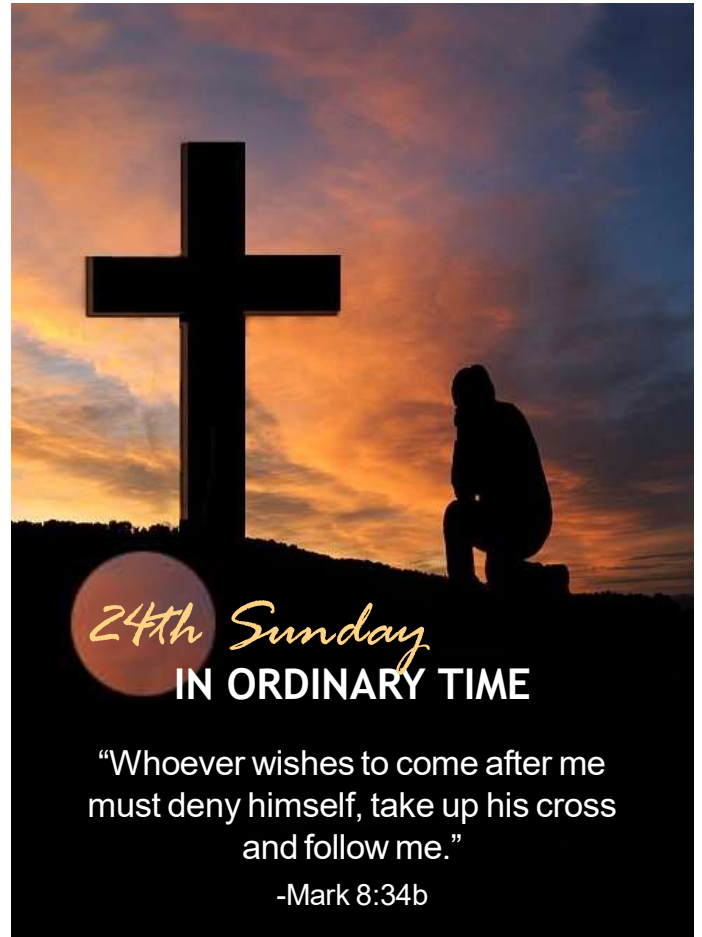

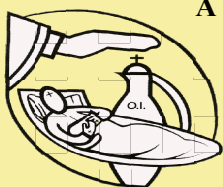

READINGS FOR THE 25TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

September 23, 2018

The readings confront our desire to be first, the best, the most important. The way of Jesus is to make ourselves last. St. James asks, “Where do wars and conflicts among you come from?” Let us prepare ourselves to hear his answer, and to ask God for the grace to live what we hear.

The readings focus on the attitude Christians have toward each other. Christians, living by God’s wisdom rather than earthly values, treat one another with respect and love.

The reading from James gives us a list of virtues to be found among those who live by wisdom. It also describes life without those virtues—when people are jealous and think only of themselves, it leads only to fights and arguments.

The gospel passage gives us an example of this among the disciples. Jesus is quick to correct them. “If you want to be among the most important...

you must serve all other people.” Our faith in Christ should make a difference in the way we treat others. Jesus presents a little child as a model for this simplicity and humility.

Wisdom 2:12, 17-20

The wicked persecute the just one.

- When have you experienced being unjustly accused of something? How did you respond?

James 3:16-4:3

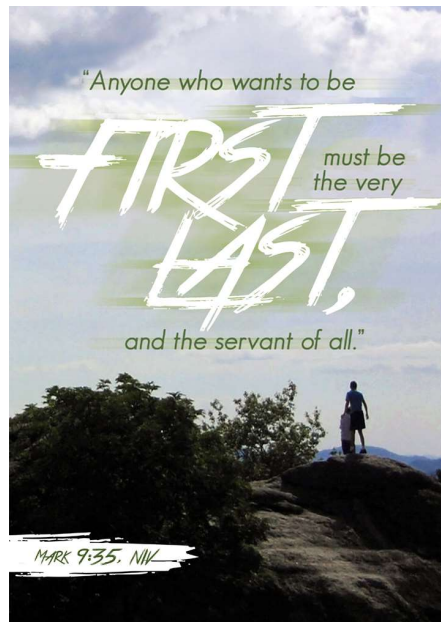
Where do conflicts come from?

- What do you think are the causes of the upheavals in our world today?

Mark 9:30-37

Jesus speaks of his death while his disciples vie for first place.

- How do you respond to people who are self-seekers? Does our world reflect a care for all peoples or are we more interested in being “number one”?



As Jesus continues to provide “discipleship training” both to us and to his disciples in the Gospels of these next two weeks, he invites us to explore a couple of the surprising realities of Christian Gospel living.

This week, at the Masses for the 24th Sunday of Ordinary Time, Year B, Jesus teaches us that, “Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me.” How surprising to discover that, “whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and that of the gospel will save it.” Isn’t that so contrary to the way we live our lives in society today?

Among the philosophies of our day and time that seem to be contrary to Jesus’ teaching about taking up our cross is the “Self-Interest Theory.” That theory posits that it is better to organize a society and its laws by supporting the individual’s pursuit of whatever he or she thinks is best for his or her own personal well-being. Unfortunately, with this approach the weakest in a society tend to be left behind. Individual rights of the weak are to be safeguarded,

of course, but the focus on the individual supersedes in many ways the needs of the community.

For us as Catholic Christians we find that when we put into practice Jesus’ teaching on taking up our cross – when we make others’ interests and needs the source of our motivation and decision-making, though it is typically more difficult to live this way – we often find how true Jesus’ teaching really is.

Next week’s Gospel reinforces this way-of-the-cross lifestyle. If we wish to be considered as great in the Kingdom of God, we need to have a last-of-all and servant-of-all mentality. This challenges even our typical way of thinking about God. We don’t often think about God as being humble! We usually think about “fear of God” – which Psalm 110 describes as the first stage of wisdom – as meaning only a cowering in front of a God who does not like us. We can displease God, to be sure. But the fear of the Lord can also be described as *the sobering awe our hearts have in the presence of pure goodness*.

Furthermore, throughout the Bible, God consistently takes delight in surprising us by how merciful he is. See Psalm 103, Luke 15 (especially verses 7, 10, 20, 24, 31 and 32), and Romans 5:6-12 as examples of this.

May the Lord bless us with more abundant experiences of His pure goodness, even if it surprises us by being manifest in the “weakness” of mercy!



How do you become Catholic?

We Catholics are blessed by those who ask to learn what it means to be Catholic. Now is the time to think about offering an invitation to family

members and friends about joining the church. This requires an act of faith on our part, but shouldn't we be eager to share our faith with everyone? Three Reasons to Pray a Public Rosary

- 1. *Duty to honor God publicly:*** Secularists have attempted to drive religion and morality out of the public square. Children in public schools have been suspended, for example, when they pray grace before meals. This cannot continue! Catholics have the duty to oppose the secularist agenda. We openly honor God and respect His rights. The 2018 Public Square Rosary Rallies will make the point.
- 2. *Be an apostle:*** Our Lord sent the apostles forth to teach all nations. Praying the Rosary in public is an excellent way to introduce others to the Catholic Faith and the Fatima message. “Now no man lighting a candle covereth it with a vessel, or putteth it under a bed; but setteth it upon a candlestick, that they who come in may see the light.” (St. Luke 8:16).
- 3. *Public prayer gets results:*** Pro-life Catholics have peacefully prayed the Rosary in front of abortion clinics for decades. The power of their prayer has blunted the advance of abortion. Their public prayers save lives. In fact, recent studies show that abortion clinics are closing at a rate of one per month.

Pastor's Letter

We are observing today, September 16th, as Catechetical Sunday. We will have a commissioning and blessing of those who are serving as catechists both in our St. Benedict School and for our Sunday morning “Parish School of Religion” (PSR). Thank you for responding to the call to serve in this way. Many have expressed that in the course of teaching religious education – and by integrating the faith into the curriculum as a whole at our Catholic school – that they themselves continue to learn about our faith. I am grateful for our Sunday morning volunteers for walking with our youth who sometimes experience opposition to faith in public school settings. I am grateful to our St. Benedict School teachers (as well as those from our parish who teach at Bishop Rosecrans and Bishop Fenwick in Zanesville) who often teach with significant personal sacrifice – essentially on “missionary pay.” They witness to the faith with their very lives. Again, blessings on all of our catechists as well as on all parents, who are the primary teachers and formators in faith.

Please note that our Calix Society, which is a faith-focused group for those in recovery from addictions and for their family members, meets each Saturday evening in our Conference Room at 6:00 p.m. They will be beginning a new series of discussions drawn from a book that integrates the 12 Steps with our faith.

Please note, again, that our annual Mass of Anointing is this upcoming **Saturday, September 22nd**, at **1:30 p.m.** at St. Benedict Social Hall. This Mass of Anointing is open to anyone who has been struggling with the effects of both acute and chronic afflictions – and their caregivers – especially when some of those sufferings have been wearing down one's faith! This is the way a person formally and sacramentally unites their sufferings with Jesus' passion as well. And, the Church asks them for their prayers, which are especially effective at those times. As in years past, we will have some food and refreshments after the Mass.

May the Lord help us all to journey together ever more joyfully and courageously, always ready for the gift of eternal life.
