





READINGS FOR THE FEAST OF ALL SAINTS November 1, 2018

We gather to remember and praise God for all those who have gone before us and who now rejoice in God's presence—holy men and women of every time and place.

The Feast of ALL Saints focuses attention on two of our fundamental beliefs as Christians: we are baptized into a community and we will live forever. We celebrate our union with all those believers, children of God, who have been "rewarded in heaven" and now see God.

The readings from 1 John focus on our lives as Christrians here and now. We are children of God now! As such, we must try to be good and pure as we wait for the day when Jesus will come again, and we will see him as he is and be like him. And so, the reading also pulls us into the future. We live lives of "already/not yet." We are **already** children of God, but we are **not yet** perfect like Jesus.

The gospel, too, focuses on the already/not yet, but with an emphasis on the future. We are assured of a reward in heaven, the blessing to come, when we live the life of Jesus. It is this assurance of seeing God and eternal life of blessings that motivates us to live the beatitudes here and now. Combined, these readings present the Christian view of both present and future.

The saints are those children of God who have lived the beatitudes.

A vision of the multitude from every race, nation, people and tongue.

What we shall be has not yet been revealed.

What is your image of heaven?

READINGS FOR THE 31ST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME November 4, 2018

During the last weeks of the church year we are invited to think about the end time, the last things, our meeting with God face to face. Jesus tells us all that we need to know about getting ready for this meeting with God.

The focus of our reading is "love of God and neighbor." Because our society tends to trivialize the word "love," we are apt to miss the profound nature of this teaching. The introduction to this call in Deuteronomy is a radical call to faith in one God—a notion known only to the people of Israel. Precisely because there is only one God, they are commanded to give total, unconditional love to God. For the Hebrew, heart, mind and soul are not three separate faculties but rather the total person. Jesus combines this total, unconditional love of God with the love of neighbor. It is with the same love of mind, heart and soul that we are commanded to



love our neighbor. The focus comes from the conclusion Jesus draws - there is no greater commandment; nothing, no sacrifice, substitutes for it.

Deuteronomy 6:2-6

Love the Lord your God, with all your heart, soul and strength.

How can we come to be "unconditional" in our love of God?

Hebrews 7:23-28

Jesus lives forever to intercede for us.

How has the presence of Jesus been made known to you?

<u>Mark 12:28b-34</u>

The Greatest Commandment.

Who is the "neighbor" I find it most difficult to love? What must I do to fulfill the commandment of love?

Often in the Gospels when people ask

Jesus questions it is because they are trying to test him to find some way to accuse him of not being an authentic teacher and preacher. Next Sunday's Gospel is one of the rare occasions when someone is <u>not</u> trying to trip him up.

With this person's eagerness to have the greatest commandments reinforced by Jesus, he invites the scribe to a complete love of God and neighbor. Let us consider, therefore, different dimensions of loving God with heart, soul, mind and strength.

From the *Lectio Divina* section of the <u>Magnificat</u> devotional magazine for November 2018: "Saint Basil the Great [noted], 'in receiving God's commandment of love, we immediately, from the first moment of our existence, possess the ability to love. The commandment does not come from outside of us; it is a part of our nature to seek what is beautiful.'

"<u>Heart:</u> the *Catechism* speaks of the heart as our hidden center, the place of decision-making, the place of truth where we choose life or death, the place of covenant (CCC 2563).

"<u>Soul:</u> soul is the human being's spiritual origin. It denotes our capacity to be influenced by others, to experience joy and sorrow, to be inclined to praise God and love him, to live what is properly human. By means of our soul we can make a gift of <u>self</u> to God (see Mark 8:35; 10:45).

"<u>Mind:</u> Saint Gregory of Nyssa instructs us of a great priority in the life of faith – we are to 'seize God with your mind.' We cannot love God if we do not first know him; we cannot obey him if we are not mindful of the truths he reveals to us.

"<u>Strength</u>: examples of people in [the Gospel of] Mark who love Jesus with all their strength: the leper (Mark 1:40-45); the possessed man [who was set free] (Mark 5:18-20); Jairus (Mark 5:21ff); the Canaanite woman (Mark 7:24ff); blind Bartimaeus [<u>this</u> Sunday's Gospel] (Mark 10:46-52); and the widow in the Temple [who gave the two small coins/all that she had; the Gospel for Sunday, November 11th] (Mark 12:41-44)."

Let us ask God for a clearer capacity to live out these great commandments of love of God and neighbor in the words of St. Columban: "Loving Savior, inspire in us the depth of love that is fitting for you to receive as God. So may your love pervade our whole being, possess us completely, and fill all of our senses, that we may know no other love but for you, who are everlasting" (p. 64).

Pastor's Letter

I've been trying to exercise a bit more these past few weeks now that we're less than a month away from this year's Turkey Trot 5K run and walk on Thanksgiving Day for St. Benedict School. I'm not quite yet in racing shape, but I'm just about to the point of a continuous 30 minutes of running (plodding?). Like many people, I definitely benefit from having a specific event like this to provide some motivation.

Regarding a couple of points for both the Turkey Trot and Thanksgiving Day, yes, we are planning to have <u>two</u> Masses on Thanksgiving morning, one at <u>8:00 a.m. at Sts.</u> <u>Peter & Paul</u> in Lore City and another at <u>9:00 a.m. at St.</u> <u>Benedict</u> in Cambridge. That way Mass will be available for anyone would like to attend before the Turkey Trot, which is set to begin at 9:00 a.m. I always love to offer Mass on Thanksgiving because one of the key terms we use for Holy Communion is "Eucharist," which means "thanksgiving."

In fact, a reason why we have the practice of at least an hour fast before receiving Holy Communion is like why people tend to have little or no breakfast on Thanksgiving morning. We eat a smaller breakfast or no breakfast on Thanksgiving morning so that we can appreciate the Thanksgiving meal – or banquet! – much better. So it is before receiving Holy Communion (a.k.a. Holy Eucharist). We enter into at least an hour fast so that we can appreciate receiving Jesus' Body and Blood more profoundly.

As the second point about this year's Turkey Trot 5K, please note that the event is planned to begin on the end of the Great Guernsey Trail closer to Cambridge. It's still closer to Sts. Peter & Paul Oratory for us to have that Mass at 8:00 a.m. there. This just means that we'll need to finish a few minutes earlier in order to zip over to that other end of the trail.

Please note that this week we will have plenty of Masses for All Saints Day. We have a 7:00 p.m. Mass scheduled for St. Benedict Church on Wednesday, October 31st (All Saints Evening or "Hallows E'en" – the roots of the word "Halloween"), and 4 more on All Saints Day, November 1st itself: 7:00 a.m., 8:35 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. at St. Benedict Church and 7:00 p.m. at Sts. Peter & Paul Oratory. We definitely need to ask the intercession of all the saints in the midst of so much evil and woundedness in our world and in our lives.

May the Lord enable us to live ever more united and joyful, as the Lord prepares us for the gift of eternal life!
