SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Pope Francis: "Lead us not into temptation"

On December 13, 2017, Pope Francis commented that the words of the "Our Father" lead us not into temptation are misleading. God would not lead us into temptation, said Pope Francis, perhaps the words should be changed. The reality of the statement of the praver, as it is worded, speaks more clearly to the challenge of temptation that can be found when God leads us into the **desert of** prayer and calls us under the weight of the cross of suffering. These experiences can be frightening and found by a weak soul not as an embrace of spiritual purification, for which God intends, but as an occasion of failure under the strain of a fallen nature. The prayer invokes God's presence to be with us, hand in hand, to walk through the midst of worldly distractions and the devils lure so we can make it an experience of Love in His name. The following line: "deliver us from evil" clarifies that where God leads us the devil is lurking! God would not lead us into temptation but where He leads us will be tempted, if left to our own strength, and could lead to a sinful choice in the stead of the will of God. This article speaks of those real temptations... Jesus was led by the spirit to be "tempted" so his resolve and nature would be known... So we too are tempted to affirm our resolve and divine nature that lead us to Life Eternal.

The Transfiguration: DESIRING THE LIFE, MISSION AND GLORY OF CHRIST



This week we have been invited to take a look inside the life of heaven. Seeing the Transfigured Lord gives us a sense of the "Fullness of life in union with God." Peace at last... seeing and hearing and even sensing the magnificence forces us to echo the words of Saint Peter "It is good that we are here. How then do we obtain such an entrance into the Divine Presence? How is it that we enter into

the eternal perfection for which we call heaven? The answer comes in our desire to set aside ourselves and battle the temptations against the three fold concupiscence (fallen nature) of our humanity.

FLESH – Entertainment of the Body vs. the Enlightenment of the Soul

Jesus is tempted by the devil to turn small round stones into bread while literally starving from His 40 day fast. While the fast may have weakened His human nature it only strengthened is resolve to give of His Life-Nature and adhere to the life that he would win for us in the resurrection. The beckoning of Satan through our senses distorts our vision as well. We in our hunger, to satisfy our human appetites, can be enticed by his voice to see a stone as "bread of life." It is when we are starving for self fulfillment that we are most prepared to receive the nourishment of the Soul. The word of Christ in the scriptures, His teaching in the Catechism and profoundly found in the prayers of devotions. This food enlightens the soul and prepares it ever the more for the Eucharistic food that we receive at the Sunday Mass. (ie. The reason we still hold an hour fast before this Holy Communion). **Lent calls us** to "give up" or close our ears to cacophony of worldly voices that call out to us in the forms of media, songs, television and idle chat with friends. These things build up the bond between our self-worth in the eyes of the world and distract us from the tender loving voice that dwells within. We need to counter this voice that we have become so familiar to and replace it with acts of devotional love.

CONSIDER fasting from the voice of your **favorite distraction** and replace it with the voice of Christ using one of the above suggestions.

EGO – Vainglory vs. Eternal Glory

Jesus is tempted by Satan to "buy" into the power of sensationalism to attract worldly fame. To throw himself down from the temple parapet for the angels to sweep him up is in direct contradiction to the Father's mission for Him: the cross. The abuse of any of our God-given talents to bolster our pride instead of the kingdom of God certainly falls into this temptation of our Ego. Interestingly enough as Jesus did properly dispense of His authority over evil spirits and the effect of sin (death) he was accused of being a sorcerer and in the league with Satan. It was only those who sought, in Faith, to participate in these actions understood His power as merciful love! But Jesus greatest act of sensationalism was the resurrection. Only after all vain-glory was laid aside, through the cross and His death, that true (eternal) glory was exposed!

Lent calls us, through prayer to make our every action, word and deed be the mission of Christ and not a mission of recognition and praise. The last place instead of the first is our approach. A simple prayer of service to the mission of the coming kingdom is simply Mary's fiat: "Let it be done unto me... I am the handmaiden of the Lord."

CONSIDER: That you are #3 in importance to the mission of God. God first, neighbor second... Approach through prayer every situation with great humility and act according to Glory to come.

Avarice – Fools Gold vs. Heavenly Treasures

Satan temps Jesus with "fools gold" when he promises him the kingdoms of the world. Bowing to Satan the great deceiver is like trusting a road side huckster or late night infomercial to be the quickest way to health, money and security. These false gods tempt us with false hope. The earthly treasures of heaven have no value in the heavenly kingdom for they only serve the master of fleeting things. Jesus said: The measure for which you measure will be measured out to you. (Matt 7). If we care to measure our wealth in "fools gold" instead of love, kindness, compassion, mercy and virtue the scales of the heavenly treasury will go unaffected by our earthly endeavors.

Lent calls us to give alms to the poor as an act of investment for the kingdom of God. This action allows us not to be measured in our wealth but in our charity. Almsgiving also challenges us to fast from the unnecessary use of our wealth for frivolous comforts so that they may turn into providing the basic needs for those who are seeking "daily bread."

CONSIDER: Putting a bowl at the door for which you come and go from your home. Empty you change and one



dollar bills into the bowl each evening as your return from the world with the intention to donate it to SVDP. Allow the bowl to be a reminder that what we empty from our well deserving wealth into the bowl of the poor we are tipping the scales for which we desire to be measured... "fools gold" to heavenly treasures.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults

(RCIA) - Last Sunday we sent our Catechumen, Trent Raspotnik to the Cathedral in Greensburg to celebrate the Rite of Election with Bishop Kulick. Our Candidates, Mindy Lapia and Alec Patterson, also went to celebrate the Call to Continuing Conversion. These rites, celebrated at the start of Lent, are the public moment when sponsors affirm the readiness of the catechumens and candidates to complete their Christian initiation or be received into the full communion of the Catholic Church. The Church formally 'elects' those who have been preparing for the sacraments of initiation - Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist. They are solemnly called to these sacraments at the Easter Vigil. Our Catechumens and Candidates were recognized by Bishop Kulick who encouraged them to live in deeper conformity to the life of Christ. They are now entering into a period of "Purification and Enlightenment" during Lent as they continue their journey to the Easter Vigil. After celebrating these Rites, they will no longer be Catechumens and Candidates; we will refer to them as "the Elect".

Please take a prayer partner leaflet in the Hall of Memories to pray for these Candidates and offer our Lenten sacrifices for them and their perseverance in the faith. They need our prayers, encouragement and support during these final weeks of preparation. Think of them often in these final weeks before Easter.
