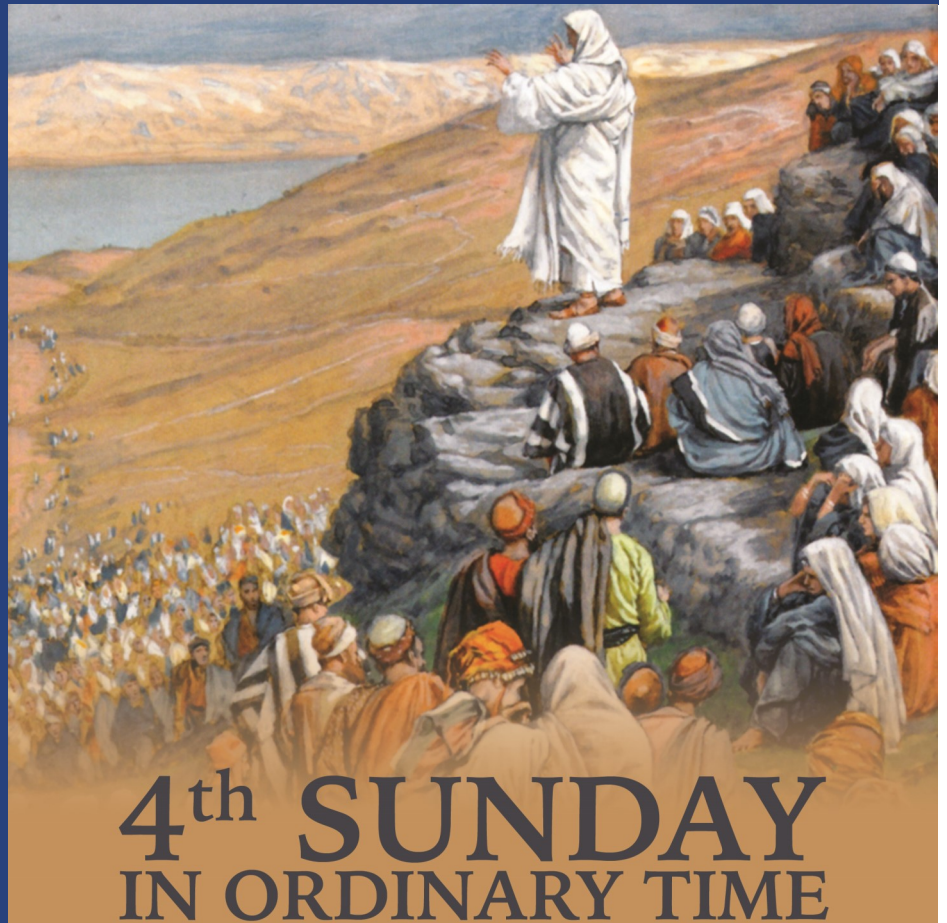

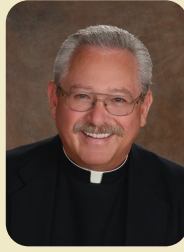

From the Pastor



Dear parishioners,

I know I write about my experiences in Mexico a lot. I hope you are not tired of it and I hope you realize that I know that I could have the same experiences here in the United States. The fact is that many of my experiences are in Mexico because I go there every week.

Normally, when I volunteer at Desayunador, I greet people as they are coming in or as they are being seated at the table. Sometimes it's after they are seated that I see them and say hello; that would be for the ones I know. Today, we had a lot of volunteers and they were given the jobs I usually do. I was assigned to say goodbye to our guests after they had eaten and wish them well. Actually, that's not a real volunteer job but what were they going to do with me.

Anyway, I addressed them as they left. I helped them dispose of their trash and, if they were taking anything out with them, I helped them package it. I said, "Que te via bien." Or "Que Dios lo bendiga." Or "Que tengas un buen día." The grace for me was the people who knew me. They were used to seeing me at the beginning, or during, their meal and they were surprised, and happy I might say, to see me at the end. Some of them even remembered that I hadn't been there the previous week because I was sick.

The ones who knew me wanted to shake my hand and say hello. That's my favorite part of the whole routine. Of course, I like the peck on the cheek with the volunteer ladies before we serve the people but there is something about the acceptance the poor and the street people have for me that really touches my heart. It means more to me than the fact that our bishop, Bishop McElroy, is phenomenally nice and treats me as an equal. Did you know that he called each of us priests at Christmas time to wish us a merry Christmas?

What touches me most is that, when I shake hands with one of them, I don't usually feel a soft, warm and hearty handshake. I feel a rough, chafed hand that either lives or works out in the elements. Yet, the person is warm and embracing without the roughness that hides the inner heart. This, in itself, is a tremendous grace for me.

I feel, in their hands, the hand of the Savior, the suffering servant who gave it all for love of us. I know that they don't know that they have that effect on me. It doesn't matter. I feel close to the Lord and His suffering whenever I am with them. My guess is that this is because He loves them so much and suffered for them and us.

Many people say that, when they give, they receive more than they give. I want to affirm that but I also want to say you don't have to give much. All it takes is a simple handshake and making contact with the eyes.

PARISH FINANCES

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

"Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven." Here, in a nutshell, is the Christian belief about the afterlife. We trust that heaven is open to believers who accept the gift of salvation and follow the way of the Lord, even (or especially) when that way is difficult!

The beatitudes in today's Gospel give us a program for following the path to heaven. These famous words offer a kind of twofold image. There are, on the one hand, the beatitudes about what we should do and be: poor in spirit, meek, merciful, clean of heart, and peacemakers. Such qualities are reflections of the nature of God in whose image we are meant to live. When we embrace and reflect this image to the world, there is no doubt we are walking on the path of God's will.

Then, there are also the beatitudes about what we are called to endure: mourning, hunger for righteousness, persecutions and insults due to our belief in Jesus. These are the trials that often beset the life of a faithful Christian--admittedly more so in some ages and areas than in others. But Jesus makes it clear that even these trials and struggles are a sign that a Christian is on the right path, not that God has abandoned him or her, but that the reward of heaven lies around the corner.

One of the greatest consolations of our faith is that even when life does not unfold according to our own perfect designs, even when there is suffering to deal with, even when we do not have great success in the eyes of the world, we can maintain hope and peace as we await the "reward" of the just. The eternal happiness of heaven will be worth every ounce of temporary trial here on earth.

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

In today's competitive world, many people do not see justice and humility as virtues to acquire. Yet Jesus makes a big point of giving us the beatitudes as the blueprint to follow for our lives. Being poor in spirit, meek, thirsting and hungering for righteousness, being merciful, clean of heart, and peacemakers are all hallmarks of the true disciple and a child of God. After doing all these things, however, the true disciple must be prepared for persecution. Are you really ready to become a true disciple?

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC TRADITIONS EXPLAINED

Question:

A special blessing of throats occurs on the feast of St. Blaise, February 3. What is the origin of this?

Answer:

St. Blaise was a bishop of Sebaste, Armenia, in modern Turkey, who was martyred for witnessing to the faith. He was tortured and beheaded for his beliefs by the local Roman governor around AD 316. This is all that is known about him, the rest being legend. We know much more about devotion to and the popularity of St. Blaise than historical facts.

The special blessing of throats associated with St. Blaise is due to a miracle attributed to him. While in prison, he miraculously saved a boy choking on a fish bone. Early in the sixth century, evidence exists in the Eastern Church that Blaise was prayed to for ailments of the throat. To this day, his feast is a holy day in the Eastern Church. In the ninth century, veneration of St. Blaise came to the Western Church and became very popular. Blessing of the throats with crossed candles began in the 1500s, the height of devotion to St. Blaise, and that blessing is still part of the devotion of the Catholic Church.

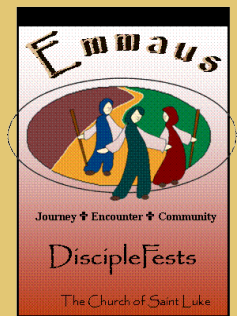

DAY 5 – PADUCAH, KENTUCKY Picture 42,000 Union soldiers boarding 185 ships on their way upriver, and you'll get a sense of the rich local history that is captured at the Floodwall Murals. See the Wacinton Sculpture honoring the Chickasaw Indians and tour the enchanting National Quilt Museum.

DAY 6 – HENDERSON, KENTUCKY Seek inspiration in Henderson, as did both the unequalled naturalist John James Audubon and blues legend W. C. Handy. Visit the John James Audubon Museum, which displays the world's largest collection of Audubon art and artifacts.
