



Notes from the Pastor



THE THREE STAGES OF THE SPIRITUAL JOURNEY: FROM THE DESERT TO THE MOUNTAIN

Last Sunday we listened to the story of the Transfiguration of Jesus upon the mountain. Pope Leo the Great said that this event was necessary to help overcome the scandal of the cross for which Jesus would endure. The Divinity of Jesus had to be realized and witnessed in order to desire sharing in such perfection. Peter, who hardly knew how to express himself, wanted to stay and gaze upon the glory of Jesus at expense of never leaving the mountain top. **But that would be too easy**.... For real holiness takes place in the trenches of life while longing for the mountain top.

The spiritual life goes through three stages that prepare us to witness the mountaintop experience as well as prepares us to obtain the admittance to its experience eternally. The three stages are

> Purgative way Illuminative Way Unitive Way

TIME IN THE DESERT

The Desert experience for the Israelites was a way to purge them from their self sufficient desires and count on the providence of God. In turn Jesus goes out into the wilderness (desert) to be tempted by the devil to show us that His Human Nature was subjected to worldly needs and desires. However Jesus did not fall for His focus was on the unity that He shared with the Father and the Holy Spirit through His Divine Nature. Lent calls us, as well, to share the desert experience of the Israelites and Christ himself as well so we can be purged from desiring fulfillment from worldly desires, promises of success and human accolades. Therefore, when we fast and abstain from things that are connected to earthly fulfillment we enter into the purgative way of spirituality. Through this experience we learn how "temptations" cause us to sin and turn our hearts and souls from union with God's divine will. The purgative way leads us to desire God's Mercy and forgiveness to renew our fundamental option of His love. As we say in our <u>Act of Contrition</u>: "I detest all my sins because I dread the loss of Heaven and the pains of Hell; but most of all because they offend Thee, my God, Who art all-good and deserving of all my love." Loving God is our desire and sin stands in the way. The Lenten Discipline of Fasting allows us to prepare and desire the mountain top experience by being connected first to the Human nature of Christ and longing for a share in the Divine.

TIME ON THE MOUNTAIN

"it is good to be here!" Prayer leads us to an experience of the quiet solitude of God's presence. When we separate ourselves from the distractions of daily life and the temptations that hold us fast to the world around us we can really enter into the love of God. This event we call prayer as the apostles experience with Jesus needs neither words nor outward expression... just an "awe and wonder" of His greatness. Being enveloped in the love of God satisfies all our needs. If we were able to ask for anything it would be not to have to leave... and an invitation for our dear ones to share the experience.



This perfect desire and experience of God comes through prayer (time spent in conversation with Him) and is perfected by his Grace. This stage is the unitive way. Our lives resonate with God and the fullness of life is based on eternal life rather than worldly trappings. Union with God in this life is full... it is the peace we seek.

TIME IN THE TRENCHES

The first two Sunday's give us hope that the desert experience will end with the mountain experience but it also reminds us of the daily work of carrying the cross and the building of the kingdom through personal sacrifice is what transforms us to desire more fully and remain on the mountain. This is known as the **Illuminative way**. It is the stage that calls for us to give Alms. One who enters this stage of transformation is enlightened to the sharing of one's Time Talent and Treasure as the work of the fruit already obtained. Alms giving no longer suffice as a sacrificial gift but a sharing of wealth that disposes others to the Kingdom. The Secret of our desire to be closer to God cannot be contained and it spills out into every action word and deed. As Alms are given in the name of Christ and His Church for the poor of spirit as well as poor of nature frees us to be true missionaries. It frees us from a possessive love of God to a self-sacrificing love of Him. Ultimately the illuminative way of giving empties oneself to accept not only the cross of suffering as recognition of the human condition but the vehicle to the perfect union with God that becomes our quest and gift upon our death.

So let us continue on our way in this Lenten journey to desire God above all through the desert, under the weight of the Cross to the mountain of the Resurrection! This transformation through the disciplines of Lent gives us a true share in the Glory of the eternal Kingdom!!

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What are the Scrutinies?

"In order to inspire in the elect a desire for purification and redemption by Christ, three scrutinies are celebrated. By this means, first of all, the elect is instructed gradually about the mystery of sin, from which the whole world and every person longs to be delivered and thus saved from its present and future consequences. Second, their spirit is filled with Christ the Redeemer, who is the living water (gospel of the Samaritan woman in the first scrutiny), the light of the world (gospel of the man born blind in the second scrutiny), the resurrection and the life (gospel of Lazarus in the third scrutiny). From the first to the final scrutiny the elect should progress in their perception of sin and their desire for salvation." CCC130

A Reflection on the First Scrutiny—" The Women at the Well"

A woman came. She is a symbol of the Church not yet made righteous. Righteousness follows from the conversation. She came in ignorance, she found Christ, and he enters into conversation with her. Let us see what it is about, let us see why a Samaritan woman came to draw water. The Samaritans did not form part of the Jewish people: they were foreigners. The fact that she came from a foreign people is part of the symbolic meaning, for she is a symbol of the Church. The Church was to come from the Gentiles, of a different race from the Jews.

We must then recognize ourselves in her words and in her person, and with her give our own thanks to God. She was a symbol, not the reality; she foreshadowed the reality, and the reality came to be. She found faith in Christ, who was using her as a symbol to teach us what was to come. *She came* then *to draw water*. She had simply come to draw water; in the normal way of man or woman.

Jesus says to her: Give me water to drink. For his disciples had gone to the city to buy food. The Samaritan woman: Jews have nothing to do with Samaritans.

The Samaritans were foreigners; Jews never used their utensils. The woman was carrying a pail for drawing water. She was astonished that a Jew should ask her for a drink of water, a thing that Jews would not do. But the one who was asking for a drink of water was thirsting for her faith.

Listen now and learn who it is that asks for a drink. Jesus answered her and said: If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, "Give me a drink," perhaps you might have asked him and he would have given you living water.

He asks for a drink, and he promises a drink. He is in need, as one hoping to receive, yet he is rich, as one about to satisfy the thirst of others. He says: *If you knew the gift of God*. The gift of God is the Holy Spirit. But he is still using veiled language as he speaks to the woman and gradually enters into her heart. Or is he already teaching her? What could be more gentle and kind than the encouragement he gives? *If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, "Give me a drink," perhaps you might ask and he would give you living water.*

What is this water that he will give if not the water spoken of in Scripture: *With you is the fountain of life*? How can those feel thirst who *will drink deeply from the abundance in your house*?



He was promising the Holy Spirit in satisfying abundance. She did not yet understand. In her failure to grasp his meaning, what was her reply? *The woman says to him: Master, give me this drink, so that I may feel no thirst or come here to draw water.* Her need forced her to this labor, her weakness shrank from it. If only she could hear those words: *Come to me, all who labor and are burdened, and I will refresh you.* Jesus was saying this to her, so that her labors might be at an end; but she was not yet able to understand. (Saint Augustine)

"To make Heaven your planned and desired final destination rather than an acceptable detour at death."

Pray to experience God in all His glory. To sit and listen to Him.... To experience the peace of heaven. Fast from temporal things not in reciprocation but in preparation when these things are taken from you. Give Alms in the spirit of knowing that all has been won for you in the Resurrection.

Particular Christian Vocations

Last time, we learned that we all have a calling from God, a vocation, to be holy. Now let us take this a step further and expand our definition. A vocation is a calling from God to a way of life - of how we are meant to serve him in the world. Since we are all "universally" called to holiness, it only makes sense that each of us then would be called to take the next step: to discern a particular call to serve God and others. God calls each one of us to a particular Christian vocation be it Priesthood, Married Life, Religious Life or Single Life.


Priesthood is probably the first thing you think of when the word "vocation" is mentioned. The vocation to the priesthood gets a lot of attention because, let's face reality, we need priests! For the Church to continue and for the Sacraments to be readily available to the faithful, we need those who are willing to answer the call to the priesthood.

Married life is the most common vocation. Through marriage the husband and wife serve one another out of love, and serve the Church through the raising of children in the Church.

Religious life, joining a religious order as a monk, nun, or sister serves the Church through the charism of their particular religious order.

Single life is a vocation as well, as single people many times may have more freedom and opportunities in serving the Church in various ways.

However, each path to holiness is valid and important. It should not be thought that one way would be better than the others! Now that we know what these particular Christian vocations are, we will next examine how they can be found.


VOCATIONS PRAYER

SECOND READING

Romans 5:1-2, 5-8

Brothers and sisters: Since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith to this grace in which we stand, and we boast in hope of the glory of God. And hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us. For Christ, while we were still helpless, died at the appointed time for the ungodly. Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us.

Gospel Reading

John 4:5-15, 19b-26, 39a, 40-42

Jesus came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there. Jesus, tired from his journey, sat down there at the well. It was about noon. A woman of Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" -For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.— Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink, ' you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir, you do not even have a bucket and the cistern is deep; where then can you get this living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us this cistern and drank from it himself with his children and his flocks?" Jesus answered and said to her, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water. "I can see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain: but you people say that the place to worship is in Jerusalem." Jesus said to her, "Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You people worship what you do not understand; we worship what we understand, because salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth; and indeed the Father seeks such people to worship him. God is Spirit, and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and truth." The woman said to him, "I know that the Messiah is coming, the one called the Christ; when he comes, he will tell us everything." Jesus said to her, "I am he, the one who is speaking with you." Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in him. When the Samaritans came to him, they invited him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. Many more began to believe in him because of his word, and they said to the woman, "We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world.'


