#### From the Pastor



Dear Parishioners.

Someone from the five o'clock Saturday night Mass, this last week, asked me what I think the truth taught by our culture is, as opposed to the truth of God. Although I gave some examples of it at the nine am Mass and the eleven-thirty Masses on Sunday, I shied away from it on Saturday. I shied away from it because I'm not really comfortable commenting on it for fear that I might say the "wrong thing" and enrage someone.

I shouldn't shy away from it but I have to admit that I am not the last word and don't really feel qualified to offer social commentary. But, if I would have to say what I think the false truth of our society is it would be "might is right". We want to be a strong country and I think we should be. We need to be strong for the protection of our people. Every country has that duty and that right.

In our culture, money is power, technological superiority is power, information is power, education is power, physical strength is power, knowing the right people is power and on and on. But, power for what... for protecting our people, for protecting our stuff, for solving the world's problems, for solving our own problems. Yet, throughout history, the use of power to accomplish these good objectives has failed every society. The Pax Romana is the quintessential argument against "might is right".

I learned as a young person that the use of power pits people against each other and somebody who isn't the mightiest will try to become mightier than the mightiest and will eventually challenge them. The old gunslinger movies and TV shows taught us that. Somebody was always trying to outdo the fastest gun in the West.

I think a major problem in our culture is the application, by some people, of the might is right theory to their personal lives. It doesn't work in personal relationships any more than it does in foreign affairs. It always pits people against each other.

The truth of God is the word of God which is love your neighbor (everyone) as yourself. And I don't mean a namby-pamby sort of love and I don't think God means that either. The kind of love to which we are called is concern for the good of the other. And, the good of the other is whatever is oriented toward their growth as human beings or cultures, if we are talking about other cultures.

Living that truth no longer pits people, or cultures, against each other. People who have experienced living that kind of love, and we all have at one time or another, experienced how life giving it is to both parties. That's why God's truth is better.

If we put our trust in God's truth and practiced living only His kind of love in our personal lives, I'm convinced it would change the way we do everything. It would change the way we parent. It would change the emphasis we put on acquiring power no matter how good the reason for acquiring power. It would change the way we use the power we have. It would change the way we do politics. It would change everything for the better.

**Psalm** — God mounts his throne to shouts of joy: a blare of trumpets for the Lord (Psalm 47).



#### PROCLAIM THE GOSPEL

Today we celebrate one of the tenets of our creed: that the Lord ascended into heaven. From Mark's Gospel we hear the final words Jesus spoke to his disciples shortly before he ascended into heaven. Those were words of commissioning, no less real for us today than they were to the disciples then. We are called to "proclaim the gospel to every creature." For the vast majority of us, this means that we proclaim the gospel by the witness of our everyday lives. Treating others with dignity and respect, providing for those less fortunate than ourselves, being good stewards of the many gifts showered on us, coming together as God's family in worship and praise—these are all signs that the gospel has taken root in our lives.—Copyright © J. #### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Surprisingly, the church moved very slowly in claiming marriage as a focus of attention and care. Nearly everywhere in the Roman world, citizens agreed on how to celebrate marriage. Consent of the man and woman is what made a marriage valid in the eyes of the law, and although there was a traditional ceremony, it was home-based and optional. The ceremony was for showing the social status of the families involved (the procession ideally detoured through crowds), and for reminding the woman of her legal transfer from her father's control to her husband's. The "big moment" of the ceremony had nothing to do with vows, but with the bride's donning the yellow veil with red highlights that was the daily wear of married women. A wedding feast included soothsayers and animal sacrifice to the new household's gods. Christians found that distasteful, of course, but since marriage was a family matter, they could edit things out. The church was comfortable with this, and sometimes recommended that the couple seek the advice of the bishop. His permission was only required for the marriage of a cleric, or for a marriage Rome didn't recognize, such as between a free woman and a slave. There was no blessing, no liturgy, no priest. Christians followed the customs of the day, but they knew that custom and relationships were transformed from within themselves by the fact of their baptism. Outwardly, Christians married exactly as their pagan neighbors, but they certainly invested the usual gestures with a dynamic sense of Christ's presence.—Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. 
