

FROM: THE PASTOR



Working at the Breakfast Hall wore me out today. The readings at the Mass were kind of fun. The Gospel was about Jesus eating at the house of a Pharisee and not washing his hands. At the Breakfast Hall one of the volunteer jobs is squirting a bit of soap into the hands of the people as they come to get into line. There is a big long sink there for them.

We served from 8:00 am till10:30. I don't know if we had less help or if we just didn't have it together today. It's best when all of the jobs get done one right after the other and things keep moving. There's setting out the cups, napkins and utensils, then placing a pot of coffee on the table, filling the cups with juice and placing a sweet bread at each place. Then the plates of food are set down and tortillas added to them before the next group of six is called and a volunteer prays grace with them before they sit.

It just wasn't working today. I was supposed to be in charge of coffee, along with another guy, but I kept switching jobs trying to help us catch up. The other coffee guy has huge amounts of energy and is constantly smiling, joking and commending people. He freed me up to do other things and I don't know why but I was serious about us staying caught up, so much that one of the people who comes to eat there told me to slow down and not work so hard. Another told me it would help me get into shape.

I guess that is one of the things I really like about this place. I'm getting to know people. We're becoming friends, of a sort, for one morning a week. I talk to the other volunteers naturally (some of them are homeless too, by the way) but I really like it when someone who has come to eat there wants to talk. They ask me where I'm from and they tell me the places they have been in the U.S. I probe a little to get a bit of their stories. I'm amazed at how similar they are.

I'm getting to know which ones like coffee, which ones only want juice, who wants extras of what, etc. There were new people today whom I hadn't seen before. A couple more families with children and a couple of young guys who looked to me like teenagers. New people are a little obvious because they are obviously following what the others are doing and sometimes sit before we pray. It's also cool how they take care of each other. A table that didn't drink much coffee will share with a table which has a lot of coffee drinkers and those who don't eat sweet rolls find someone else who might want it.

I spent about twenty minutes talking with Padre Jesus which is really fun since he doesn't speak any English. I learned that he is not Mexican; he's from Spain. He has a lot of opinions about immigration policies but since he doesn't speak English, I missed most of what he was telling me. What I did understand was that he was going to spend the day helping a couple of people locate their birth certificates. These are deportees who lost all of their identity papers when they were deported. They can't accomplish anything in their lives until they get identity papers. Evidently running them down isn't the easiest thing to do, the way Padre Jesus was talking. And, I know it takes money because he was counting his pesos before he left wondering where he was going to get more.

I suppose that my enjoyment of my Tuesday morning routine is partially because it is new, every Tuesday. I hope my energy for it continues. I enjoy the volunteers and the people who come there to eat and I'm even now enjoying the people I see outside on the street. They have now become more normal to me and I have no hesitation interacting with them. I praise God for that.

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

GOD'S WORK OF SALVATION

God's work of salvation is the focus of this weekend's readings. From the prophetic event of Isaiah to Jesus' understanding of the human condition in Hebrews, concluding with Jesus paying our ransom in Mark, God is in control. There may be failings and misunderstandings along the way. We may move away from God, but at our conversion, God leads us back. Like James and John, we may let greed and power blur our vision of what Jesus wants us to know about the Kingdom; but tirelessly we are taught and re-taught what life in the Kingdom will be. Jesus has paid our ransom to ensure that we will share in the Kingdom.

It is not unusual to think of Jesus' ransom as a punishment that he endured. However, it is more accurate, and more like Jesus, for us to recognize ransom as God's gift to us. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The Irish are rightly tired of being the subject of jokes about guilt. In fact, it is from the Celtic church that the whole experience of reconciliation in our tradition was creatively rescued and revived. The Irish church was unique in its origins, not so much organized around dioceses, but around monasteries. Aspects of religious community life readily spilled over into ordinary gatherings of the faithful, including the way people looked at sin and applied remedies. Unlike the public nature of canonical penance, the Irish method was linked to a kind of mentoring process they called "soul friending." Just as young novice monks might find a mentor in the wisdom of a senior guide, so did a way of penance open up to ordinary folks. Monks were accustomed to frequent confession of faults to the abbot or mentor, who would suggest penances. In time, abbots with a certain flair for this began to share lists of sins and corresponding "tariffs" with others. Some of these books survive, and provide a hair-raising view of long-ago sins like cattle rustling, and a great deal of self-correction involving dips in icy streams and rolling about in thickets of thorns. After the penance was performed, the penitent returned to the confessor, and in a private act marked by the laying on of hands, or perhaps a kiss of the altar, the sinner was restored.

Irish monks were committed travelers, and their methods were widely copied. We might say that they saved a sacrament, but at the expense of shifting attention to the sins of the individual and away from the actions of the reconciling community. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

This Weekend is the 2015 World Mission Sunday Appeal The Society for the Propagation of the Faith A Pontifical Mission Society Please Give Generously



CHURCH ASSISTIVE **HEARING FM SYSTEM** Our Church has a FM assistive hearing system. All Church amplified audio is simultaneously transmitted over a FM system. Individual FM "receivers" are available for our use. The Church FM receivers have a single-ear earpiece that plugs into the FM receiver on one end, and into one ear on the other. Better reception is possible by using your own personal "ear buds" (allowing audio to both ears). The best reception will be obtained by t-coil equipped hearing aid users when they use an induction loop. FM receivers are available before mass, and must be returned to an usher or to the sacristy after mass. If you're having difficulty hearing in Church; ask about using this very effective assistive hearing system.
