FROM: THE PASTOR



Dear Parishioners,

This last week I introduced the Masses by telling us that we are celebrating Easter. At the 5:00 Mass on Saturday, which is more interactive than the others, people laughed immediately and I could hear people saying "really", "aren't you rushing things a bit". That gave me the opening to explain that early on the Church thought of each Sunday as a little Easter.

From the beginning the Church gathered for and celebrated Mass every day or every Sunday. Early on the practice became every Sunday for the faithful. As I reflected on that and reflected on Christ's words, "Do this in remembrance of me", I thought that's one of the reasons we do this every Sunday. By the way, for the Jewish people, what we call Sunday began, and still does begin, on Saturday evening. But, back to the remembrance.

The Greek word we translate as remembrance is *anamnesia* which literally means no amnesia or not-forgetting. Jesus told us to do the Breaking of the Bread as a way of maintaining our awareness of His life, death and resurrection; and, all that that means. And part of what that means is that He is still with us today, as he told us he would be. In the Mass He is truly present in the Word proclaimed, in the presence of the minister of the Sacrament, in the Eucharist itself and in the community gathered. If we open ourselves to them, there are four different modes of presence that help us maintain our awareness of His presence.

By way of example, I, and others have commented on this too, feel the Lord's presence especially during the Eucharistic prayer because I can feel the people, you, praying along with me. That is such a hugely sacred time in our gatherings. And, did you ever notice that the kid noise, which has become such a life-giving part of our gatherings, is mostly silent during the Eucharistic prayer. There is something going on there and it's something that makes it almost impossible for me to not feel the presence of the Lord in our gathered community.

I also feel the Lord's presence very strongly during the words of institution, "this is my body... this is my blood". I feel the Lord saying those words. The call to Communion is also very strong. I always feel emotion when I say "Behold, the Lamb of God...". And then, if I finish distributing Communion early enough I love to stand and watch as the last people receive and the action of rebuilding the Body of Christ is completed.

And that is to say nothing about the Liturgy of the Word; how the Lord is constantly speaking to me through the readings and through the homily, even when I'm preaching it. I see other people, including our young people, listening intently during that part of the Mass. I makes me smile to think how so many people in our community are trying to allow the Lord to touch them.

It is so difficult, in our world, to stay open to the Spirit. We are so involved, necessarily, in the this-worldly problems of our day-to-day lives that it is hard to stay connected to the realities beyond this world. Many people say that if they miss Mass on Sunday, they have a hard time getting through the week and, no wonder... getting through the week isn't always that easy.

But, there are other people who don't seem to experience the need to stay connected to the Lord, to not forget that He is always present to us if we open ourselves to it and that opening ourselves to it enriches our lives. How do we share that with them?

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. WE LONG TO SEE GOD'S FACE

"Lord, this is the people that longs to see your face." This antiphon for today's responsorial psalm offers the focus for today's readings. As we on earth celebrate the triumph of all the saints—the ones officially canonized by the Church, and the countless others who have also reached heaven—we add nothing to their glory. But we give ourselves reason to hope. We too long to see the face of God and believe that we can one day be counted among those whose robes, as John tells us in the book of Revelation, are washed "white in the blood of the Lamb."

The passage from John's First Letter offers further assurance: we are God's children who will one day see God. But to-day's Gospel pulls us past longing and reassurance into action. Jesus clearly tells us what we must do to be counted among the saints. We must be poor in spirit, hungry for holiness, merciful, single-hearted, and peacemakers! Then we too will see the face of God. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Eight hundred years ago, the church's practice of penance underwent major revision as theologians, called scholastics, reflected on the practice of their day. By then, penance was normally a very secret rite, celebrated completely apart from the community. Public penance had mostly disappeared behind the walls of monasteries and the cloister grills of convents. The scholastics trimmed penance down to bare essentials, even sweeping aside age-old traditions like a laying on of hands and prayers of absolution. All that was left was the confessor's simple statement, "Ego te absolvo," "I absolve you."

In 1614 a new ritual book tried to make penance more public and solemn. It suggested, but did not require, that the priest wear a surplice and stole, and hear the confession in a confessional. For the first time, we have the directive that the priest be separated from the penitent by a screen, a rule that some bishops applied very strictly. By the 1940s, large numbers of Catholics availed themselves of the sacrament of confession every Saturday, and most people thought confession was a prerequisite for Communion. In some urban parish churches, confessionals were staffed, usually by the junior priest, for several hours every day, even during the celebration of Mass. It is remarkable how quickly things changed, but as we have seen, the system has collapsed before and what often comes next is an impulse of the Spirit, new life, and a fresh start. —Rev. 
