FROM: THE PASTOR



Dear parishioners,

We live in a society that, on many issues, believes differently than what the Catholic Church teaches. I caution us not to judge others, that's God's job, but to be compassionate and to live prophetic lives which proclaim God's judgement on the happenings in our world. And, we take Church teaching to be our understanding of God's judgement although a well-formed conscience must be our guide and we can faithfully dissent from Church teaching.

I know that first paragraph will be confusing to some but so is life. We do the best we can trying to avoid our judgements simply being self-referencing rather than informed by our relationship with the Church, our relationship with Scripture and our relationship with the Lord we meet in our day-to-day lives.

I'm not a moral theologian, simply a parish priest. I don't know all of the moral arguments against abortion and physician assisted suicide. They seem to me to be bookends of modern society's attitude towards life; we want to control it. We seem to want to take the gift of life which God gives and reshape it into our concept of what life is supposed to be about.

Where is the wisdom of saying that the gift of new life can be rejected if we don't like the timing of the giver Where is the wisdom in saying that the gift of live given to us by the giver of life can be reshaped to suit our dislike for suffering, which is part and parcel of the gift; ask any mental health professional.

I can't speak for others, but as Christians, we follow the one who accepted human suffering and death, a miserable death at that, to show us the value of embracing the fullness of human life. He had the power to say no and God could have saved us from the results of original sin in some other manner if He so chose. But, no, He chose to embrace the fullness of human life himself and show us the value of embracing it fully.

I'm not one who likes suffering, by the way, not for myself and not for others. But, I recognize that every time I have truly grown as a human being, suffering was involved. M. Scott Peck was right, life is hard, we don't need to go in search of suffering, life will give us plenty and psychological and spiritual growth is achieved through embracing that path of suffering. (The Road Less Traveled, 1978)

The second reading from this last Sunday, Hebrews 2:9-11, states that Jesus was made perfect through His suffering and it has to be talking about His passion and death. Later on, in Hebrews 5:8 it says that Jesus learned obedience through His suffering. I've often reflected on that. Who did he, God and the perfect Son of God, have to learn obedience to? I can only come to the conclusion that it means he learned obedience to human life itself. Yet our culture, our modern society seems to reject that.

When I was a kid, I thought that the "salvific value of suffering" was that I could offer it up for my sins. I no longer believe that God would want anything like that. And I will pray, like Jesus, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me..." And, I hope to have the courage to accept, like Jesus, the fullness of the gift of human life. The salvific value of suffering is the growth we achieve by accepting it. The growth that caused the Centurion, at Jesus' death, to remark "truly this man was the Son of God" (Mk 15:39).

CS PARISH FINANCES 80

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. DISCIPLESHIP AND WEALTH


Sometimes we get the idea that having material wealth is a bad thing. We may convince ourselves that it is the poor who are favored. In today's readings, we discover that material wealth alone does not keep us from discipleship. We will see that there are other gifts more important than material wealth, but even so, it is how we use our gifts that matters most

Today's scriptures point to the value of the gifts of wisdom, trusting in God, and letting our actions reflect the love of God from within. It is not gold that causes us to fall, but rather the desire for gold above all other things. From the readings in Wisdom and Hebrews, we find the source of God's gifts in our lives. Wisdom is more valuable than worldly possessions. In Hebrews, we are challenged to look at our own values and admit honestly what controls our lives.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

How did the church dealt with "daily sins" in the first five centuries? As devout and observant as they were, our early fathers and mothers in faith could not have been all that different from us. Maybe they looked the other way when the grocer threw an extra fig in the shopping basket, or had a wandering eye for the widow next door, or had a taste for too much ale, or didn't let the truth get in the way of a good story. First of all, there was the Eucharist. The words are familiar: "This is the cup of my blood, poured out for the forgiveness of sin." Especially by participating in Communion from the cup, forgiveness was achieved. Eucharist was, and remains, the sacrament of reconciliation *par excellence*, the sign and source of unity with Christ.

There were other helps along the way: "fraternal" correction, or the course corrections we offer one another in love, prayer, fasting, works of mercy. St. Augustine listed endurance of suffering, forgiveness of insults, and added the praying of the Lord's Prayer in the liturgy. He felt that the public praying of the Our Father on Sunday and its daily use in private prayer was an essential remedy and the reason why everyone was not a candidate for canonical penance. Inherited from Augustine's practice, the Lord's Prayer in our Communion Rite still has the same purpose, preparing us for receiving and becoming the Body of Christ. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. CHURCH ASSISTIVE HEARING FM SYSTEM

Our Church has a FM assistive hearing system. All Church amplified audio is simultaneously transmitted over a FM system. Individual FM "receivers" are available for our use. The Church FM receivers have a single-ear earpiece that plugs into the FM receiver on one end, and into one ear on the other. Better reception is possible by using your own personal "ear buds" (allowing audio to both ears). The best reception will be obtained by t-coil equipped hearing aid users when they use an induction loop. FM receivers are available before mass, and must be returned to an usher or to the sacristy after mass. If you're having difficulty hearing in Church; ask about using this very effective assistive

hearing system.
