was our last large public event before quarantine. Our Purim rituals will be different this year than the past, with Zoom being the main method of participation. But even a scaled back observance in this difficult time begs the question: How can we celebrate at a time like this? By Purim it is possible that a half million Americans will have died from Covid, the economy will still be a mess, and many people will remain out of work, underfed, or otherwise in crisis.

Celebrating Purim this year might seem counterintuitive, but in fact I will claim that we need it more this year than ever. When we recall the dangers that hovered over Mordecai, Esther, and the Jews of ancient Persia, or any of the many periods of Jewish suffering, we remember that our ancestors continued to observe the Jewish holiday cycle. Through wars, pogroms, and even during the Shoah, Jewish suffering was given meaning through the continuity of the holidays. We may not be able to celebrate as loudly, or all be together for Purim as in the past, but it can still provide the emotional release that it has always has, brightening even our darkest days.

There is no sillier Jewish holiday than Purim. Maybe this year, that is exactly the emotional mode we need to inhabit, if just for one day. Our silliness - through costumes, jokes, pranks, drinking - are a way to rise above the otherwise drab days of late winter during a pandemic. It will give us a chance to sing out at a time when singing might otherwise be far from our minds. We will celebrate Purim, a date that marks our salvation from danger, with laughter and song, reminding ourselves that like previous times of danger, this one too will soon end. If Shabbat is a taste of the World to Come, perhaps the joys of Purim can be a taste of the year to come.

FROM CANTOR LARRY



Cantor's Corner:

The holiday of Purim will occur this month, and in the Hebrew calendar on the 14th day of Adar.

One of the great questions that is asked on Purim is why God's name is not mentioned in Megillath Esther, the story of Esther. In fact, there are two books in the entire T'NaKh, or the Bible, that do not mention God's name. The other book is Song of Songs.

One reason that is given for the omission of God's name in the story of Purim is that the story was written on a scroll in the form of a letter; therefore, for fear of mishandling this letter, God's name was omitted.

The Rabbis interpret hidden names of God within the story. For example, some interpret each time the term of king or Hamelech is found, it is a hidden meaning for God. There are also a number of times in the story that the letters of God's name (yud, heh, vav, heh) are formed through an acrostic. For example, in chapter 1 sentence 20, the four words of Hee V'khol Hanashim Yitnu, when read backwards, each first letter forms God's name.

Ron Isaacs writes that the word Y'hudim spelled Yud, Heh, Vav, Dalet, Yud, Mem is spelled with an extra Yud, before the Mem, six times in the

Megillah. Isaacs explains that there is an interpretation that the double Yud is referring to one of the abbreviations for God's name.

During the time of Esther, the Jews found themselves in need of God's help, pretty much the same as today. If we try hard enough to search within, just as they did during the miracle of Purim, we, too, can find God.

On behalf of my wife, Laura, my children, Samantha, Avi, Heather, and Jeremy, I wish you and your families a month of happiness, joy, and good health.

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Next month will be one full year since the pandemic started and I am stunned that we are still unable to go to a movie, a show, have dinner with friends in a home or in a restaurant and gather for family/friend events. Weddings that were postponed to early 2021 are being postponed yet again! It's very sad and disheartening. Yes, there is now a vaccine and yes, the medical profession has gotten better at learning how to treat the virus, but one year??? I'm guessing this is unprecedented. As of this writing there are still countries, states and cities that are in lockdown. This has had a horrible effect on our economy and our mental health.

At the start of the pandemic when everyone was told to stay home, we took advantage of the time; we cleaned out our closets, we emptied drawers, we undertook all of the little jobs we put off for lack of time. Well, now we had the time. We decluttered our houses and made them cleaner than ever before. We figured we had a good 2-4 weeks to accomplish these tasks!

Fast forward 11 months... online shopping has become a skill. Those empty closets and drawers?? Filled again with new purchases from Amazon, eBay

and whatever site that appealed to us or was having a "clearance" sale. We made up for our inability to go out, by shopping! Online shopping increased by 18% to 710 billion dollars (that's Billion with a B) over last year and in the first quarter of the pandemic, by 31%! WOW!

I was not part of that percentage. I purchased one pair of jeans in the past 11 months for myself. I went to Shoprite and Costco because I like to pick out my own food and fruit and I use coupons. I don't stand next to anyone hovering over a specific item that I may want. I'll just wait or go back to that aisle later. I don't go down every aisle. I get what I need and check out...then I reward myself with a Dunkin Donuts Iced coffee! For me, my Shoprite shopping experience hasn't changed other than that I now wear a mask and occasionally walk right past people I know because I can't see their face!

I have to commend the Membership Committee for making a commitment to the kosher restaurants in our area to help them survive and stay open. The Grab n' Go dinners have been a huge success. Starting off with 25 – 30 meals, we now average 70 – 90 meals for the restaurants. Some restaurants are more popular than others, but this is just a matter of food preference. The committee is doing what it set out to do... support our local kosher restaurants and keep them open. This is not a fundraiser for the committee or EBJC. The restaurants are very grateful for the opportunity and work with the committee to offer good food that is individually wrapped for each family.

My daughter, who has been on maternity leave, returned to work

on New Year's Eve. She's a Cardiac Intensive Care nurse at St. Francis in Trenton and I am concerned. Luckily, she has not had any COVID patients, but there are a couple of patients with COVID on her floor. She has a three year old and a four month old. Makes me nervous, but she's no different than any other essential care worker who has to take care of others while making sure they protect their families and keep them safe. I am always available to help out with those delicious little girls.

It's now 5:50 PM and I'm getting ready to start the Zoom "Dinner in Paris" Program with my Consortium of Synagogues. If you have been participating in any of these programs, I certainly hope you've been enjoying them. We will continue to find interesting and entertaining programs for you. We are aware that come May, when the weather improves, most of you will be eager to get out and enjoy the fresh air and outdoors. Our Zoom programs may slow down and we may switch to some outdoor activities as long as it is safe for everyone. Just know that you, our community, is always foremost on our minds. We want to keep you involved and engaged. If you have an idea for a program or an event, feel free to share it with me. My door is always open (literally and figuratively) and it is always my pleasure to speak with you!

FROM OUR PRESIDENTS



Last March, we ended our Recorder article with the following paragraph:

As February leads into March and the weather gets warmer, we look forward to the Purim Carnival with the knowledge that Pesach and Spring are not too far away. Let's celebrate some of the great things this synagogue does. May we go from strength to strength.

Who could have guessed that the world, in a matter of weeks, would be turned topsy turvey. Words such as pandemic, social distancing, and Covid would become household words or that our households would also become our offices, our homes, and even our sanctuary. Our Purim carnival had the lowest attendance in memory as people began to understand the danger of public gatherings. Our services on Erev Purim likewise had a significantly lower attendance. We did not realize that those Purim services would be the last services held in our sanctuary until August. We, therefore, are not going to be so naïve as to make any predictions about the next few months, but we know that the pandemic has

not, and will not, put an end to our community.

As Purim 5781 approaches and the pandemic continues to surge, we realized that there could not be a Purim carnival this year, one further disappointment to the youth of our community. Our Executive Director, Ellen Botwin, has arranged for a child-oriented program. We have booked a magician to perform on Zoom, in conjunction with other local synagogues. There has been a charge for attending the Purim Carnival in the past, but we felt that this year the magic show would be free of charge so that our young people could participate in some of the joy of this chaq without any financial burden on any of our families.

Likewise, our clergy, along with our Religious Committee, have begun planning for Purim services. At the time of this writing (mid January), the details have not been finalized, but we are working on ways to make sure that all in our community who wish to hear the words of the Megillah will be able to do so, definitely on Zoom and possibly in person (pandemic conditions permitting). Although there will be less schtick this year, we

do have some surprises in store for you. And our Sisterhood will, of course, continue to distribute Mashloach Manot baskets as in previous years.

This year has taught us how to adapt our religious services under extraordinary circumstances. As more Covid-19 vaccines are approved and as they become more widely available, we will begin to plan on the reopening of our synagogue. One great lesson we have learned from this plague is that our community has very strong bonds. Streamed services may very well have some place in our post-pandemic normal, but what we really hope for is to be able to schmooze with all of you in person at Kiddush.



MEN'S CLUB



Shalom!

Well, we continue to live during interesting times! In addition to our political transition, we are going through a very remarkable transition in our public health situation. While we are in a very serious surge of the virus and many people are being hospitalized and dying, we have begun the vaccination process, which has the promise of getting us back to something closer to normal. We pray that the rollout happens quickly, and that the vaccines work well on the new variants of the virus!



During January, Men's Club was involved in three different programs. First, on January 10, in spite of the virus,

we held our annual blood drive. This is very obviously a huge mitzvah, as blood very literally saves the lives of people who need it. Since the EBJC ballroom was not available for this purpose, our chair for this event, Ron Berger, worked with NJ Blood Services to look for an alternative venue. He was able to secure the use of the Brunswick Square Mall. Surprisingly (at least to me!) the turnout for this event was much

better than it has been over the last several years. We had 56 people sign up this year and collected 48 units of blood, about 20% MORE than last year. Yasher Koach to Ron for pulling off this successful drive, to Hollie Ceramie, who has been working with different East Brunswick houses of worship to encourage them to commit to a blood drive this year, and to all those who made phone calls asking people to give. Especially, our thanks are due to those who donated blood!

Normally we have an "unsung heroes" program on the day of the blood drive, partly to attract people to the site of the drive. This year our program was held a few days later and on Zoom. The heroes we celebrated this year were health care workers, who put themselves at risk to keep us safe. In particular, we honored Sherry Stein, Administrative Director, Hospital Based Providers, Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital; Deanna Hoffman, Physician Assistant, CityMD in NYC; and Craig Berger of the Milltown Rescue Squad. Their stories were both inspiring, riveting and heartbreaking. They, and all their colleagues deserve our thanks and our prayers.

Finally, at the end of January, Men's Club and Sisterhood had a joint Tu B'Shevat Seder hosted by David Libowsky and Sharlene



Harris. It was wonderful to celebrate Tu B'Shevat with a participatory virtual seder that was informative, creative, spiritual and delicious! Thanks to Sharlene Harris and Dave Libowsky for organizing and leading and to all of you who participated. Looking forward to repeating this event next year in person!

In February, we are planning to have our annual World Wide Wrap on the same day we usually have it, Superbowl Sunday - 2/7. Given that it will be virtual, we are looking into doing it with other Men's Clubs in the Northern New Jersey Region. We are also planning to have a program with Diane Lang later in February. Diane is an author, very popular instructor at OLLIRU, therapist, and positive living expert. She will discuss with us how to think positively in order to take advantage of our current situation. More information and precise logistics will be available, as always, on Tidbits and via email.
