FROM: THE PASTOR



Dear parishioners,

I just looked over the readings for tomorrow to prepare for my Mass in Spanish. You probably know that I'm not very good in Spanish and for that reason alone I have to look at the readings ahead of time. Tomorrow's Gospel is the story of the man who prepared a great banquet and invited many people, all of whom made excuses as to why they couldn't come.

I stopped to reflect on how I could describe the life God gives us as a banquet, if we enter into it, and how I could inspire people to want to enter into the banquet of life to which God invites us. Then I looked up and out my window I could see a group of people preparing for a beach bar-b-cue. There were three cars and families unloading their stuff. The adults were busy getting everything together, one lighting a fire. The adults looked like they were having fun, working together to get this thing going; at least that's what I imagined.

The kids, there was a passel of them, were running around like crazy people. You know how kids do. I could feel their excitement. Maybe that is part of what Jesus meant when He said we should accept the Kingdom of Heaven like a little child. Everybody involved in this gathering looked as if they were really into the joy it was bringing them.

Is that the banquet of life Jesus is inviting us too? I think so... but that is coming from a person who generally enjoys life. Yes, I've suffered, parenting a wayward child, living a marriage that was to end in divorce, discovering the not-so-good unredeemed things about who I am, being disliked and rejected by some... Life's hard and full of suffering but gosh, it's a banquet too.

Part of the banquet for me has been dealing with the not-so-good things about myself, which God has pointed out to me, working on them and becoming a little bit better as a person. How exciting. I feel like running around aimlessly like those little kids. And, I haven't even grown that much but each little step is a joy. I guess this part of the banquet is like eating your spinach; it tastes yucky but it surely is good for us.

Another thought that I had was that, in the Mass, we act out the banquet and in our daily lives, after the deacon sends us out, we live out the banquet. I love anything which helps me make the connection between the Mass and my day-to-day life. I hope it helps you too.

On another note, Bishop McElroy made his pastoral visit to us this last Friday. He is trying to visit all the parishes before Christmas so he can't just do it on weekends when he could celebrate Mass with us; maybe next time. For now he met with me separately; he met with the Pastoral Council, Finance Council, Development Council and head of parish ministries as a group; and he met with the parish staff separately.

I was expecting this to be a formal visit from my boss and was prepared to tell him everything I've tried to accomplish and everything I hope to accomplish within the next eight years. That wasn't what he seemed to want at all. He just seemed to want to get to know us as people and as a parish community. Consequently, the visit was a pure delight for everyone concerned. I'll send him a thank you note this week and encourage him to come celebrate Mass with us soon.

PARISH FINANCES

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — The widow of Zarephath had only a handful of flour and a little oil, but made a little cake for Elijah (1 Kings 17:10-16).

Psalm — Praise the Lord, my soul! (Psalm 146).

Second Reading — Christ will appear a second time to bring salvation to those who eagerly await him (Hebrews 9:24-28).

Gospel — Beware of those who like to go around in long robes and accept greetings in the marketplaces and places of honor at banquets (Mark 12:38-44 [41-44]).

GIVING ALL

Trusting widows play a significant role in this weekend's readings. At the point of poverty, when giving even the smallest amount of what they had could imperil their health and well-being, they trusted God and gave anyway. What is important about their giving is not what or how much they gave, but how they gave it. Without selfishness, they gave to help others. Their giving was from the heart, with little hope or intention of receiving any sort of reward or recognition for their generosity. The monetary values of the widows' gifts were small, but their value measured in the Kingdom was priceless.

There is a significant similarity between their gift and the gift Jesus gave each of us. The widows offered their lives for God. Jesus offered his life for us.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In 1974, a revised ritual of penance was given to the Church, and at forty years distance, we still are discovering its treasures and tentative about some of its provisions. The rite reaches deep into our tradition for an early insight: when we turn to God, we are restored to life in the Church.

There are three different forms of penance. The familiar individual confession is preserved, but with tremendous enrichment. It is less rushed, anchored by a reading from scripture, and the confession of sins is seen as an opportunity to proclaim faith in God's power to save. In a sense, what is "confessed" is the penitent's faith in God's gift of forgiveness. The priest suggests a penance that may be directly connected to the virtue that the person seeks as a means of overcoming the fault. There are formulas for contrition suggested, but the penitent might even express sorrow for sin and desire for mercy in his or her own words. The prayer of absolution grounds the event in the life and ministry of the Church. Harking back to the joyful dance of bishops leading penitents into the church, the rite now ends with a prayer of thanksgiving for God's mercy, and may include the gesture of laying on of hands. After forty years, we struggle to claim this rite forged of memory, tradition, and grace. History tells us to be patient; we do not always recognize a treasure at first.
