Uniqueness of the Christ-event in the **Pluralistic America**

Dear Friends,

You are very fortunate to live in a pluralistic context. God is the source of plurality. Plurality arises from self-emptying and is understood only through self-emptying. Our humanity unfolds as plurality within history. In love we transcend towards the Others as the Others, but only by reaching out to the others as others. This pluralistic approach is intrinsic to the Christ-event.

We are Christians and not Biblians. We did not have a Bible till the 16th century. The community of believers, journeying in history are the primary 'custodians' of the Christ-event, not a book. Within the Bible there is unity and diversity. The four Gospels are pluralistic, so different from each other.

A Pluralistic Community, only a deeply pluralistic Church, can dialogue with plurality. . Mass is a pluralistic worship, Jesus invites all to His meal. The Church is needed there where others do not come. Jesus walked out of the walled compound, and faced a very mixed crowd, truly an international gathering. He was "filled with new wine". Mission within a pluralistic context is possible when we walk out of our closed room; when we get out of our walled compound. True contemplatives are comfortable with the differences that constitute plurality. Hence, without contemplation and the freedom it brings there can be no mission, especially in America. It is for this reason that "the Christian of the future will be a mystic or he will not exist at all." The future of our parish community could be at stake if it does not become pluralistic (people of all nationalities & age groups).





NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"I am the living bread come down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever." Three astonishing claims in one sentence. First: Jesus announces that He came from Heaven. Second: He says that He is bread for people to eat. Third: He promises eternal life to anyone who eats this bread. What a lineup! What



tremendous faith He expected of these people to believe such radical statements.

First, He wants them to believe that He was sent by God the Father. He wants them to believe that He is one with God. If we ever struggle to believe this, just imagine how much harder it must have been for these folks who knew Him as a normal guy: "Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph? Do we not know His father and mother? Then how can He say, 'I have come down from Heaven'?" We have the benefit of Scripture, the tradition of the Church, thousands of years of Christian witness, and the Sacraments to convince us of who Jesus is. They didn't.

Next, He does all this talking about bread. He refers to the miraculous manna--bread that fed the wandering Jews in the desert--and then claims that He is the new manna. He is the true bread; His flesh, in fact, is this bread. His body will become food. Again, we have the whole history of Eucharistic faith, devotion, and miracles to rely on. They didn't.

Finally, He goes so far as to say that in receiving Him as bread, we will live forever. He promises that this intimate union with Him through Communion brings with it the gift of eternal life. Yes, these three claims work together: Jesus is God. The bread of Communion is God. And this God we receive is the source of eternal life.

FAMILY PERSPECTIVES...

Listen to Jesus in today's Gospel: "Stop murmuring among yourselves!" What good does it do? Similarly, Pope Francis invites us to encounter each other with reverence the way Jesus did. If we have a concern, state it honestly, clearly, with affection and at the appropriate time. Constant complaining becomes nagging. We might momentarily feel better, but others could become bitter.
