FROM: THE PASTOR



Dear Parishioners,

People ask me, every once and a while, if I would write my homilies down so they could take them home and reflect on them. Well, this may be what you get this week. It's Monday, the only day I have to write my column and I don't feel like writing my column. I have been looking at the readings for next Sunday though. So, here are my thoughts on the Solemnity of Christ the King.

Every year I point out that the imagery of Kingship is difficult for us because we, in the United States, have never had a King. The Hebrew people didn't have an earthly king either before the time of Saul. God was their king and they had judges to carry out the day to day task of ruling. But they wanted a king like the other nations. The prophets warned them that while God was king, he served them but if they have an earthly king, they would have to serve him.

Maybe that is similar to the difference between a president and a king. A president is supposed to serve the people, the nation which consists of the people. It seems to me that, in reality, presidents serve an ideology, a party platform, or maybe their financial backers. I would guess that, in serving the first two things, they believe they are serving the country. If they are serving financial backers, I don't see how they could even think they are serving the country. They should do whatever is best for the country whether it is part of their ideology, platform or desire of their backers. But, and this is a big but, they are merely human just like you and I; and, they may not know what is best for the country.

God, if He is who and what we say He is, does know what is best for the country, by the way. And He know what is best for each one of us too. We should let Him be King! We should let him rule over our lives. Our Pledge of Allegiance says we are "one nation under God" but I don't think we always act like it. In fact, as individuals, we don't always act as if we are subjects of Christ the King either.

St. Augustine identified four substitutes that, in our quest for happiness, we put in place of God, pleasure, honor, power and money. How can Christ be our king if we let the quest for these other things rule us? And guess what... just like the prophets of old warned, these things don't serve us. We serve them and we become enslaved to them. Christ has already proven His willingness to serve us and when He serves us, we live in freedom.

Another substitute we have for God, which I don't think St. Augustine mentioned, is our own mind, our belief that we can determine what is best for ourselves.

We've learned to trust specific tax consultants, doctors and lawyers; what do we need to do to learn to trust God. He is the professional on humanity, you know, since He created it. Twelve-steppers learned to trust God because of the mess they made of their lives. Maybe our seeming success gets in the way of discovering what they have discovered, their lives are much better when they let God rule and they begin living in a freedom they never knew existed.

So, if we want to live in the freedom of God's children and experience the fullness of the life He created, we need to identify and let go of any substitutes we might have for God and learn to trust that the author of life is the only one who can bring us into the fullness of life and the experience of true happiness. Let Christ the King rule in our lives.

PARISH FINANCES

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

TRUE STEWARDSHIP

The gospel message proclaimed throughout the New Testament invites us to live in harmony with the world. This is a challenge to care for the world and be stewards of all that God has given us. Like generations before us, we are entrusted with the care of the earth so that generations to follow may enjoy the same gifts. Sometimes, however, we are absorbed into the ways of the world. When we are of the world, we rely heavily on the power of wealth, beauty, fame, and accumulation of material possessions. We want earthly possessions and carelessly turn our hearts from the responsibilities of stewardship and conservation.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

For good reason, Americans have been ambivalent about "kings" for many years, even long before George III's troops were sent packing in 1776. To say Christ is our King is to make a statement not about our politics, but about the dignity of our own identity. At our baptism, the crown of our head was once slathered (or at last dabbed) with oil while the Church prayed "as Christ was anointed priest, prophet and king, so may you live always as his body." To celebrate Christ's kingship, then, is to claim our own identity.

Your head was anointed just as Samuel poured oil over David's head. David had his gifts, but he was no prize, and perhaps that might comfort you as you think about your call, out of the messiness of your own life, to stretch into a life-style that is marked by worship, by prophetic speech and deeds, and the kingly ability to fashion a world (or at least a patch of it) where relationships are marked by justice, mercy, and cultivation of the good. It is precisely because of this kingly role that our faith community has something to say about the environment, about the dignity of human life, just wages, access to health care and education, the building of peace, and avoidance of war. In a few weeks' time we will hymn the coming of the "newborn king," but today we sketch out the meaning of his reign, and our own incorporation into his work for the life of the world.

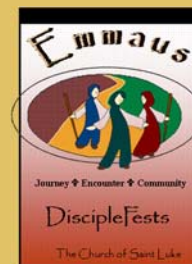
