Your Friend? Or Somebody You know?



When I was in college at IUP my true friends and I shared lunch and dinner together every day. It is strange to think back to how we accomplished this task without cell phones and texting. Lunch was at noon and dinner (4:30pm) followed the end of an episode of "MASH" that we watched together in Scott and Danny's room. We were a true "band of brothers" sharing the same plight of college challenges and small dorm rooms. Living in close quarters on the first floor of Lawrence Hall forced us to reveal our true selves and vulnerabilities as we learned to trust each other and become friends.

Friends vs. Acquaintances

If, while at meals, someone unknown to the group would stop to say hello to me (or to another for that matter) and continue on their way the question was always: *"Is that your friend or someone you know?"* The deeper meaning behind such a saying was have you invested time into that relationship? Do you even know their last name, where they are from? Or are they just someone in your class, study group or (if a girl) a hopeful relationship.

Friends are more than people you know... they share time and common experiences that mold and form you into the person that you are becoming and realize that you desire to be. Sure, some acquaintances may become friends over time and some friends fade away as interest and time dictates.

Friends in the Social Media Generation

I watch my students and their fascination with popularity based on Social Media post and followers of their account.

I worry that they will believe that virtual is real and go onto the important part of their lives wondering: Is this person my Friend or just somebody I know?



Sara Teaches Me Again!

Of course, you all know Sara, the little angel in the Christmas Story that I shared during advent, and how she taught me some 10 years ago the simplicity of the Nativity story. She helped me to remember that the Angel required a "yes" from the participants Mary, Joseph, the Shepherds and the Magi in the story that gave them a chance to befriend the Savior and to receive the greatest love a friend could ever give to a willing participant.

This time Sara has taught me, or at least reminded me, of the difference between a "Friend" and someone you might just "know." In a short essay written for class she

writes about the plight of making authentic friends in the age of social media. Her insight is fascinating and has led me to realize that times have changed but the problems/challenges remain the same.

Sara's Essay:

The simplicity and effortless ability of categorizing an acquaintance under the status of "Friend" on social media platform has undermined the sincerity of who we claim to be our Friends. Social media's "one click step to becoming friends," has replaced the awkward "getting to know someone stage," or the awful first impression questions like "So what do you like to do?" or "What brings you here? that are followed by short uneasy chuckles from both parties until eventually you both feel comfortable and conversation flows effortlessly. The" in person" and genuine experience of becoming someone's friend has been wrapped up, silenced, and shoved under the box labeled "friend" on your social media page. Clicking "friend" or "Follow" of someone's account

may seem like you have gained a new life long companion, but in reality, there is no authentic relationship established-just a shared status. And as the shared status of our friends pile up into a number plastered on our account page, the more ingénue and insignificant the "Friendships" become. The ability to remain connected with life long friends through social media is a nice thought to harbor, but is someone really your life-long friend if all they do is sit in a long list amongst the rest of your life-long friends?" Your real friends will not be found by clicking a button on a screen. Your real friends will be found in life, where awkward silence, shared experiences, and contagious laughter will bring you together more than a status change ever will, and you'll be sure to remember those memories for a lifetime-much longer than a social media status will last.

Jesus: "Friend" or Somebody you "know?"



Do we treat Jesus like a true friend or is he more like the virtual friends we *have in this social media era?* This was my first thought while Sara was reading her essay to me. I thought how easy it is to "claim" Jesus as a friend to boost our own social "status" or comfort level with a relationship that really calls for time and commitment. To "know" about someone does not make them a friend but an acquaintance.

Jesus says: 'If you are to be my friend you must lay down your life, pick up your cross and follow me". Now that's a true face to face reality! If you talk about awkward conversations that takes the cake! The depth of friendship Jesus wants us to have with Him demands a desire to "know" Him; understand Him and love Him. The easiness of the relationship can be found in that He became like us (our human nature) so that we could become like Him! The

advantage of beginning a friendship with Jesus is that He already knows us! He already loves us! So, the awkward conversations will become comfortable when we simply rest in that fact and just tell Him everything that is on our hearts! Jesus doesn't want to be a friend on some social media page but an active part of your day to day life!

To Know Him – Knowing someone leads to desiring to share in their life. Reading the Sacred Scriptures (Bible) helps us to come to know who He is as the son of God. To know what His mission is as the healer, forgiver, sanctifier and redeemer. These things show us immediately that He is fully invested in us and a friendship with us! Knowing Him leads to understanding Him.

To understand Him – Jesus came for us! A true friend always has the other's best interest at heart! Jesus shows us how to love; how to deal with our fears and vulnerabilities by showing us the bigger picture of His mission of perfection and eternal life! He wants us to know what it is to be loved unconditionally. To turn awkward conversations into that contagious laughter! He wants you to understand that you are so precious that no weakness, sin or fault will chase Him away! This kind of self-giving companionship will lead you to love Him!

To love Him – This relationship of love is nurtured through prayer. Prayer is an intimate conversation with your beloved where you find total abandonment of self-desire and embrace what ever is His plan for you to reach perfection and eternal life. These conversations with Jesus are where one comes to say with great confidence: Jesus is my friend... not just someone I "know" He is my life and love!

The Elijah Cup - Praying For Vocations

The purpose of the Elijah Cup, a blessed cup, is to provide a focal point for prayer for vocations.

Each week at Sunday Mass before dismissal, the celebrant calls a family, individual, or couple forward to receive the Elijah Cup. They receive a blessing and take the Cup home with its accompanying prayers, and put it in a place of honor in their home. Each day for a week, during prayer time

(morning, bedtime or mealtime), they pray for an increase and perseverance in vocations. The following Saturday afternoon they return the Elijah Cup in its container before 4:30 P.M. Mass to the table beside the presider's chair in the front of the church.

Praying for vocations is the most powerful way to support vocations. The Second Vatican Council instructs us that it is the job of the laity to pray for and raise up vocations, and this has been echoed by Pope John Paul II in many of his teachings. We hope that those who bring the cup home will continue to pray for vocations daily after their Elijah Cup week concludes.

We sincerely thank all who have received the Elijah Cup in the past and faithfully prayed for vocations. We hope you will receive the Cup again in 2023. If you have not taken part in this beautiful and powerful prayer opportunity, please consider signing up to pray for a week with the beautiful chalice in your home as focal point of your prayer for vocations.

We thank God for Fr. John and Fr. Roniel living out their vocations in such a loving way. We need to pray for them and to encourage and support young men to say "Yes" if God is has chosen them to share their lives in His service.

God answers our prayers! We thank Him and pray for our seminarian, Tyler Randolph, as he is answering God's call! We also thank Him and pray for the other young men in our parish who are discerning their vocation.

NIGHT AT THE RACES - IT IS GOING TO BE A BLAST !!!

We are happy to announce our ninth annual "Night at the Races" - Saturday, February 11, 2023. In addition to being a fund-raiser for Immaculate Conception Parish it will be a great night out!

Maybe you will bet on your friend's horse or jockey or a name that "sounds" like a winner! All bets will be taken at the betting windows and then the race is run. The odds will be figured out based on how many have bet on the winning horse and jockey leaving of course the house a purse as well. The winners will be notified of the payout and will pick up their winnings at the payout window. Then the windows will be open for the next race!

Other games of chance and other prizes!

Throughout the night there will be a 50/50, paint sticks, and raffle basket tickets.

The Food Menu - There will be plenty of great food and of course dessert. The thirst for beer and soda will be satisfied! We encourage you to bring your own favorite food or beverage to share with your friends at your table.

Auction Race – At the end of the 8 races the excitement is only to begin when bets are taken for the auction race! Ten Horses will be auctioned off to the highest bidder. Usually these horses are sold for well over \$100 which allows whole groups of people to pool their money to buy a horse. The winnings will be a straight 50-50 split with the house! Gospel Reading

Matthew 4:12-23

He left Nazareth and went to live in Capernaum by the sea, in the region of Zebulun and Naphtali, that what had been said through Isaiah the prophet might be fulfilled: Land of Zebulun and land of Naphtali, the way to the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles, the people who sit in darkness have seen a great light, on those dwelling in a land overshadowed by death light has arisen. From that time on, Jesus began to preach and say, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon who is called Peter, and his brother Andrew, casting a net into the sea; they were fishermen. He went around all of Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom, and curing every disease and illness among the people.
