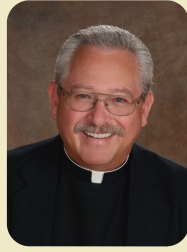

From the Pastor



Dear Parishioners,

Last week we looked at the beginning of the American Bishops' presentation of Catholic teaching on immigration. We looked at how they began by reflecting on scriptural references to the subject. This week we'll look at the first principle of Catholic teaching concerning immigration: People have the right to migrate to sustain their lives and the lives of their families. Next week we'll look at the teaching on a country's right to regulate immigration and control its borders.

Here is the first principal:

“At the end of World War II, with the fall of the Nazi empire and the subsequent creation of the Soviet "Iron Curtain," Europe faced an unprecedented migration of millions of people seeking safety, food, and freedom. At that time, Pope Pius XII wrote *Exsul Familia (The Emigre Family)*, placing the Church squarely on the side of those seeking a better life by fleeing their homes.

“When there is a massive movement of people such as during a war, natural disaster, or famine, the lands that receive these displaced people may be threatened. The influx may make it impossible for the native population to live securely, as the land may not have enough resources to support both. Even in more orderly migrations, such as in the United States, citizens and residents of the land may fear that newcomers will take jobs, land, and resources, impoverishing the people already present.

“Because of the belief that newcomers compete for scarce resources, immigrants and refugees are at times driven away, resented, or despised. Nevertheless, the first principle of Catholic social teaching regarding immigrants is that people have the right to migrate to sustain their lives and the lives of their families. This is based on biblical and ancient Christian teaching that the goods of the earth belong to all people. While the right to private property is defended in Catholic social teaching, individuals do not have the right to use private property without regard for the common good.

“Every person has an equal right to receive from the earth what is necessary for life—food, clothing, shelter. Moreover, every person has the right to education, medical care, religion, and the expression of one's culture. In many places people live in fear, danger, or dehumanizing poverty. Clearly, it is not God's will that some of his children live in luxury while others have nothing. In Luke's Gospel, the rich man was condemned for living well while the poor man starved at his doorstep (Lk 16:19-31).

“The native does not have superior rights over the immigrant. Before God all are equal; the earth was given by God to all. When a person cannot achieve a meaningful life in his or her own land, that person has the right to move.”

Remember, next week we will look at a country's right to control immigration and finally how these two principals are brought together in a Christian approach toward immigration.

PARISH FINANCES

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

3rd SUNDAY OF LENT

"But the hour is coming, and is now here, when true worshippers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth." Are we true worshippers? Do we praise and honor God the Father in the way Jesus described to the Samaritan woman at the well?

It seems that this woman was caught up in logistics about WHERE to worship more than HOW to worship. Her people worshiped in one place, the Jews in another. She was puzzled by this and, even though she could see that Jesus was a prophet, she challenged him because she thought perhaps he wasn't a true worshipper of God. The Lord's response to her was to shift the focus away from a particular physical location for honoring God. In essence, he told her that what mattered was that we worship God by being filled with his Spirit, "the Spirit of truth, [who] will guide you to all truth," as Jesus will say later in John's Gospel (16:13). This woman, whose life was marked by such a sad string of broken relationships, had been missing the point.

Worshipping God means more than merely practicing a community ritual or frequenting a sacred site. If we don't come to truly know God by welcoming his Spirit into our hearts, then our worship will be empty and our lives will always be missing something. The deep fulfillment that is meant to come from following the Lord is a fruit of being filled with his Spirit. Without drinking fully of this "living water" that is available to all of us through the waters of baptism, we will always be seeking something more, like this poor woman. Instead, may we be true worshippers, who drink with satisfaction from the Lord's own "spring of water welling up to eternal life."

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Today Jesus meets the woman at the well. After her time with Jesus she tells others about this man who is able to see into the depths of a person's life. Is Jesus that person for you? Have you allowed him into the depths of your life? Do you go out and tell others about this Jesus, as the Samaritan woman does? Do you share the good news by the way you live your life?

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC TRADITIONS EXPLAINED

Question: What can I do to keep up the spirit and practice of Lent in my life?

Answer:

Lent is an intense retreat, a forty-day period of reflection and penance that prepares us to celebrate the passion, death, and resurrection of Christ. Our communication with God and our awareness of him is the purpose of prayer. Setting aside extra time each day helps intensify the season. Prayer includes daily Mass, Stations of the Cross, communal penance services, and private confession. Making restitution for sin as well as disciplining our hearts and minds to focus on God is the purpose of penance. It helps us restore a sense of balance to our souls, thrown out of kilter by sin. Penance includes personal sacrifice, self-denial, fasting, almsgiving, and charitable works. Finally, spiritual practices help us sharpen our understanding and insight into the meaning and understanding of our faith. When you take your faith seriously, you do what is necessary to follow Jesus more closely, to integrate your life and your faith more carefully.

Fernando dreams of becoming a businessman. He also dreams of a better future for his family, and this motivates him to sell cookbooks on San Salvador's buses. It's dangerous work for \$10 a day—gangs frequently stop and harass drivers and passengers—but he keeps going, determined to achieve his dreams.

It was his dreams that led him to YouthBuild, a six-month, CRS-sponsored program that trains young people in business. There, he found a positive community to help him pursue his passion, despite the challenges of life in El Salvador. "When I tell my classmates that I want to do something, they tell me to try it and to not hold back."

Training for six months with YouthBuild wasn't easy on Fernando or his family. Without his wife to support him and care for their two young daughters, the early mornings and long days might have been impossible. "YouthBuild is a family because families help you realize your dreams," Fernando says. It's a fact he knows well.

Fernando is putting his newfound skills to work. After graduating from YouthBuild in 2016, he took part in a series of entrepreneur workshops organized by CRS and is currently working on a new business plan. He is also a part of the YouthBuild network of graduates, youth leaders who mentor other young people and look for new opportunities for employment and growth.

"We have a saying," says Fernando. "Once a YouthBuilder, always a YouthBuilder."

SALESIAN SOUP KITCHEN, “PADRE CHAVA”

HISTORY

The Salesian Soup Kitchen “Father Chava” was founded by the Salesian priest Salvador (Chava) Romo Gutierrez and Mrs. Margarita Andonaegui Padilla.

The doors opened on January 30th, 1999 with 17 commensals in a warehouse at a shopping center in Tijuana, Mexico. During the first two years 400 people were attended to twice a day. After a short break of three months and a change of location, by the end of 2001, 700 people were being served.

When finally the Soup Kitchen opened at its’ current location in 2007, breakfast was served to almost 1000 people. Since then from Monday to Saturday, its doors remain open continuously. Actually approximately 1000 people are attended to daily receiving a breakfast meal and other services.

MISSION STATEMENT

The presence of the Salesian work is to provide: educational opportunities with an emphasis toward an informative ambiance at a high level with formative teaching programs for children, adolescences, and the youth, by utilizing the preventive method from Saint John Bosco – Don Bosco- a priest, educator and writer of the 19th century.

The Mission is to offer integral education embedding solidarity and excellence for children, adolescents and youth. Also to promote the human and spiritual side of people to then generate opportunities, to reach a development with harmony, originality and freedom, especially to the most disadvantaged. This system was done to foster the conviviality and the familiar union, and to become good and honest citizens.

VISION

Toward 2020 year it’s expected that the presence of the Salesian work can be recognized as a formative place offering an educative answer to the population with an integral pastoral approach:

- Professional, human, and spiritual development.

- Education based on respect for the person and to the surroundings as a fundamental value.

- Promoting educational environments with quality, creativity and, cheerfulness.

- The development of positive leaders with critical and ethical characteristics.

- The identity through the pedagogy and the Salesian spirituality.

SERVICES

TELEPHONE: One person is in charge to take input information of each seeker before to let them make a call to the United States, and different Mexico States. The Calls make to a cellular phone numbers take three minutes maximum. This service is offered at the second floor of the building where chairs are set for waiting next to the public phone.

MEDICAL SERVICE: This service is offered according with the availability of the volunteer doctors because there is no one permanently on site. But they are reached at the second floor of the building where there is an area used as a waiting room.

PSYCOLOGIST: This service is always open on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

HAIR CUTS: This service is also offered for volunteers when they are available, and to who ask for it.

SHOWERS: From 8:00 to 10:00 AM the shower area is open for men. This area is kept clean and organized to help the guest to take turns allowing groups of two or three person at a time. Everyone receives a personal hygiene kit with towel, soap and shampoo and other items. Same service is offered to women 10:00 to 11:00 AM.

OTHER SERVICES

SHELTER: When a person, couple or family comes, they are guided by the coordinator to the receptionist to be registered according to their conditions and necessities (migrants, deported, or homeless).

TRIPS: One additional service is to get them back to their hometown when the applicant wants to go back home. In that case they are directed to the service coordinator.

PANTRY: When people request a bag of food, they need to be seen by the administrator or the director priest to authorize the delivery.
