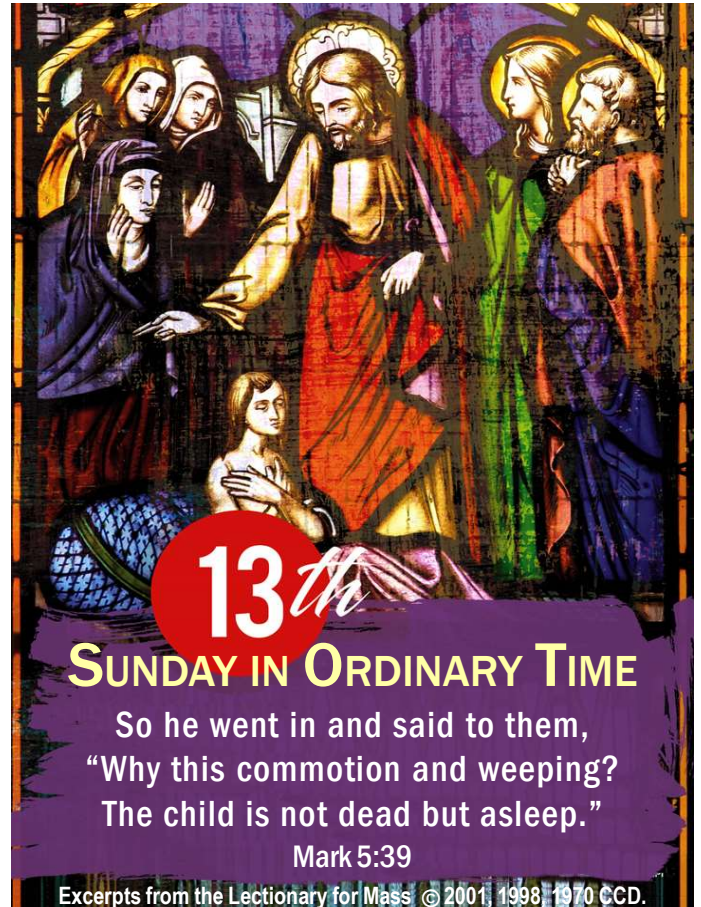
RELIGIOUS EDUCATION: Parish School of Religion (PSR) classes for children in grades K through 12 are held Sunday mornings from September to May.

Pastor's Letter

Please note that this week only, because this Wednesday is the 4th of July, we will not have our usual all-day Eucharistic Adoration. And, because of that, we will not have our community Evening Prayer and Benediction at 4:30 p.m. either. We will have daily Masses at the usual time on Wednesday and Thursday: 7:00 and 8:35 a.m.

Please note also that our high school Bible study group is also planning to meet on Wednesday morning, July 4th, at about 9:15 a.m. May the Lord continue to bless them as they explore the foundations of our faith and relationship with the Lord.

I would like to follow up on and reinforce our weekly all-day Eucharistic Adoration. Many parishioners have found this to be a great way to enter into some quiet personal prayer time with a sense of being very close to our Lord. Some people find it difficult to sit in a larger church building on their own but a smaller chapel, like our Eucharistic Adoration chapel, can provide a setting for, again, being closer to our Lord. Even if you haven't signed up to be a regular "adorer" for a specific hour each week (and we can always have additional people for that, including those who could be substitutes when our regular adorers are away), feel free to visit the chapel for a block of time that suits you. Some people stop by for 10-15 minutes during lunch break or after work. Others might stop by for longer blocks of prayer time.

Thank you to the family of John Skeslock, who made it possible for the renovation of our former office space

into this chapel. It's located through the back porch entrance to the Rectory and is open for Eucharistic Adoration each Wednesday from about 9:00 a.m. (after the 8:35 a.m. Mass) until 9:00 p.m.

Also, if you haven't participated in Evening Prayer and Benediction, feel free to join our small group of 8-15 people who do so most Wednesday evenings at 4:30 p.m. This prayer service consists of an opening hymn, praying a couple of Psalms and a New Testament canticle, followed by a brief Scripture passage and some prayers of intercession. Then, when Evening Prayer (as known as "Vespers") concludes we offer prayers of adoration together followed by a blessing with the Monstrance (the vessel for holding the Blessed Sacrament). It is a great way to experience a personal blessing from our Lord Jesus.

Please continue to keep Jeremiah Hahn in prayer as he is now in the midst of his 30-day retreat. St. Ignatius of Loyola, who lived in the 1500s, developed a very effective format for retreats and this is what he is participating in now. I was blessed to participate in a 30-day retreat in the spring of my final year of seminary. It was a tremendous way to prepare for priestly ordination and ministry by very closely praying through the life of Jesus and being vividly close to him in those focused times of prayer. Jeremiah will surely be blessed by this experience, but keep him in prayer because it can take a while to enter more deeply into this retreat because of the many distractions we all have from daily life.

May the Lord help us to serve and witness together, alive in Him, always ready for the gift of eternal life.

READINGS FOR THE 14TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

July 8, 2018

It is our gift of faith that enables us to acknowledge Jesus as Lord and Savior. As we gather as God's holy people, let us turn to the Lord seeking mercy for the times we have failed to trust in the goodness of the Lord.

The focus of the readings is the rejection of God's messengers and ultimately of God's message.

In the reading from **Ezekiel**, God warned at the outset that the Prophet, and his message, may be rejected because "they are stubborn and rebellious people." But he is not to change the message. When Ezekiel proclaims God's message faithfully, whether it is accepted or not, they will know that he is truly a prophet. That is the sin God has warned against—they know he is a prophet, yet they will not listen.

Jesus is rejected apparently because he is too common, too well known among his neighbors, to be a spokesperson for God. Note that this comes after a series of manifestations of the divine authority in Jesus—over evil spirits, over sin, over wind and water, and even over death.

Ultimately, Mark tells us, miracles are not enough—we must believe in the person of Jesus. We are moving toward the question of faith for Mark—the question Jesus asked at Caesarea Philippi— "Who do you say that I am?"

Ezekiel 2:2-5

Son of man, I am sending you to the Israelites, rebels who have rebelled against me.

- How have you "rebelled against God"?

2 Corinthians 12:7-10

I will rather boast most gladly of my weaknesses, in order that the power of Christ may dwell with me.

- How aware are you of the power of Christ dwelling in you, despite your weakness?

Mark 6:1-6

A prophet is not without honor except in his native place.

- Who is the unlikely person who is making the message of Christ known in your life or our times?

Our Sunday Readings from Week 11 (June 17th) through Week 16 (July 22nd)

have a couple of themes that recur. The Gospel readings that are the basis for these themes are from Mark, chapters 4 through 6. We read in these passages themes of faith that is small but growing, and that the result of putting this faith into action is growth of the Kingdom of God.

Next Sunday, July 8th – Week 14, we read of a lack of faith that people had in Jesus, especially the people of Nazareth, where he had grown up. The people thought that they already knew everything about Jesus. Surely, they thought, **he** couldn't be the Messiah. They even referred to him as the "son of Mary," which had more of a negative connotation than if they had referred to him as the son of Joseph, because of her unusual pregnancy. In their eyes his background was more negative than blessed. Surely, they thought, he couldn't be graced by God the Father with miraculous powers or the authority to teach as boldly as he did.

Furthermore, it's not that the people of that region weren't devout Jewish people. In fact, biblical archeologists have reportedly noticed that there are very few, if any, amulets of other gods of that region. At various other dig sites of that era, amulets of various regional gods were often found either on human or other remains. By contrast, the people of Nazareth were a devout people. They lived on top of a hill away from the contamination of the pagan and Roman cities around them. That might have contributed to why they were so cautious about recognizing Jesus as a rabbi or a healer. By being cautious they were at least subjecting Jesus to the kind of testing that most new rabbis had to face.

Regarding the names of people who are identified as Jesus' "brothers and sisters," they are identified later in this same Gospel of Mark as the children of another Mary. We read in Mark 15:40 that at the crucifixion of Jesus "there were also women looking on from a distance. Among them were Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of the younger James and of Joses, and Salome." The term for brothers and sisters in this passage in Mark 6 can also be used to refer to cousins.

Jesus ultimately grew up in very blessed family circumstances that were both very humbling and very mysterious, in the best sense of those words. He grew up in a small, devout town. But God wanted even the people of that devout town to be surprised by His merciful plan, surprising them that Jesus, who they thought they knew through and through, was actually the Messiah, growing up quietly in their midst.

May the Lord help our own faith to grow ever stronger and ever more open to the surprises God has for us in and through Jesus Christ and, therefore, see the Kingdom of God growing in our midst as well.
