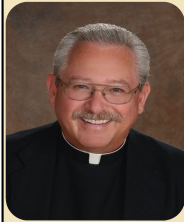

FROM: THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,



I was at the Los Angeles Religious Education Congress this last weekend. I go pretty much every year. It is a time for me to hear others speak about the different religious education topics and reflect on our ministry here at St. Luke. This year was a good year.

One of the workshops I attended was entitled "Why You Should Go to Mass". I was pretty amazed; the presenter said "So I don't forget who I am." Now I know the quote from one of the martyrs of Abitina who said "Christians make the Mass and the Mass makes Christians." And, I know people who say the Mass helps them get through the week, ostensibly as Christians. But I never reflected upon it in quite the way the presenter was presenting it.

As he presented it, it made me think of 12 Step Program people who begin their sharing, I think, by saying Hi, I'm such-and-such I'm an alcoholic..., or something like that. Can you imagine going to Mass and saying, Hi, I'm such-and-such. I'm a _ _ _ _ _ . If you're trying to fill in the blank with "Catholic" you've got the wrong idea; it doesn't work. Remember... right after the greeting, we do the Penitential Rite.

We are saying, Hi, I'm such-and-such. I'm a sinner. And, we are saying it in a room full of sinners... where we belong... helping each other in our goal of living a more saintly life. Wow, it was breathtaking to understand that.

He discussed several other things as we stepped through the Mass but the next one that touched me deeply was the Communion Rite. We begin with the Our Father and, remember, there are no I, my or me words in it. It is prayed by us as a community recognizing that we are all sons and daughters of the same God.

In the Our Father we ask God to forgive us as we forgive others. In effect, we are recognizing that, if we don't forgive others, God shouldn't forgive us. We all know that... but, did you realize that in the next rite we act out what we have just said? We go from that to the Kiss of Peace wishing each other the peace of Christ. That is the physically acting out our acceptance of each other no matter what we may have had against the other; we have just committed to forgiving them! Even if the one we have trouble forgiving is not there, he or she should be included in our hearts.

We, sinners among sinners, have forgiven each other and, hopefully, ourselves. If we can do that, we are assured of God's forgiveness. Again, the image for me is of my mother embracing me when I did wrong, helping me confront my wrongdoing without scolding me.

PARISH FINANCES

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

A SUNDAY FOR REJOICING : The Gospel story of the prodigal son is a favorite of many. We can identify with all the major figures and their crisscross of emotions. The father's initial grief over his young son's avarice is turned to relief at his return. The son's grief over his loss of fortune, family, and friends is turned to delirious joy at the sight of his father.

We understand the eldest son's bewilderment over his father's generosity. For the older son, virtue seems not to be its own reward. For all his honorable toil and loyalty, there seems to be no celebration. The father, however, is prodigal in his forgiveness and mercy. He expects the same generosity from his older son. He wants all to rejoice when the lost one is found.

This is a Sunday for rejoicing. It's time to pause, consider, and encourage one another. We are the prodigal children heading home. We are the elder siblings waiting with the eager Father, who scans the horizon. In Christ Jesus we are reconciled to the Father and one another. In his death and resurrection we have passed over. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION : One of the first steps to a Catholic wedding takes place in the parish rectory, as the newly engaged come forward to "set a date." We owe this scenario to reforms made by the emperor Charlemagne late in the eighth century. He required that nobles and commoners alike have public weddings, and also required that marrying couples be examined for factors that would block a marriage, such as previous marriages or close kinship. The pope was more conservative, however, and resisted the emperor's creativity. It was enough for the pope that the couples exchange consent.

That tradition is passed on to this day, to some couples' surprise. In 866, Pope Nicholas ruled that a marriage was legal and binding even without a liturgy or public celebration. After that, it was the consent of the couple, not the blessing of parents or priest, that made a marriage "count." If consent was lacking, such as through abduction or fear, then the marriage could not "take." Charlemagne got a great deal done, but he was a political flash in the pan, and the empire had virtually collapsed by the year 1000. Europe broke into a checkerboard of princedoms and languages, and at last all marriages came under the church, the glue holding the known world together. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Hungering to Learn in Honduras: A Story of Hope:

Mayra's story: Two years ago, Mayra was not a star student. She was very shy in the classroom and struggled with simple math and reading lessons. She often missed homework assignments and, some days, did not go to school. Her teacher noticed and enrolled Mayra in the school's tutoring program. In the months that followed, Mayra and Fabricio, her tutor and classmate, spent many afternoons practicing reading and writing stories together. They made up games to practice math. And when they were done, they jumped rope and played in their neighborhood. In the process, the two became good friends. "Fabricio never looked down on me because I had trouble learning," says Mayra. "He always treated me well." The extra attention was what Mayra really needed. She lives with her grandmother, Lucia, who works hard to take care of Mayra. She picks coffee on a nearby farm and does laundry to earn money to put food on the table. But this means she doesn't always have time to help Mayra with her school work. In fact, like many people her age, Lucia cannot read. That's why Fabricio's help was so important. Today, Mayra is proud of her reading and math skills. She does her homework and goes to class on time. She is more confident and has a new group of friends. Mayra wants to be a teacher one day. But first, she will become a tutor so she can help her classmates-just as Fabricio helped her..

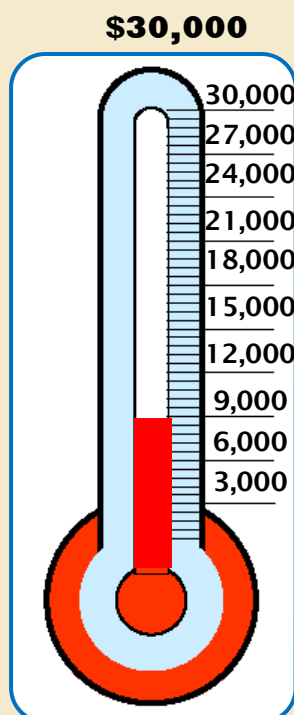
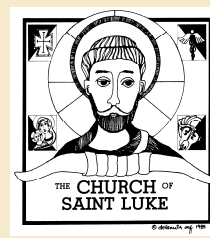
Annual Catholic Appeal San Diego Diocese Goal for Saint Luke
