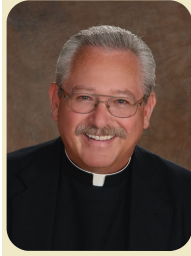

From the Pastor



Dear Parishioners,

I felt pretty dry this week so I dug up an article I wrote back in 2013. I think it is still pertinent:

During our trip to Ireland we visited the ruins of a monastery called Glendalough. It was founded by St. Kevin sometime around 540 CE. If you like to visit places where early Christians lived, it's a must see. The ruins of the buildings there allowed me to get a feel for what monastic life must have been like in Kevin's day. I could still feel the presence of the monks.

One item of interest is that St. Kevin started going there to get away from people. Evidently people thought he was holy from early on and tried to follow him. There is even a story which says he drowned a woman who attempted to seduce him; I guess that's really doing battle with the devil. He lived as a hermit at Glendalough for seven years but people kept coming to him. Eventually a monastic community was built and his fame as a teacher and holy man spread so much that people came from all over for his advice and guidance. So much for trying to get away from people.

Being there and hearing Kevin's story made me reflect upon what I was taught about the development of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. In the early Church it was assumed that once a person was baptized they would never go back to their former sinful life. It also helped that they thought the end of the world would come during their lifetime so being holy wasn't such a long-term struggle. But then the end didn't come and the persecutions did. After the persecutions ceased, people who had denied the faith rather than risk execution wanted to be let back in. Hence the first need for something other than baptism.

Some people didn't think it was fair to let them back in when there were so many who had died and others who were willing to die but were still alive when the persecutions ended. A decision was made to require those who wanted back in to get a letter allowing them back from those who had "confessed" being Christian but were still alive when the persecutions ended; they were called "confessors". I think the bishop would then determine the appropriate penance for those being let back in.

Evidently the bishops determined penances for other public sinners, too, who wanted to change their ways and begin living the Christian way again. The penances were pretty severe and people were put into the Order of Penitents so the Church could identify them and consciously pray for them. The Order of Penitents had a special place in the church like the RCIA do in many parishes. The penances were so severe and long term that this form of penance fell into disuse.

Elsewhere though, in Ireland, people were going to the monasteries and seeking out holy monks with whom to discuss the struggles of living the Christian way; yes, like the people who sought out St. Kevin. It became common practice for people who were living normal day-to-day lives in the world to go occasionally and get advice and guidance from a monk. The monk would pray with them for forgiveness of any sinfulness that had been discussed. Our practice of auricular confession eventually grew out of this.

The Church then set up guidelines for use of this practice as a form of sacramental confession. Priests became the ministers of the Sacrament and the prayer for forgiveness became a statement of absolution. In her wisdom the Church felt it better for the penitent to hear God's forgiveness being granted rather than just praying that it would be.

May we all find a St. Kevin in our lives.

PARISH FINANCES

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

GOSPEL MEDITATION

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

"Whoever believes in me will do the works that I do." What were the works that Jesus did? Miracles, sometimes, but what were the essence of these miracles? Caring for the sick, comforting the sorrowful, feeding the hungry ... much of Jesus' ministry was spent in carrying out what we call the works of mercy. But he did more than that; he also preached and publicly shared the good news, he fostered fellowship and community, and he prayed. All of this makes a kind of plan of action for us as Christians. As Jesus says today, if we truly believe in him, we will follow in his footsteps and do these same things.

What this all suggests is that belief itself--having faith, being Christian--is only part of the picture. Jesus expects us to take this faith and put it into concrete, practical action. Apparently this goes hand in hand with real faith. If actions don't follow, then faith is not being lived to its fullest. This of course presents a real challenge. Our lives are busy and our plates are full, just with the tasks and demands of daily existence. It can seem like a burden to serve others, to share the Gospel, to be actively involved in a faith community, to find time to pray. But these are meant to be priorities for true disciples of Christ. And as many will testify, when we sincerely ask God to help us get our priorities in order, he has a way of miraculously multiplying our time. Somehow, we find the opportunities right before us to follow God's will and bring our faith to life. That simple prayer of asking for help may be where we need to start. The first step is not so much to fill our calendar as to fill our hearts, or just to pray that God will fill our hearts, with the desire to "do the works" of Jesus.

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

"Let yourself be built into a spiritual house." These words are found in today's second reading. Are we willing to take up this challenge? Being built into a spiritual house means that I am willing to be shaped, constructed, stretched, changed, and designed. Growth involves many challenges and a lot of pain. It is not easy allowing my humanness to be transformed into the divine, and trusting God to do the work. Life's issues can easily cause us to try to control the uncontrollable and to become overly anxious when confronted with life and death issues. Yet Jesus tells his followers, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. You have faith in God; have faith also in me." For those willing to be stretched and shaped into the spiritual dwelling they are meant to be, these words can be reassuring and lead to greater trust.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC TRADITIONS EXPLAINED

Question:

I learned recently that the first hospitals were founded by the Church. Why? What other things have their origin in the Church?

Answer:

Many social institutions have their origin in early church life. Meeting the needs of people was the most basic expression of faith. Not only did God make people in his own image and likeness, but Jesus had given the command of love: "whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" (Mt 25:40). The apostles had appointed the first deacons to look after the needs of the poor widows. It wasn't long afterwards that hospices, hospitals, soup kitchens, and orphanages appeared. Universities came later, based on monastery and cathedral schools that had been ordered to provide education to young boys by Charlemagne. As the needs of society became more complex, the Church would champion the needs of the poor, the oppressed, the sick, and the needy. All of this was done out of respect for the dignity of each person and the need to prepare them to hear and embrace the Gospel.
