

FAREWELL AND THANK YOU FATHER RONIEL

Before Father Alvin, our first missionary priest from the Philippines, I knew very little about the islands and the incredible devoted Catholic priest who served their land. Father Alvin was with us but a short period of time but long enough to help us understand that the bishops and priest of the Philippines were dedicated to missionary work and service in the United States and particularly in the Diocese of Greensburg. We have been blessed with many who have come to serve but our parishes were extremely blessed to have encountered the Filipino missionary par excellence: Father Roniel Duenas! He came to us with nothing more than the will to serve Christ in our land in obedience to his Bishop. He did not have any idea what he would encounter here nor what to expect as an assignment and ministry. All he knew was that he had committed to five years of his priestly life, away from his family and homeland, to serve a diocese which was lacking priestly ministry.

When one first met Father Roniel, and thought that he had any concerns or fears, that was erased with the every present smile and joyful love of celebrating Mass! Well educated and brilliantly gifted Father Roniel renewed my priestly spirit as a companion on a journey as disciples of Christ. *Jesus wisely sent His disciples two by two on their first missionary journey*

so the share talents, love and zeal would be enough to sustain them in the challenge of spreading the Gospel message. Being paired with Father Roniel to serve my new community of Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton and to continue to grow my priestly ministry at Immaculate Conception was a gift from heaven. If I would have been tasked to try and minister two parishes equally on my own, or with a visiting weekend priest, I would have failed miserably. Father Roniel's endearing spirit and pastoral love gave you, the parishioners, two pastors and the attention of two priest to accomplish the sacramental tasks as well as the personal touch of the priestly care and love. This is a unique experience in the Church today. I am so blessed to have shared my two wonderful parishes with someone who came to love them as much as me. Co-pastors.... YES shared mission... two by two we were sent into the wonderful field of "our" parishes! Side by side we grew in love of our priesthood and to experience the heart of Christ in each other of servants to the Father's Will!

FIRST DAY: SAME AS LAST! - Father Roniel's first two weekends happened to be at the same time as both parishes summer picnic. What a great way for him to greet his new parishioners! He took time to shake hands, learn names, have a beer with the guys and sit at table with families. It was seamless for his smile put everyone at ease and brought a true joy to their hearts. The culture was so different and the many challenges of living the life of the priest was eased first by the loving staffs of the parishes that was equaled in the charity shown by parishioners who were quick to try to meet his new American needs. I remembered how easy Father embraced the American cuisine (if you can call it that) by willingly accepting invitations to family home cooked meals, restaurants as well as the many dinners and treats dropped off at the office for him to taste and eat in his apartment.



I remember his first winter and the many concerned parishioners who bought winter jackets, gloves, sweat pants, hats and boots for him. "If we are cold", they would tell me, "I can not imagine how cold Father Roniel must be!!!!" The culture differences were easy to overcome for him for so many shared their stories and backgrounds that gave him an authentic appreciation of the people he was to serve. So five years later Father is making his final rounds to homes, restaurants, pizza joints and Kerber's to take in the last taste of America's finest foods! He will also be greeting those he came to love for last time. Yes I am sure that he will "try" to do so with a smile on his face but tears will fill his eyes with the sadness of departure. But that is what loves does... it opens our hearts and makes them always long for more days...Days we know now we will share in heaven.

Global Challenge: Ministering during the Pandemic

The year 2020 was going to be our best year for our two parishes for we began the Campaign: "With 20/20 vision we will follow the Lord." Funny glasses were given out to all parishioners as a reminder of what our focus would be through Liturgy and special programing. A chance to grow closer to the Lord. Little did I know that 20/20 vision in 2020 would become a true necessity for us to "stay safe to the Lord!" March 15, 2020 saw the shutdown of our country and most significantly our churches. Father Roniel was now experiencing a pastoral nightmare with being quarantined, in essence from the people of God! We began OSM: "Operation Safe Mode" and started to share videos of Sunday Masses through the life of the pandemic. This meant complete dedication to filming and producing the Sacred Liturgies for each Sunday and especially the Sacred Liturgies for Holy Week and Easter.



It was at this time, while I was taking to YouTube, Father Roniel began to share his DAILY reflections based on the lectionary for Sacred Mass. Without fault he wrote beautiful reflections and posted them for all to read. It was an amazing commitment on his part but it made us all the more grow in our knowledge of his love of Christ, his priesthood and the people of our community. I think many have forgotten how we came to know him so deeply but it was these reflections that kept him relevant and growing in our hearts as a pastor. I would read the reflections and often say out loud to myself: WOW! Then of course praise God that I was not alone in this dark- dark time of Church History.

Father Roniel grew in our hearts and spiritual lives during the pandemic and he never left us abandoned for he continued these reflections till the present day. The pandemic was spiritually eased by his writings and true desire to keep us focused.... With 20/20 vision if you will!!!

Personal Challenge: Cancer and physical challenge of Priesthood

In July of 2021 when the pandemic was barely in the rear view mirror I was diagnosed with stage 4 pancreatic cancer. Of course this would become the greatest spiritual and physical challenge of my life and priesthood. Everyone prayed and prayed and of course we know the blessings that were bestowed on me month after month for over two years of treatment. During this time Father Roniel became my greatest priestly friend that I have ever had and he will, in my heart, hold that title till the day we meet in heaven! His overwhelming leadership of our communities in prayer and holiness was paramount. Every other Friday I had treatment and the following day (Saturday) were the most horrendous of days for me physically because of the chemo. I chose to offer the 4:00 PM Mass so that as soon as I was finished I could rest for the next day. For the first three months Father Roniel would come to the sacristy to make sure I was "okay" to celebrate Mass. His pastoral concern for both my spiritual and physical health was like none I had ever experienced via a brother priest in my Life! Just his presence gave me strength to fight through the worst days as an offering of Thanksgiving for the gift of priesthood. How many mornings Father Roniel



offered two morning Masses while I was in treatment? How many funerals, baptisms and home visits he made on behalf of two priests? Nothing was too much for him and he never once complained but joined me in my journey like Simon did Christ with the cross!

Now We Bid Farewell - The stories, the smiles, the teachings, the great jokes and the Christ-like presence will never be forgotten but truly missed. I am sure that Father Roniel's time in the United States taught him much about our first-world culture saturated with its self-inflicted privileges and the glutton of wealth and comfort that he could have never imagined! But what he really learned was that the culture, rich or poor suffer and rejoice in the same spiritual trials and victories. He found a people, namely us, who live more for Christ than for the world we are subjected to by our culture. He learned that loving us as a priest is what would deepen our commitment to Christ and His Church. What he will take home with him, besides the memories and the taste of American life, will be the love of thousands that cannot imagine how we could ever thank him for coming into our lives and leading us more devotedly in our Faith and our commitment to the Church on earth as we strive for the heavenly kingdom. He has been changed and we have been changed through this experience. Changed like the apostles who learned that Christ promised to "be with us always" was fulfilled in this simple exchange of life and culture that is now forever engrained into our souls! We Praise you O Lord for the gift of

these five years shared in Faith!

We are eternally grateful for the gift you shared with us as we return him to you to continue his ministry with newfound love and understanding from his time with us here in Western Pennsylvania! 
