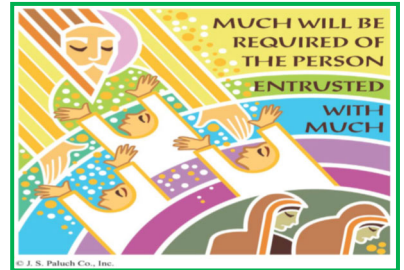

REFLECTION ON TODAY'S GOSPEL

"Gird your loins and light your lamps and be like servants who await their master's return from a wedding, ready to open immediately when he comes and knocks. Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival..."

That servant who knew his master's will but did not make preparations nor act in accord with his will shall be beaten severely..." Lk 12:35-37b & 47

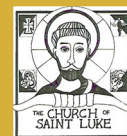

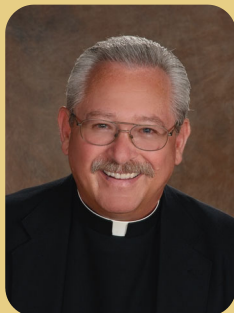

From the Pastor



Dear parishioners,

I just made a shawarma with *Khobuz Raqaq*, I think, made by Hanna's mother the week before she died. Hanna had taken a video of her rolling out the dough and she got tired and quit after a few rolls. I thought she was so cute in that video that I asked Hanna to send it to me which she did and I now have a memorial of her mother that I will cherish forever.

I didn't know her mother but I know Hanna. To have raised Hanna to be the committed Christian that she is, one who lives out her Christianity in service to others, tells me that her mother was a great person. I see the same gentleness which Hanna has in the video.

I first wanted a copy of the video because she was making *Khobuz Raqaq*. That is probably the unleavened bread the Hebrew people made when they were leaving slavery in Egypt and probably what our Lord used at the Last Supper.

It's made without leavening and rolled into a relatively large circle, sometimes into so large a circle that it is folded into quarters, and baked. The baking makes it hard, almost cracker-like. To use it, you run water over it, both sides, and wrap it in a towel until it softens. You can simply pull it apart and eat it, like Jesus and the apostles probably did, or use it roll it up over meat and lettuce and other things to make a shawarma.

I should probably tell you now that I didn't make a Middle-eastern shawarma. I used what I happened to have on hand which happened to be carne asada, romaine, some kind of interesting cucumber that Hanna gave me, tomatoes from her garden and a mayonnaise based sauce that I made up myself. I hope that doesn't offend our Middle-eastern friends but I thoroughly enjoyed it. By the way, Tacos al Pastor, if you've ever had them from one of the street-taco stands come from a Middle Eastern influence.

Oh... and Hanna had given me the *Khobuz Raqaq* too. She gave me two which her mom had rolled out in the video. I'm so excited about that. I ate one but I'm saving the other one to shellac and mount in a frame as a reminder of her mom and of our Lord's Last Supper. I have a wall of sacred, to me, items in my prayer corner where it will take its place.

Right now the wall has Swanson's painting of Psalm 85, a print of an ancient Egyptian religious ceremony on papyrus, a Jewish prayer shawl and yarmulke, an Irish carved pelican, a painting of St. Kevin and Rublev's Old Testament Trinity, among other things I've collected over the years. It also has a remembrance of a Vietnamese parishioner who died when I was relatively new to St. Luke. Even though she didn't understand or speak English, she brought her great-grandchildren to Mass every Sunday. Her daughter, grand-daughter and great-grandchildren are still parishioners.

The physical is very important to us. God made us that way and the physical can help us touch into the spiritual. Many of us have items which help us remember relationships with others. I highly recommend collecting items that help us touch in to our relationship with God.

PARISH FINANCES

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

OUR FATHER IN FAITH

The Letter to the Hebrews today sings a hymn of praise to Abraham and to his faith, upon which are founded the religions of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. Abraham is called "father" in faith by more people on earth than anybody else, numerous as the sands of the seashore or the stars of the heavens. Hebrews tells us it was this foundational faith that led Abraham to obey God's call when he heard it, though he was called to journey to a land he did not know and told he would father a mighty race through a marriage he thought was barren. But Abraham's faith, the author of Hebrews tells us, was his realization of what he hoped for, and the evidence of what he could not see. How often are we, in simple daily events of our own Christian vocation, called to an unfamiliar place or told we are to do something we do not believe we can? TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Last week's "Treasure" noted that the official headgear of the pope, the tiara, has been set aside in favor of the miter. Although Pope Paul VI had a coronation in 1963 to begin his ministry as pope, he later gave his tiara away to the Catholics of the United States as a stimulus to end poverty. He took care to say that he was not abolishing the tradition of coronation, but his successor, Pope John Paul I, decided to have an inauguration to begin his tragically short term. His successors have chosen inauguration as well. Pope John Paul II felt that a return to the coronation custom would be inappropriate since the Church was mourning the sudden death of a man already nicknamed "The Laughing Pope."

So the end of coronations came about not because Paul VI gave the crown away. There are more than twenty tiaras on hand at the Vatican. One is used every year to crown the famous statue of St. Peter, whose sandaled foot has been eroded to a bright shine by the hands of millions of pilgrims. Today, it is left to the individual pope to decide whether he will begin his formal reign with a coronation or an inauguration. Pope Benedict chose an inauguration, as did Pope Francis.
