Pastor's Letter

Today, Sunday, January 7th, is observed as the Solemnity of the Epiphany of Our Lord Jesus Christ. For us, as members of Christ **Our Light** Parish, this is our parish feast day.

We observe this day as our feast day because of the emphasis on the Magi being drawn to visit Jesus by the light of a brilliant star.

We are rarely able to appreciate the night sky now because of all the light pollution when we try to see the stars at night. But, at the time of the birth of Jesus when the visible night sky was usually almost completely filled with stars, it usually took an exceptionally bright star to catch people's attention. And when there was such a star, people became curious about what the star might mean. Furthermore, celestial events were something that everyone could see and, therefore, was considered to be a kind of public announcement for people near and far.

We believe that God likes to surprise us in how he communicates to us, helping to get our attention when it's needed most. A brilliant star in the night sky was one of the ways God has proclaimed to us that Jesus is the Messiah – and therefore the light – for all people. In the Gospel of Matthew, the Magi represent people of all nations being drawn to the saving events happening in Israel. So, this week we celebrate that Jesus Christ, Our Light, is also drawing us to eternal salvation.

And, again, Happy New Year to all, and welcome back to many who have been traveling over the holiday season or who have been affected by the especially cold temperatures over these past couple of weeks. May this be a blessed new year for all of us.

Please keep in prayer all who will be participating in the ChristLife sessions over these next seven weeks. They are an approach to personal and parish renewal that has been effective for many parishes and individuals throughout the country who have participated in it. And, we are one of seven parishes that are "pilot parishes" for the Diocese as a whole. This is also something that is meant to be repeated in future years, so if you are not able to participate this year, look for it to be offered again next year, perhaps on a different day or time of the week.

May the Lord help us all to journey together both grateful for the gift of life in Jesus Christ and always ready for the gift of eternal life.

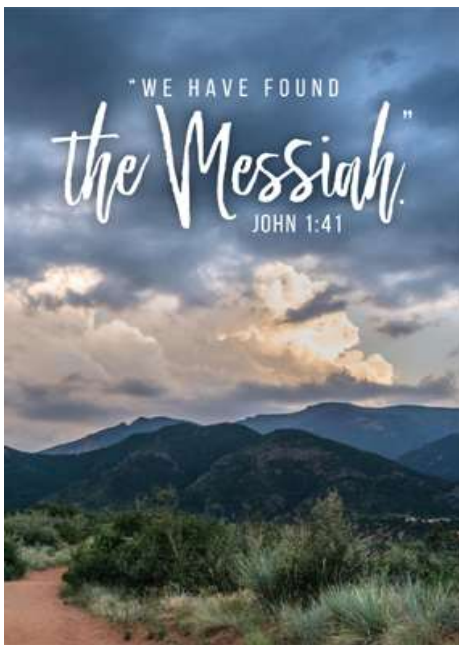
READING FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

January 14, 2018

The call to discipleship is not always easy, for we are often distracted by the allurements of this passing world. The Lord, however, is persistent in calling us. To better prepare ourselves to enter into these sacred mysteries, let us place ourselves in the presence of the Lord.

Our readings for the Second Sunday focus on “call and response.” The emphasis in the call of Samuel is on listening: “Speak to me, God. I am listening.” Samuel is called to be a prophet—one who must constantly listen to God in order to truly speak for God. The emphasis in the gospel is on seeing, “come and see.” To “see” means more than to view with the physical eye. Biblically it means “perceiving with the eyes of faith.” The disciples must “see” that Jesus is the Messiah and follow him in faith. Samuel hears and responds. The disciples drop everything to “come and see.”

Our prayer response draws us personally into the theme: • You ask me to listen. • Here I am; I come to do your will.



The prophet/disciple has only one goal—to proclaim and live the will of God. The theme of “call and respond” will continue through the Fifth Sunday of Ordinary Time and will recur throughout this season which presents the public life and ministry of Jesus.

1 Samuel 3:3-10, 19

Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.

- Do I set aside time to pray and “listen” to the Lord or am I so busy I never hear him?

1 Corinthians 6:13-15, 17-20

Your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit.

- How do I respect my body and others as temples of the Holy Spirit?

John 1:35-42

They saw where Jesus was staying, and they stayed with him.

- When do I most feel that I am in the presence of the Lord? What might I do to make his presence more of a reality in my life?

We begin this new year of Ordinary Time Sundays next week near the beginning of the Gospel of John. This year we will often alternate between the Gospel of Mark and the Gospel of John for our Sunday Mass readings.

St. John the Baptist makes a statement that we echo at every Mass. “As he watched Jesus walk by, he said, ‘Behold, the Lamb of God.’” Do you remember different aspects of Jesus’ birth that we recalled during the Christmas season that could help us appreciate this statement? The key point related to this passage is that evidently the flocks of sheep raised near and around Bethlehem were some of the special “spotless lambs” that were raised for sacrificial offerings in the Temple in nearby Jerusalem. Where was Jesus born? Was he born

in a royal palace or even in a comfortable inn? No, he was born in a stable in the midst of those spotless sacrificial lambs. And so, Jesus’ birth foreshadowed both John the Baptist’s statement today identifying Jesus as the ultimate spotless lamb, “the Lamb of God,” and Jesus’ death at the hour of sacrifice near the Temple in Jerusalem on Good Friday. He is the Lamb of God “who takes away the sins of the world.” We can turn to Him for His mercy in our lives!

In addition to connections with Christmas and Jesus’ birth, today’s readings also point us forward as Jesus begins to gather and form his disciples and to form the Church. John the Baptist had prepared them with his baptism of repentance. Jesus begins now to prepare them for the eventual baptism in the Holy Spirit.

One of two dimensions of the experience of the first Christian disciples – dimensions that are also reflected in the Old Testament reading from the First Book of Samuel – is that when they were called by Jesus to become his disciples, it was a very personal invitation. Jesus offered them to stay with him and experience life with him first-hand. They were also called by name. This happened to St. Paul, too, when he first experienced Jesus even after Jesus' Resurrection and Ascension.

The second dimension is that the Lord usually then transforms us so that we see ourselves as a new person in Him. This is symbolized by Simon receiving the new name of Peter (a.k.a. "Rocky") and Saul taking the name Paul (a.k.a. "humble one"). St. Paul says in today's second reading that as this transformation is happening our very bodies become truly sacred. We become temples of the Holy Spirit. Both St. Peter and St. Paul experienced the presence of the Holy Spirit causing a deepening and strengthening of the courageous gift of humility within them. Instead of becoming puffed up and "holier-than-thou" about being a temple of the Holy Spirit, they gratefully experienced it as a gift, enabling them to be more generous with their time and with their lives than ever before.

May the Lord help us to experience these dimensions of being a Christian: a) God's profound and personal love for each of us individually and b) the transforming presence of the Holy Spirit enabling us to be ever more generous and courageous.
