Anytime by appointment Tuesday: 5:15 - 6:15 p.m.; Saturdays: 9:00 - 10:00 a.m.





IC's On The Corner Event Planner



For 2023 our parish goal is to raise \$250,000.00. This goal would help us in two ways: First to meet our Diocesan Target of \$148,776.00 which would be used on the diocesan level to support the international priests, seminarian's education, faith formation programs, Catholic Charities, and other diocesan ministries. Secondly, the remaining \$101,224.00 will be used here in our parish to aid the needy of our region with a \$10,000.00 donation to the Saint Vincent de Paul Society. Remaining monies will be used to continue the development of Immaculate Conception Cemetery for future needs. Our intention is to add new signage, visitation parking, trees and ground cover throughout the cemetery. The landscaping will include improvements in the new Genesis sections and along the creek line. The addition of our new columbarium for cremains and development of the new sections we will provide 600 burial spaces for our parish families. Your gift to the Diocesan Lenten Appeal will enable us to fulfill the above projects. In the past 8 years, our active participation in DLA has been between 35% - 42%. In 2022 36% of our parishioners donated to the DLA. Let us make 2023 the year we increase our participation by giving a gift to help both the diocese, our parish and our cemetery on the corner. Notes from the Pastor

Take a Look at Your Inner Self!!



Matthew Kelly's book, "*Rediscover the Saints*", in his Chapter on "Saint Ignatius of Loyola", he asks the question "Are you an emotionally intelligent person? The question is one of introspection calling us to take a deep look at yourself to discover who we are **spiritually, mentally** and **emotionally**. Matthew Kelly continues by calling to mind that over the past several years it has become very popular to speak about the concept of Emotional Intelligence (EQ) in large part because it is disappearing from our culture. So much of modern culture promotes a numbing unconsciousness rather than the vibrant consciousness that God wants us to live in each moment.

EQ, by definition, is a (notional) measure of a person's adequacy in such areas as self-awareness, empathy, and dealing with sensitively with other people. It could be

something as simple as recognizing that we pray, play and serve better on a good night's sleep. It is the ability to recognize when someone is sad by their disposition or that their glass is empty and you ask if they would like another drink! Matthew Kelly explains that emotional intelligence is not only an awareness of what is happening within us and around us, it is ultimately an awareness of what is happening with the people around us and the effect our words and actions have on their own self-esteem and spiritual worth.

EQ Factor as 20/20 Vision – The emotional intelligence test of our vision with an "inside eye" so we become aware how clearly, we see and react in various situations. These include:

- Stressful or frustrating
- Failures or discouraging situations
- Leadership positions and methods for achieving success
- Methods for managing the emotions of others of various ages
- Methods for assessing various personality traits in others
- Dealing with diversity and culture sensitivities



These areas can be evaluated by a spiritual EQ and become very helpful in our ability to act responsibly and charitably toward others. Just as the **"beam in our eye"** inhibits us aiding another's vision, the spiritual EQ clearly reflects on our awareness (inwardly) of self and allows appropriate awareness and actions that make *Christ present*!

St. Ignatius, as Matthew Kelly persists, is the spiritual guru of EQ evaluation! Saint Ignatius created a process of prayer and



meditation engaging the sacred Scriptures that draws us to a deeper love of God and in turn a true understanding of our ability to respond to the challenges of our call to be disciples. Putting ourselves within the accounts of Jesus' life gives us perspective and self-awareness that aids the process to discern the greater good in our daily encounters. The process allows us to imagine being Jesus, or the Apostles, or the subject of the story (i.e. Blind man) or just a passerby. In each scenario we imagine the perspective and the ability to act. It is in this process we find sympathy for the victim patient for the disciple, mercy from the Christ and a challenge for the bystander! All in all, our inner vision (soul) melts away our desire to be *lazy*, *prejudice*, *self-centered and judgmental* and gives us use of the victim and the actific of the Value Spirit to avail in an interview.



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING Genesis 2:7-9; 3:1-7

The LORD God formed man out of the clay of the ground and blew into his nostrils the breath of life, and so man became a living being. Then the LORD God planted a garden in Eden, in the east, and placed there the man whom he had formed. Out of the ground the LORD God made various trees grow that were delightful to look at and good for food, with the tree of life in the middle of the garden and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Now the serpent was the most cunning of all the animals that the LORD God had made. The serpent asked the woman, "Did God really tell you not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?" The woman answered the serpent: "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; it is only about the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden that God said, 'You shall not eat it or even touch it, lest you die." But the serpent said to the woman: "You certainly will not die! No, God knows well that the moment you eat of it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods who know what is good and what is evil." The woman saw that the tree was good for food, pleasing to the eyes, and desirable for gaining wisdom. Gospel Reading

Matthew 4:1-11

At that time Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was hungry. The tempter approached and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command that these stones become loaves of bread." He said in reply, "It is written: One does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes forth from the mouth of God." Then the devil took him to the holy city, and made him stand on the parapet of the temple, and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down. At this, Jesus said to him, "Get away, Satan! It is written: The Lord, your God, shall you worship and him alone shall you serve." Then the devil left him and, behold, angels came and ministered to him.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and life of the world to come. Amen.




