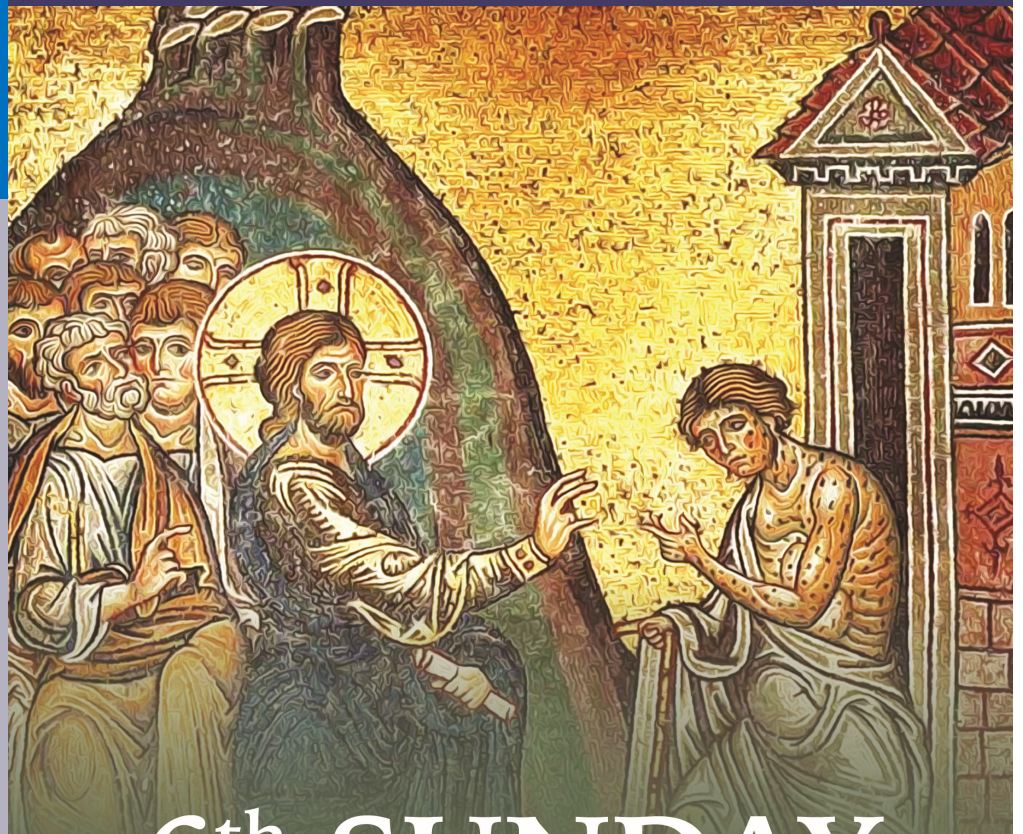

First Reading : Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46

Second Reading : 1 Corinthians 10:31-11:1

Gospel : Mark 1:40-45

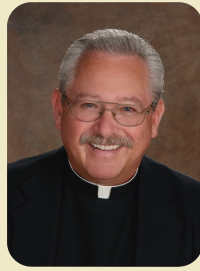

Dear Parishioners,

It seems difficult for people in today's fast-paced world to enter fully into the liturgical life of the Church. Yet, I think the liturgical life of the Church can really help us survive the stress, craziness and distractions of this period in time. The season of Lent is a good example.

The Ash Wednesday liturgy brings out what are called the three pillars of Lent; prayer, almsgiving and fasting. These are ancient practices but they have important applications today.

Prayer, by definition, is relationship with God. In the physical world we are so necessarily "thing" oriented as we perform our jobs to put food on the table, save or invest to provide for retirement or for the education of our children; and, all of the other things we do to survive and insure the survival of our families. We are so caught up in the things of this world that our connection to the transcendent oftentimes gets set aside.

Yet, our spiritual life should inform and lead our physical life. Our spirit, or soul, is the greater reality in what makes us human. It is the part that is connected to God through His Spirit and should be the defining quality of who we are. Lenten prayer practices are an opportunity to reengage, or deepen, our connection to God's Spirit. Doing so can calm the frenetic pace of modern life.

Where prayer is all about right relationship with God, almsgiving is all about right relationship with God's people. The 1906 Jewish Encyclopedia states, "According to the Mosaic conception, wealth is a loan from God, and the poor have a certain claim on the possessions of the rich; while the rich are positively enjoined to share God's bounties with the poor. A systematic mode of relief of the needy was, therefore, provided by the law and by the institutions of the synagogue."

The almsgiving practices of Lent give us an opportunity to realign ourselves, to remember that it is not all about me. God has given each of us many gifts and talents but to use them as if they were given only for our own benefit is to squander them, to fail to do the work with which he entrusted us. There are several Scripture stories about the plight of the Master's servants who have squandered his goods. In modern society we have learned that the one who lives for himself lives a lonely life. Intentional almsgiving helps us pull out of that bubble.

In ancient times, fasting was almost always penitential or expressive of sorrow. In modern times we see it as a much richer practice which can help us regain right relationship with our very selves. When we fast, we deemphasize our connection to the physical. We should especially try to let go of addictive behaviors whether that is with food or something else. Sometimes fasting from food can be symbolic and supportive of our efforts to fast from something else. When we loosen our connection to the this-worldly, we can strengthen our connection to the other-worldly, to our very spirits and the Spirit of God. Strengthening our connection to our own spirit and the Spirit of God brings us an inner peace that aids fruitful interaction in this world.

The ancient practices of Lent have huge applications in our twenty-first century world. Do yourself a favor, and do God a favor; start at the beginning, this Ash Wednesday, live the traditional Lenten practices through the forty days of this season and, then, celebrate the new life which Easter is all about. All of the Sunday liturgies, during Lent, and our Communal Reconciliation Service, are designed as the foundation of our Lenten practices.

PARISH FINANCES

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

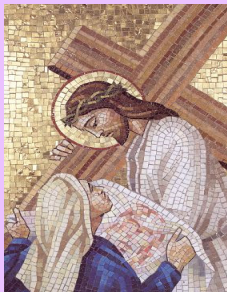

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE: February 11, 2018 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time

We may not like it, but generosity and risk often go hand-in-hand. At least, that's what Jesus shows us in today's Gospel as a leper approaches him for healing. Until the nineteenth century, lepers were shunned to the margins of society for fear of spreading the disease. To touch a leper was to risk becoming unclean yourself. In today's Gospel, Jesus defies convention. "Moved with pity, he reached out his hand, [and] touched him." The leper is healed! But this is not the only risk Jesus takes.

Before Jesus heals the man, he knows full well the desperate nature of his situation. Jesus knows that this man will be overjoyed upon being healed and that he just might tell everyone he knows. For a Messiah looking to temporarily fly under the radar, healing this particular leper might not be the best idea. Jesus heals anyway.

It can be easy to become calculated in our giving. If I go out of my way to help this person, how will it affect my reputation? How will this charitable donation affect my budget? How could I possibly make time to volunteer regularly? In today's Gospel, Jesus casts these concerns aside. He touches the untouchable. He reaches the unreachable. For his efforts, he receives a betrayal of his request for silence. "The man went away and began to publicize the whole matter." Before long "it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly." Jesus is forced to remain "outside in the deserted places." It would appear, perhaps, that he is unable to accomplish his mission.

When we take a risk to be generous, things might not follow the prescribed path. We might be disappointed. We also might be surprised! Our witness to radical generosity is attractive to a world in desperate need. Indeed, when Jesus took risks for love, "People kept coming to him from everywhere."

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

We never marginalize or turn our backs on those who suffer violence, oppression from unjust systems, poverty, illness, or disease. Jesus never turned anyone away, but always extended a hand of healing and compassion. He would insist on extending God's merciful and unconditional love to all, even if it meant breaking the Sabbath or civil law. Does the way we treat others, especially those who are different than us, reflect the freedom, joy, love, and good news of the Gospel?

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

If you witnessed a miracle, wouldn't you want to tell everyone? If you saw the sun dance in the sky, a crippled man walk, or the Virgin Mary appear in front of you, wouldn't you just want to shout about it from a rooftop so all could hear? Maybe you would be afraid others would not believe you. You might choose instead to keep it to yourself to avoid criticism and ridicule. At least, if you saw a miracle, you would have a choice: to tell or not to tell.

Yet, at every Mass we witness a miracle. We witness bread and wine as it becomes the true presence of Jesus Christ. It isn't a saint or Mary appearing before us; it is actually Jesus! When was the last time you told anybody about that miracle?

It might not be easy for us to always talk about our faith, but we can show them. When we receive the Eucharist into our bodies, we become one with Christ. We go forth from the Mass as a living testimony of the miracle that occurred at Mass. People will not be able to simply look at us and see the evidence. We need to demonstrate to them the reality of this miracle by our good deeds and profound acts of charity. That is stewardship. That is bearing witness to the truth of our God being truly present to us. It is something we should want to share with everyone.
