FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"Thoughts while Distributing Ashes"

As I walked down to the step of the sanctuary to distribute ashes to "mark" the beginning of LENT 2019 I uttered a silent prayer for my patron saint of Ash Wednesday. I say "my" patron saint (with a little "s") because he is not canonized nor even recognized by any other soul on this day but me. His name is Father Henne and he was the pastor and Chaplin of Saint Joseph High School. Father Henne, suffering from Parkinson's shook terribly with his hands twitching without control. But on Ash Wednesday, when he was to distribute ashes, by himself (ministers did not help at that time) would surmount a courageous effort to raise his hand and mark the foreheads of all of his parishioners and the entire student body. Resting his four fingers on your temple he would direct his thumb in the form of a cross with ashes while saying:

"REMEMBER THAT YOU ARE DUST AND TO DUST YOU SHALL RETURN"

His voice shook and he perspired profusely through his effort. But you could not help to notice the reality of those words while his eyes were fixed on yours. Lent was officially "open" and for the next forty days, even after the symbolic mark was gone the image of Father Henne remained with me.

The prayer that I whisper is simply: "May I be humble in my ministry, steadfast in my devotion and pure in my intentions as a priest this Lent as your dear priest, oh Lord, Father Henne.

Marking foreheads with ashes is an intimate exchange with the church and each individual



who receives it. It is such an important sign of intention to change and the commitment to strive for the mortal nature to be clothed in the immortality as we journey through the physical offering of Christ Jesus on the cross that marked the end of sins power over us and a call to perfection in sharing the resurrection. Even though receiving ashes is just a sacramental and the day is participation in the liturgy it is not obligatory. It is seen and experienced very differently to those who so faithfully make their way to church that day. We are all humbled by the mark of ashes for it takes away the perfectly groomed outward image of our self and "brings" to the surface all of our flaws, weaknesses and sin.

But You are not Alone – Once again the community of the Faithful comforts us in the reality of our humanity as it carries the sign for which we will be cured, forgiven and raised up. I always joke at the end of Mass as I look out at the congregation: "You look marvelous" for smeared in ashes there is no hiding our illness and our need for the great physician. Lent will challenge us to a conversion- a painful realignment to Truth- and bring us the peace of knowing that our mortal nature will be changed to be like His, immortal and perfect, capable of eternal life.

Sharpie markers make a better outward sign – I often teased that we should replace the use of ashes with a sharpie marker. The permanence of the sign may last the forty days of Lent and make our penitential resolve all the more visible. Many people receive the ashes at the end of the day and never have a chance to witness to this mark of Christ in public. I remember in college, after receiving ashes at early morning Mass, people would point to my face and quietly inform me that I had some "dirt" on my forehead. To the gracious inquirers I would simply say: "Oh those are ashes... it's Ash Wednesday... Lent begins today." Others would see the ashes and with great grief lament that they had forgotten to stop at church that morning... but




for them it was not too late to start the period of Prayer, Fasting and Alms giving. But if the mark was more permanent it would remind not only onlookers but each individual every time they looked in the mirror that Lent is more than a one day promise but a season of perseverance in self-sacrifice. Marked by a permanent sign of Christ's love through the cross is carried out on many in the sign of a tattoo. The image of the cross is the most expressed tattoo in America.... That should give us all hope!! So just remember that the sacramental sign might be long removed from sight via a wash cloth and soap but the commitment was made. By the Grace of God may your Lent be carried out during these days of Lent so that your Easter joy may be complete!!!

Disciplines of Lent: An Investment in the Theological Virtues of Faith Hope and Love


The disciplines of Prayer, Fasting and Alms Giving have long been the staples of a good and holy Lent. Not only do they help us to become unattached to worldly things and they lead us to an increase of Divine Grace as well. Here is an easy formula to follow this Lent.

PRAYER, intimate and personal communication with God, leads to an increase in the virtue of Faith. To believe in a God can easily be an exercise of the mind. One can be taught about the presence and love of God simply by reading Sacred Scripture and see it in nature. The basic acceptance of God can remain intellectual and impersonal unless one prays. The idea of prayer in Lent is to increase your love quotient of a God that you "know" to a personal and intimate companion. Every type of prayer begs in Faith to share in the life of the God who created us. Jesus' incarnation is the sign of such a personal friend and a window into the will of God. So praying during Lent should not be a babbling of words but a courtship with God in Faith.



FASTING, the conscious choice to abstain from earthly sustenance and pleasure, can lead for a hunger of the virtue of Hope. The desire to be "filled" in this world via food, power, praise and wealth shows that we place our hope in the here and now. "Eat, Drink and be Merry for Tomorrow we Die" epitomizes our fallen nature's narrow sightedness and meaning of our existence. Fasting forces us to empty the hold of the worldly things so that we can Hope in the heavenly things. To hunger in the absence of human fulfillment and pleasure (poor in spirit) leads to the peace filled reality of the heavenly satisfaction of heaven. Why eat junk food when you have received an invitation to beautiful and luxurious dinner that is prepared and waiting for you to eat?

ALMSGIVING, the act of charity that comes from your heart, leads to an increase in the virtue of Love. Love is the sharing of God's presence with others who may have doubted their worth as a member of His body. Alms giving is not a surplus giving but a sharing of your blessings and gifts that you attribute to God's call of stewardship and discipleship. The virtue of love is a sharing in the joy of knowing what is given in Christ name is a gift gained and not lost.





THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING Deuteronomy 26:4-10

SECOND READING

Romans 10:8-13

Brothers and sisters: What does Scripture say? *The word is near you, in your mouth and in your heart* —that is, the word of faith that we preach—, for, if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. For the Scripture says, *No one who believes in him will be put to shame.* For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all, enriching all who call upon him. For "everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."

GOSPEL READING

Luke 4:1-13

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the desert for forty days, to be tempted by the devil. He ate nothing during those days, and when they were over he was

hungry. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become bread." Jesus answered him, "It is written, *One does not live on bread alone.*"

Then he took him up and showed him all the kingdoms of the world in a single instant. The devil said to him, "I shall give to you all this power and glory; for it has been handed over to me, and I may give it to whomever I wish. All this will be yours, if you worship me." Jesus said to him in reply, "It is written: You shall worship the Lord, your God, and him alone shall you serve."

Then he led him to Jerusalem, made him stand on the parapet of the temple, and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written: *He will command his angels concerning you, to guard you,* and: With their hands they will support you, lest you dash your foot against a stone." 

"Giving up" or "giving for?"

Lent implies deprivation and uncomfortable penances, but it can be more meaningful. Consider turning your offerings into gifts of gratitude for God's gifts:

Give time in prayer: God, who created the universe, wants to spend time with you. Whether it's reading Scripture, praying the Rosary, or attending daily Mass, know that God is delighted you're spending time with Him, and will give you all the graces you need to stay close to Him.

Give small gifts with great love: St. Therese of Lisieux was expert at turning small sacrifices into



In this Gospel reading, Jesus told the story of the Prodigal (or reckless) Son. It goes like this. One day, the younger son demanded his father to give him his share of the estate. He left to squander it far from

home. When his money was gone, his situation grew desperate and he returned to his father,

humbled and asking for mercy. The father was overjoyed to have his son back and threw a huge party. The older son, however, resented his brother's welcome and complained to his father that he didn't get a reward to celebrate



March 2 – Ash Wednesday. First day of Lent. Ashes from burnt palms are placed on the forehead as a sign of penance. Ash Wednesday is a day of abstinence from meat and fasting – one regular meal and two smaller meals that together don't equal a full meal.

March 5 – St. John Joseph of the Cross (1734). St. John joined a group of Franciscans called the Reform of St. Peter of Alcantara. Despite his elevated position and spiritual gifts, he remained humble, doing menial tasks around the monastery. his obedience—and he was the "good one!" Jesus promised that when we approach God with a truly repentant heart, we

can always come home. It's not that God wants us to feel bad, but, like any parent, he wants

us to understand we did something wrong and be willing to change. Through this

parable, Jesus shows us that God is a loving, generous Father whose deepest nature is merciful, forgiving love. We are reminded that we can always come home.

March 8 – St. John of God (1550). Originally, St. John was a soldier known for his violence and immorality. After nearly dying in battle, he converted and dedicated his life to serving the poor and sick.

March 17 – St. Patrick of Ireland (c.461). Born in Scotland, St. Patrick was kidnapped and brought to Ireland as a slave. He escaped but later returned to become the bishop of Ireland and is credited for having established the Church there.

powerful deeds by her love. Our Lenten sacrifices, entrusted to God, do immense good that we'll see fully in Heaven. Whoever knew that our simple Lenten offerings can be part of God's saving work?

Give half your cloak: According to legend, St. Martin of Tours gave half of his cloak to a cold beggar. That night, Jesus appeared to St. Martin in a dream, wearing the cloak. When we serve others, it is Jesus who ultimately receives our gift.

Q How can I get& over my fearA of Confession?

For many Catholics, going to Confession is unsettling. Facing and admitting our faults to another person – even in a confidential setting – is uncomfortable, even painful. In this



case, the priest is acting in the person of God and it takes courage and humility to present ourselves before God. In Confession we say to God, "Please forgive me

for intentionally rejecting You and Your love."

If you feel uncomfortable while waiting in the Confession line, it's a good sign. It means your conscience is healthy and working. Remember that God sees us standing in line and He is ready to welcome us back. He isn't angry or brooding, or smug because our poor choices proved He was right. In fact, when we are sincerely repentant, He and all of heaven celebrate because we're returning to Him (Luke 15:10). When the priest says the words of absolution, imagine God embracing you, saying, "My child, your sins are forgiven you...Go and sin no more." We receive powerful graces, and are asked to make amends where possible. Rejoice in the chance to start again.
