From the Pastor



Dear Parishioners,

When I was in the seminary, the first time, I learned what I call the Monastic Prayer form. It consists of four movements, Lectio, Meditatio, Oratio and Contemplatio. It is one prayer of four movements.

Lectio is simply reading Scripture or listening as it is read before you. There are many suggestions to aid fruitful reading of Scripture but, in and of itself, Lectio is reading Scripture. One of the most popular suggestions for this type of prayer is that of placing yourself in the Scripture, be one of

the characters in the particular reading and experience the story from their viewpoint. I'm very visual anyway and feel like I can experience the story from within it without being one of the characters.

Meditatio is actively thinking about the Scripture selection and asking what God is saying to you through it. It is a natural movement preceding from Lectio and should probably always be, somehow, connected to it. Oftentimes when reading, or hearing, Scripture, a word, phrase or concept will jump into your mind. Even if you've read or heard that particular Scripture hundreds of times, the word, phrase or image will usually be new. New or old, it's a clue as to what God is trying to say to you that day through that passage. In this movement you should begin to connect the Scripture passage with your day-to-day life.

Oratio is the next movement. It flows from Meditatio and simply means oral prayer whether prayed aloud or silently. If your Lectio and Meditatio have been fruitful, you'll have plenty to discuss with God. You'll have plenty to discuss with yourself. I think this is where we really feel the encounter with the living God. Our Oratio sometimes drives us back to Meditatio and sometimes even back to Lectio. They can each flow in and out of each other at this point.

In Contemplatio we finally come to silence. Actually Oratio eventually brings us to silence, when our Oratio is exhausted, which brings us to Contemplatio, which may be thought of as resting or simply being in the presence of God. In Contemplatio our mind is silent, our spirit is silent... our being is silent in the presence of God. Yes we can sometimes feel His presence. We don't feel His presence during but after Contemplatio when we are left with a feeling of peace, or surety, or love, or something unexplainable that assures us that God was present, holding us.

My experience is that, if I seem to feel His presence during Contemplatio, it always brings that movement to an end and leaves me with an empty feeling. I don't quite know what that is. Maybe it is because I have tried to create the experience or control it or something.

You may know some or all of this prayer form as Centering Prayer or Lectio Divina. It seems to me that they are often practiced as a shortened form of what I call Monastic Prayer. Monastic Prayer takes a long time and serious devotion. I know most of you don't have the time and I only have it when on all to infrequent retreats. But all is not lost.

I would bet that almost anyone can set aside time in the morning to read Scripture. Some people do it by using a prayer aid like" Give Us This Day", or one of the others. Other people might do it by participating in daily Mass. The Meditatio movement should probably be connected to this Lectio portion. Otherwise you might have to go back to the reading later in the day to refresh your memory. If you Meditaio has identified a word, phrase or concept, you should be able to remember throughout the day.

If you spend the day thinking about the word, phrase or concept and if you are talking to God about it, experiences during the day will probably connect themselves to it and enrich your Meditatio/Oratio. At some point we could let the Oratio take over and lead us into Contemplatio, maybe later in the day when we can eek out some quiet time. If we are successful, we will have practiced Monastic Prayer throughout the day and in some way, maybe, will have prayed without ceasing.

I have a friend who seems to do the first two movements of this naturally, day after day. She may do the other two also without me knowing about it. Either way it seems worth trying to me. If you try it, let me know of your struggles and successes.

THANKSGIVING

The word "thanksgiving" most often calls to our mind the holiday in November. But as early as the middle of the second century Justin Martyr referred to the blessed bread and wine of the Lord's Supper as "food we call 'thanksgiving' " (in Greek *eucharistia*). The Thanksgiving we celebrate in the autumn is at times marked by a sort of proud societal self-congratulation and the consumption of food until we sink into an inert stupor. The "thanksgiving" that we call our Eucharist is just the opposite: we are led to it by an acknowledgment of our own failings; we remember our humble place in the scheme of things by giving praise to God alone.


While the food of Christ's body and blood fills our spiritual hungers, it also creates in us a greater hunger. We are not sent to our spiritual sofas to let the Lord's Supper settle; we are sent to be living signs of that thanksgiving for the world by looking out for the poor and powerless, feeding the hungry, caring for the sick, speaking out against the self-righteous. In short, the hunger created by our doing in remembrance of Christ must lead us to living in remembrance of him.

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

It has been said that the Church breathes with two lungs, East and West. Some of our family treasures are in the East, and it is interesting to consider how liturgical families developed around differing customs. Centuries before Christ, after the young girl was given to her husband by her father, the spouses were crowned. Christians retained that custom, keeping the wedding in the home, and sometimes inviting a visiting priest or bishop to put the crowns on their heads. By the fourth century, the crowns were seen not as royal crowns, but as the crowns of victory worn by martyrs. The crowns have nothing to do with being "king and queen for a day," but rather speak of the sacrifice of love poured out fully. There are no vows exchanged at all, but the crowning is followed by a joyful dance by the priest and couple around the Gospel book. Unlike Roman law, which saw the wedding rites as optional, Eastern practice did not recognize a marriage that had not been blessed.





- Connecting homeless and at-risk Veterans with <u>housing solutions</u>, <u>health care</u>, <u>community employment services</u> and other required supports.
- Collaborating with federal, state and local agencies; employers; housing providers; faith-based and community nonprofits; and others to expand employment and affordable housing options for Veterans exiting homelessness.
