

For 2023 our parish goal is to raise \$250,000.00. This goal would help us in two ways: First to meet our Diocesan Target of \$148,776.00 which would be used on the diocesan level to support the international priests, seminarian's education, faith formation programs, Catholic Charities, and other diocesan ministries. Secondly, the remaining \$101,224.00 will be used here in our parish to aid the needy of our region with a \$10,000.00 donation to the Saint Vincent de Paul Society. Remaining monies will be used to continue the development of Immaculate Conception Cemetery for future needs. Our intention is to add new signage, visitation parking, trees and ground cover throughout the cemetery. The landscaping will include improvements in the new Genesis sections and along the creek line. The addition of our new columbarium for cremains and development of the new sections we will provide 600 burial spaces for our parish families. Your gift to the Diocesan Lenten Appeal will enable us to fulfill the above projects. In the past 8 years, our active participation in DLA has been between 35% - 42%. In 2022 36% of our parishioners donated to the DLA. Let us make 2023 the year we increase our participation by giving a gift to help both the diocese, our parish and our cemetery on the corner. Notes from the Pastor

DIOCESAN LENTEN APPEAL: \$250,000 DIOCESAN ASSESSMENT: \$148,776.00 PARISH GOAL: \$101,224.00

The Bishop's Appeal: BEING Faithful to honoring our theme of "One Body in Christ for the Diocesan Lenten Appeal we will honor our forbearers by continuing their tradition of looking out for one another and caring for those most in need. The Diocesan Lenten Appeal offers each of us a remarkable opportunity to touch the lives of so many who are a part of the body of Christ, whether it be a schoolchild in need of tuition assistance, a family who finds itself down on its luck, a retired priest or a young man who finds his way to God through our youth ministry efforts.

Lent is the perfect time for us to look to the future with Hope. As we await the Resurrection with great joy so should we be aware of the need to preserve such a faith into the future. The Diocese of Greensburg, established by the Holy See, assures us of the leadership needed for the Church in our area. Our support today promises the same for our children tomorrow.

Pastor's Appeal: As the proud pastor of Immaculate Conception I too support the mission of the Diocese for I see the great things that have produced fruit in our parish through their support. We are blessed to have an active growing parish in a time that many churches are struggling to stay open. We have a vibrant Catechetical program that provides for children through our Catholic School and formation programs. We have ongoing Catechetical opportunities for adults in many forms encouraging everyone to grow in Faith. We are blessed with facilities to house our worship, our formation and social gatherings. We are honored to have sacred ground dedicated for our deceased members at our cemetery. All of our programs are supported by diocesan leadership and your generous sacrificial offerings.

While the Diocesan Appeal supports primarily the mission of the Bishop it indirectly serves our parish as an outreach of his mission through me and our parish staff. The diocesan assessment is our share in helping the Bishop tend to the whole diocese while the parish goal is set as an opportunity for us to further that mission in our parish.

Parish Appeal: Serve the Poor & Parish: There continues to be a great need for the poor in our area as government assistant programs that started in Covid come to an end. The increasing cost of utilities, gasoline, heating fuel and groceries place a strain on fixed incomes and unemployed families. Our parish has a specific fund set up to help parishioners in times of trouble while our **Saint Vincent DePaul Society** helps people survive week to week.... Sometimes hand to mouth as well. The **"poor box"** money each month, and the Thanksgiving envelope helps to support Saint Vincent DePaul but often it is not enough especially in the winter months. That is why we have decided to set aside the first **\$10,000** that we receive above the diocesan goal to serve the poor in our area. We also have recently been sending a group of men and women from the parish to volunteer in the food bank pantry.

MAKING A PLEDGE: If you participated in the Bishop's Diocesan Lenten Appeal last year and plan to do so again this year I thank you in advance. I challenge you to stretch your offering a bit further this year to help the poor. If each of us gave \$10 -\$25 more it would help extend the work we could do for the poor and our parish mission.

If you did not make a pledge last year I would ask you to please consider to do so this year. Your simple gift of just \$10 -\$25 would significantly help us serve the poor and our parish mission. Think of it as the perfect Lenten sacrifice that has benefits for others!

PLEDGE AMOUNTS IN FASTING: Praying for the poor is always an act of Mercy but when we add fasting that turns into alms giving we have the perfect trifecta! Consider the following: If your family goes out to dinner more than once a week, fast from one dinner each week and make that your DLA Pledge!! If you buy your lunch out or stop for a doughnut or coffee throughout the week, offer it up once a week during lent and add that to your pledge. Six meals, six lunches or six breakfast meals can make a nice pledge above the gift you have already thought to give.

This kind of fasting challenges us to recognize the good things that we have and perhaps take for granted. They are not sinful practices but they bring comfort and pleasure beyond fulfilling the need of nourishment. The fast then turns us to pray in thanksgiving for God's bountiful gifts and moves us to give alms to share such blessings to others.

MY PLEDGE: last year I made a pledge of \$2,500 for each of my parishes (\$5,000) I am adding another \$300 for each parish simply through the fasting formula above! It is that easy! I rather give it to the parish than to old McDonalds!!

BEING SUCCESSFUL: Accomplishing both the Bishop's assessment and our parish goal is the obvious target of our efforts. But having everyone participate as a Lenten observance will make the difference!!

I thank you in advance to help to make this appeal and our Lenten journey one that leads to a true sense of Easter Joy.

THE TRANSFIGURATION

Pastors Note: My Goal in this Lenten (Bulletin) Season is to find worthwhile articles to share a further reflection on the Sunday Gospel. There are so many talented writers and I feel that we can benefit from their insight. The "Crossroads Initiative" reflections are often very insightful... such as the one by Dr. Marcelino D'Ambrosio posted here today.



One of the bible's names for the God is "El Shaddai" or "God of the Mountains." And from the very beginning of salvation history, we see that mountains are a special place to communicate with Heaven. Abraham ascends Mount Moriah to sacrifice his son (Gen 22). God reveals his name and to Moses on Mount Sinai (Ex 3). Moses later receives the 10 Commandments on that very spot (Ex 31:18). Elijah returns to the same mountain, also known as Horeb, to hear what God's "still, small voice" has to say (I Kg 19:8).

So it is no surprise that Jesus brings His "pillars" (Gal 2:9) with Him up a high mountain to experience a special moment of communion with the Most High. It is this event that is commemorated by the Church each year on August 6. This Sunday's gospel tells the story. As tradition has it, Mount Tabor is the place. Rising from the plain of Jezreel, its summit provides a spectacular view of all of Galilee. But, what Jesus intends for Peter, James, and John to see is not the countryside. He wishes to provide them a glimpse of who He really is. Jesus is a carpenter from Nazareth, true. He must have looked much like any other Jewish craftsman of that time and place. That much could be seen by the naked eye.

But this exterior appearance of His ordinary humanity was a veil hiding something more extraordinary–His glorious divinity. So on Tabor, God pulls back the veil. Moses and Elijah appear. These heroes of old had long since passed out of this world and gone to God. So what does it say about Jesus' identity that they appear on His right and His left?

Jesus' clothes suddenly appear dazzlingly white, "whiter," notes Mark, "than the work of any bleacher could make them." The first reading tells us the significance of this. In a vision, Daniel sees a vision of the "Ancient One." How does He appear? With clothing that is snow bright. Then one like "a Son of Man" comes on the clouds to receive dominion, glory and kingship from the Ancient One.

On Tabor, a cloud comes and overshadows Jesus and a Voice from the Cloud proclaims that this particular Son of Man happens to be the beloved Son. What we have here is what is called a "theophany," a manifestation of God. It is revelation, first of all, of the divinity of Christ. What the Creed says about Him could be viewed as a commentary on this very episode: "God from God, light from light, true God from true God." But it is also a manifestation of the entire Trinity. The cloud that overshadows the apostles is the same one that overshadowed Mary. It is the glorious cloud of the Holy Spirit out of which the Father's voice resounds. Father, Son, Holy Spirit, one God in three persons, prefigured in Daniel's vision, revealed in the Transfiguration.

Suddenly, after a brief prostration, they get up and see only Jesus, looking the way He had always looked. The veil was now back in place. The five senses are wonderful gifts from God. But they are limited nonetheless. Often, we make the mistake of thinking that reality is nothing more than what our senses perceive it to be. So, God gives us occasional mountaintop experiences, glimpses into realities that our senses can't normally detect. Jesus is always divine, regardless of His everyday human appearance. Jesus is always accompanied by saints and angels even when He appears to be alone. It was the entire Trinity who opened the eyes of the man born blind, even though it was only Jesus' hand we could see touching the man's eyes. Faith is remembering such moments of revelation and building our lives upon them. But it's so much easier to forget such things and live according to what everybody can see.



In this third session entitled "The Trial Before Pilate", we will see that while the Sanhedrin have condemned Jesus to death, they do not have the authority to carry out capital punishment; they must work with Pontius Pilate and convince him to crucify Jesus, even though Pilate recognizes that Jesus is innocent. Views on Vocations

A Put Out into the Deep Five Part Series By Tyler Randolph

Who Receives a Vocation?

In our last article, we learned that "vocation" means a calling from God. Now we're going to consider who is on the other end of the line to answer. Guess what? All of our "phones" are ringing! God calls each and every one of us – you, me, your cousin Stan, your Aunt Bev, and your neighbor down the street who you really don't care for.

You're probably thinking now, "What would He be calling me for?" or "I didn't even hear it ring!" We are all called as members of Christ's Body and to be holy. This is our "universal call to holiness." Through the grace imparted to us by our Baptism,

- we are made sharers in God's divine life reread that statement... we SHARE in His life, it is much deeper than a quick read might let on
- we become children of God,
- heirs of salvation,
- sharers in Christ's three-fold mission of priest, prophet, and king.

There is so much that could be unpacked in that long run-on sentence!

The main idea I want to emphasize right now is this – our basic call from God is to be holy. Peter speaks to us in his first letter, "As he who has called you is holy, be holy yourselves in every aspect of your conduct." (1 Peter 1:15) This references Leviticus 11:44 where God says "For I, the LORD, am your God. You shall make and keep yourselves holy, because I am holy."

Holiness can't be thought of as something just for others, it is for us all. It is a journey and certainly not something that will happen overnight. With the help of the grace we receive through the Sacraments (which is our participation in the life of the Church), we can grow in holiness and towards the goal of Christian perfection – the virtue of charity (love). This is a pretty tall order... so let us thank God for his endless love, mercy, and forgiveness!
