ASCENSION THURSDAY - HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION



Today our Lord Jesus Christ ascended into heaven; let our hearts ascend with him. Listen to the words of the Apostle: *If you have risen with Christ, set your hearts on the things that are above where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God; seek the things that are above, not the things that are on earth.* For just as he remained with us even after his ascension, so we too are already in heaven with him, even though what is promised us has not yet been fulfilled in our bodies.

Christ is now exalted above the heavens, but he still suffers on earth all the pain that we, the members of his body, have to bear. He showed this when he cried out from above: *Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?* and when he said: *I was hungry and you gave me food.*

Why do we on earth not strive to find rest with him in heaven even now, through the faith, hope and love that unites us to him? While in heaven he is also with us; and we while on earth are with him. He is here with us by his divinity, his power and his love. We cannot be in heaven, as he is on earth, by divinity, but in him, we can be there by love.

He did not leave heaven when he came down to us; nor did he withdraw from us when he went up again into heaven. The fact that he was in heaven even while he was on earth is borne out by his own statement: *No one has ever ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man, who is in heaven.*

These words are explained by our oneness with Christ, for he is our head and we are his body. No one ascended into heaven except Christ because we also are Christ: he is the Son of Man by his union with us, and we by our union with him are the sons of God. So the Apostle says: *Just as the human body, which has many members, is a unity, because all the different members make one body, so is it also with Christ.* He too has many members, but one body.

Out of compassion for us he descended from heaven, and although he ascended alone, we also ascend, because we are in him by grace. Thus, no one but Christ descended and no one but Christ ascended; not because there is no distinction between the head and the body, but because the body as a unity cannot be separated from the head.

THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD - "The Rest of the Story"

Every fairy tale begins with, "Once upon a time" and ends with, "...and they lived happily ever after". No matter how many disastrous situations or evil characters appear to be in the course of the tale, the beginning is read with hope and the end celebrates triumph. But the end is not the end, for "they" live happily ever after. The rest of the story is left to the imagination of the reader. Fairy tales are bed time favorites, for a child can drift off to sleep and allow his/her dreams finish the rest of the story.

The Gospel is a fairy tale come true. It begins Once upon a time in the small town of Bethlehem, and ends wit the ascension of Jesus into Heaven leaving the Apostles with the promise of the Holy Spirit.... And they lived happily ever after... and longer...

The Ascension is a reminder that Jesus fulfilled his mission of revealing the love of the Father through His words, deeds and His death. The Ascension leaves His believers in awe of all that took place, and the promise of living happily ever after. Hope is given and triumph won!!

What about the rest of the story?

The rest of the story is still being told, **not** in sleepy children's dreams, but by all who have been carried away in the mystery of Christ through Baptism. The rest of the story is our lives in the Spirit, and the hope of sharing with Christ is eternity. The rest of the story is a happily ever after and beyond life itself.

A time for prayer and reflection

We celebrate the Ascension as a Holy Day of Obligation to highlight the significant event of Jesus returning to the Father to take His place in Glory. The Ascension is seen not as abandonment, but necessary for the final chapter to begin. So on the Feast of the Ascension we begin a ten day prayer vigil, like the apostles, awaiting the Gifts of the Holy Spirit, which will guide us through the Church, writing with our lives the rest of the story....

Happily ever after....

That is how people of faith live awaiting the Kingdom ... In joyful hope for the coming of Jesus Christ!

SUNDAY MASS: EARLY CHRISTIANS TOOK IT SERIOUSLY TOO!

Phrases such as **"Do this in Memory of Me**" and **"Go and Teach All Nations**" are more than punch lines and Motto's for those who desire to imitate Christ, they become the very lives that we lead. Sunday Mass incorporates both of these notions in the liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. We can not teach if we are not informed of the Truth and we can not serve if we have not been feed. Find below to ancient writings that describe the essence of these liturgies and the already formed truths for which the contain.

Preaching Truth - St. Irenaeus

The Church, which has spread everywhere, even to the ends of the earth, received the faith from the apostles and their disciples. By faith, we believe in one God, the almighty Father *who made heaven and earth and the sea and all that is in them.* We believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who became man for our salvation. And we believe in the Holy Spirit who through the prophets foretold God's plan: the coming of our beloved Lord Jesus Christ, his birth from the Virgin, his passion, his resurrection from the dead, his ascension into heaven, and his final coming from heaven in the glory of his Father, to *recapitulate all things* and to raise all men from the dead, so that, by the decree of his invisible Father, he may make a just judgment in all things and so that *every knee should bow in heaven and on earth and under the earth* to Jesus Christ our Lord and our God, our Saviour and our King, and *every tongue confess him.*



The Church, spread throughout the whole world, received this preaching and this faith and now

preserves it carefully, dwelling as it were in one house. Having one soul and one heart, the Church holds this faith, preaches and teaches it consistently as though by a single voice. For though there are different languages, there is but one tradition.

The faith and the tradition of the churches founded in Germany are no different from those founded among the Spanish and the Celts, in the East, in Egypt, in Libya and elsewhere in the Mediterranean world. Just as God's creature, the sun, is one and the same the world over, so also does the Church's preaching shine everywhere to enlighten all men who want to come to a knowledge of the truth.

None of those who speak with authority in the churches, no preacher however forceful will utter anything different – for no one is above the Master – nor will a less forceful preacher diminish what has been handed down. Since our faith is everywhere the same, no one who can say more augments it, nor can anyone who says less diminish it.

The Holy Eucharist - Justin the Martyr

No one may share the Eucharist with us unless he believes that what we teach is true, unless he is washed in the regenerating waters of baptism for the remission of his sins, and unless he lives in accordance with the principles given us by Christ.



We do not consume the eucharistic bread and wine as if it were ordinary food and drink, for we have been taught that as Jesus Christ our Savior became a man of flesh and blood by the power of the Word of God, so also the food that our flesh and blood assimilates for its nourishment becomes the flesh and blood of the incarnate Jesus by the power of his own words contained in the prayer of thanksgiving.

The apostles, in their recollections, which are called gospels, handed down to us what Jesus commanded them to do. They tell us that he took bread, gave thanks and said: *Do this in memory of me. This is my body*. In the same way he took the cup, he gave thanks and said: *This is my blood*. The Lord gave this command to them alone. Ever since then we have constantly reminded one another of these things. The rich among us help the poor and we are always united. For all that we receive we praise the Creator of the universe through his Son Jesus Christ and through the Holy Spirit.

On Sunday we have a common assembly of all our members, whether they live in the city or the outlying districts. The recollections of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read, as long as there is time. When the reader has finished, the president of the assembly speaks to us; he urges everyone to imitate the examples of virtue we have heard in the readings. Then we all stand up together and pray.

On the conclusion of our prayer, bread and wine and water are brought forward. The president offers prayers and gives thanks to the best of his ability, and the people give assent by saying, "Amen." The Eucharist is distributed, everyone present communicates, and the deacons take it to those who are absent.

The wealthy, if they wish, may make a contribution, and they themselves decide the amount. The collection is placed in the custody of the president, who uses it to help the orphans and widows and all who for any reason are in distress, whether because they are sick, in prison, or away from home. In a word, he takes care of all who are in need.

We hold our common assembly on Sunday because it is the first day of the week, the day on which God put darkness and chaos to flight and created the world, and because on that same day our Saviour Jesus Christ rose from the dead. For he was crucified on Friday and on Sunday he appeared to his apostles and disciples and taught them the things that we have passed on for your consideration.

Creed




