

REFLECTION ON TODAY'S GOSPEL

"And I tell you, ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks, receives; and the one who seeks, finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened. What father among you would hand his son a snake when he asks for a fish? Or hand him a scorpion when he asks for an egg? If you then, who are wicked, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the Father in heaven give the holy Spirit to those who ask him?" Lk 11:1-13

Reflection: Reflect upon/Share about your prayer life. What is it like? In what ways has God answered your prayers, or seemingly not answered them, in the past? How have you experienced his giving you the Holy Spirit? How can you open yourself more to his Spirit?





From the Pastor



Dear Parishioners,

This last Sunday we had two readings which dealt with the virtue of hospitality. In the first reading, Abraham offered hospitality to the three strangers who turned out to be a visit from God. The way the story is told, he wanted to offer them hospitality and he did it energetically. He foresaw their needs and gave them a sumptuous meal, provided for bathing their feet and had them recline in the shade of the tree before continuing their journey.

He wasn't just being nice. This was a requirement for ancient Jews. They were required to take care of the alien in their midst and they should understand their needs, as Scripture says, because they were once aliens in Egypt (Ex 22:21, Lev 19:34 and Deut 10:19). There are several other places in Scripture which deal with the requirement of hospitality to strangers.

Martha, on the other hand, was fulfilling the rule of giving hospitality but she found it a burden. I think that is one of the reasons that Jesus says, Mary has chosen the better part. It made me think of our current world situation with so many refugees and how burdensome it has been to the countries that have had to deal with the refugee crisis. I don't have the best mind for world affairs but, like the rest of us, I can see what is going on.

I've seen a bit of it first hand as we have been serving, for several weeks now, refugees who used to be in Brazil but are now seeking asylum in the U.S. Evidently Brazil is dealing with severe financial difficulties and the refugees there are trying to get to other countries. Somehow they have been coming through Mexico and we at Desayunador, where I volunteer on Tuesdays, have been taking care of many of the male refugees as they await transport to the U.S. Other organizations help them too. I know that Casa de Migrantes, for one, is helping many of them too.

Most of them came from Haiti originally. I haven't been able to speak much with them because most of them speak French. I don't know what happens to them but I do know they are transported to the border from where they are taken to some kind of shelter while their cases are being considered.

I was surprised that it was Haitians that have been showing up. I would have expected people from Iraq and the other places in the Middle-East who have been impacted by what we are calling radical Islam. (My complaint is that radical is from the Latin *radice* which means root and really implies going back to the basics. Who knew how we would warp language.)

Immigration of refugees is a serious problem for most countries because of the financial burden that comes with it. There is also the issue of culture clash which every immigrant culture has experienced in this country. But, if Scripture means anything to us, we must try to do something.

❖ PARISH FINANCES ❖

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

KEEP PRAYING

St. Monica, whose feast we celebrate in August, is often known as “the persistent mother.” She watched her oldest son, Augustine, turn his back on his Christian faith. Monica was exasperated. For years she gave up talking directly to her son on the advice of a local bishop, who told her that it was better to talk to God about Augustine than to Augustine about God. The mother never gave up praying for her son. Eventually Augustine gave up his wild ways, was baptized, and later ordained and named bishop of Hippo. St. Augustine went on to become one of the Church’s greatest scholars.

Today’s readings address the importance of persistent prayer. Abraham, in spite of trepidation that he is bothering the Lord, continues to ask about the fate of Sodom and Gomorrah. Jesus, in Luke’s Gospel, tells his disciples to “ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you” (Luke 11:9). This is our charge: keep praying. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Sometimes when bishops are consecrated, they are not given the care of a diocese as an “ordinary.” A very old tradition, however, assures that they are invested with a “see,” a link with a local church. Many hundreds of places around the world were dioceses at one time, but are no longer. In England, for example, some of the historic dioceses such as London, Salisbury, and Manchester ceased to be Catholic at the Reformation and their cathedrals passed to the Church of England. The reestablishment of the Catholic Church in the nineteenth century meant that new dioceses had to be created, such as at Liverpool and Westminster. Similarly, in Scandinavia the ancient Catholic dioceses vanished under Lutheranism. In North Africa, tiny dioceses disappeared under the sands or were swept away by Islam.

In the United States, some original dioceses never really developed as population centers, such as the old dioceses of Bardstown, Vincennes, Sault Ste. Marie, or Walla Walla. The tradition of “titular sees” assures that the ancient churches are always held in prayer, as the bishop celebrates Mass in its memory a few times a year. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. 

