From the Pastor

In Mark's Gospel, the twelve apostles are normally called "the twelve" to signify the group that Jesus chose as His inner circle. In the selection we had last week, they are sent on mission but they are still simply called the twelve. In this week's selection, they return and Mark calls them "apostles" which means "ones sent on mission".

We skip, for a time, the story of the beheading of John the Baptist which comes between these two selections. We should be aware of this intervening story, though, because it might explain why Jesus seems to be intensifying the training of the twelve. Is He preparing them to carry on after his own martyrdom?

He suggests that they go away, with Him, to a quiet place to rest after their mission and possibly to reflect on their experience. Reflection on our lived experience of the Christian life may be the best way to recognize God's presence among us, His love for us, His desire that we grow as human beings and also, the true benefits of living the Christian life.

Their rest and reflection is turned, however, into a recognition of the needs of the people. Jesus' comment that the people are like sheep without a shepherd might be pointing back to Ezekiel 34:1-16 where God castigates the leadership of Israel for not pastoring His people. He states, "I myself will pastor my sheep." The Gospel is probably not so much a condemnation of the leadership of the Jewish people as an argument for Christianity being the right way forward rather than the Pharisaic system.

The Greek word describing the "vast" crowd and the "many" things Jesus teaches them is the same word and emphasizes that He is shepherding them according to their vast needs. Mark's story of the Feeding of the Five Thousand follows this selection. In it, the disciples, in effect, try to cut off Jesus' ministry to crowd by suggesting that He send them away to buy food for themselves. Jesus, still teaching His disciples tells them to give the crowd some food themselves.

Next Sunday, we will switch to what is called "The Bread Section" of the Gospel According to John. It will take four weeks to go through the entirety of his Chapter Six. His discussion of the bread is hugely important to our theology but don't let that make you miss Mark's telling of the story.

Mark's telling has so many aspects of the Mass as we know it. There is the Liturgy of the Word wherein Jesus teaches, there is the Liturgy of the Eucharist wherein Jesus feeds, there is the dismissal and there is the story of the disciples struggling in the boat, on the water, which is usually symbolic of the struggles of everyday life.

When Jesus joins them, again, in the boat, life calms down and Mark makes the comment that that "they had not understood the incident of the loaves." It begs the question, what do we not understand?

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower, but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

July 22, 2018 - 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Now what?" It's a difficult thing to hear, isn't it? The train comes late, a child unexpectedly cries, and the latest public policy debate flares up in the news. Life throws us curveballs, and we have no choice but to adapt. Jesus and the Apostles find themselves in that exact situation in today's Gospel.

The Apostles have returned from their two-by-two missionary journey. As Jesus hears all of their stories, he knows they need time to recover and refresh. "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while." Their wilderness retreat is short-lived, however, as eager crowds discover their location. Jesus is well aware of the needs of his disciples. Still, as he looks out at the crowd, "His heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd." The rest break is over. "He began to teach them many things."

For those of us who have experienced a taste of much-needed relaxation only to have it taken away abruptly, perhaps we surmise what the Apostles might have been feeling in that moment. But Jesus isn't being inconsiderate of the Apostles' needs. He offers them -- and us -- a lived lesson. St. John Paul II wrote, "The whole of Christ's life was a continual teaching: his silences, his miracles, his gestures, his prayer, his love for people, his special affection for the little and the poor, his acceptance of the total sacrifice on the Cross for the redemption of the world" (On Catechesis in Our Time, 9). In Jesus' choice to teach, we see all of these things: sacrificial love, concern for the marginalized, and priority of people's needs over personal preference. These aren't abstract ideals. They're lived realities as we strive to live and love like Jesus. When a new obstacle confronts you in your life, how do you respond?



WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC TRADITIONS EXPLAINED

Question: July 22 is the feast of Mary Magdalene. Who was she, and is it true that she was a prostitute who followed Jesus around in his ministry?

Answer: Recent biblical scholars have been trying for a long time to correct Mary Magdalene's misconstrued reputation as a prostitute. Biblical information reveals her as one of the most important disciples of Jesus, following and financially supporting him during his ministry. She is also a faithful witness both to the Crucifixion and the first to see the risen Jesus. Further, in John's Gospel, she is commissioned by the risen Jesus to announce the good news to his disciples. Thus, she becomes the first evangelizer and proclaimer of the risen Lord.

Her reputation as a prostitute arose from the misunderstandings of certain texts in Luke. Luke 8:2 reports Mary as being a follower of Jesus "from whom seven demons had gone out." This passage follows Luke's story of the sinful woman, a prostitute, who bathed Jesus' feet with her tears and dried them with her hair. Since that woman is not named, there came to be an association of that woman with Mary Magdalene, "from whom seven demons had gone out." Thus Mary became known as a prostitute.
