

From the Pastor



Dear Parishioners,
As I pray the Mass, the most striking words for me are "Do this in remembrance of me." I've read a lot about this and have often reflected upon these words. It seems important to me to understand what he meant by "do this" and what the "remembrance" thing is all about. I wonder what the first hearers, the apostles, heard and how the Church's understanding of these words developed over time.

It seems to me that, if the Last Supper was set within the context of the Passover Seder meal, the Apostles would have experienced the whole thing as a remembrance (a not-forgetting) of the saving works of God during the exodus of the Hebrew people from slavery in Egypt. My understanding, from what I have been taught, is that the Seder is a making-present, to current generations, of the suffering of the Hebrew people in slavery and the saving act of God which brought them out of that.

When the Apostles heard him say to do the Seder in remembrance of Him, they must have recognized, from their experience of Him, that He is the saving act of God even though they had not experienced His saving death and resurrection yet. I doubt if they could have possibly known fully to what He was referring. Even though Scripture seems to indicate that Jesus knew about His impending death, the Apostles seemed to not have gotten it yet.

Jesus would have probably broken the bread at the time the vegetables, bitter herbs and lamb were served as was the practice in His time. In current day Judaism, there is no lamb served at this time because without the temple, there is no paschal lamb sacrificed. Instead, the middle matzah is broken and a piece hidden until the end of the meal to represent the messiah who is not considered present at this time. I think this is significant since the bread, to us, becomes the lamb who was slain, Jesus the messiah.

It seems obvious to me that the synoptic Gospels portray the Last Supper as a progression from making the saving acts of God at the Exodus present to making the saving acts of God in Jesus present to our day and time. I don't know why the early Church started celebrating Eucharist every week but it seems obvious from Acts 20:7 and 1 Corinthians 16:2 that they did. The story of the Martyrs of Abitina gives a practical explanation as to why, "We cannot exist without the Mass. The Mass is made by Christians and the Mass makes us Christian."

The Mass makes us Christian, the Mass makes us the Body of Christ. The attestation of this which I like best comes from St. Augustine of Hippo's sermon 272 wherein he tells us to be a member of the body of Christ, in our daily living, to verify the "amen" we make when we receive the Eucharist. I see this as the same as Paul's admonition, in Romans 12, to offer our bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God as our true and proper worship.

When Jesus said "do this in remembrance of me", He meant so much more than simply attending Mass every Sunday. He must have meant to offer ourselves as He was making an offering of himself. The early Church seemed to know this theologically but there is evidence that they struggled to help the attendees enter fully into it as we do today. I even struggle myself, at times, but I am always touched by those words, "Do this in remembrance of me."

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program. The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

PREPARE THE WAY

Saint John the Baptist appears on the scene today as Advent enters its second week. The mysterious consumer of locusts and wild honey, John echoes the words of the prophet Isaiah as he calls for repentance in the face of the nearness of the kingdom of heaven. The rhythms of the Christian life are often confounding. Each year we meet the Baptist and hear his calls for repentance. Each year we see him pointing to the one who is coming after him, the Lord Jesus. Yet each year the words and actions of John the Baptist echo anew in our hearts, because we have fallen into old sinful traps again and again. Advent gives us the opportunity once again to turn away from our sinful ways and embrace the gospel way of life. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Did St. Francis of Assisi invent the Christmas crib? Not exactly, but his devotion to the Incarnation and his love for the poverty of the Christ Child certainly popularized this beloved custom. Long before Francis, it was a custom at the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome to enshrine a rich image of Mary, gilded and bejewelled, embracing the child Jesus. This church was founded as a kind of home for the feast of Christmas in the fourth century. In 1223, Francis was ready to celebrate this feast in a new way. In the tiny city of Greccio, he asked friends to prepare a place where they could experience the poverty and suffering embraced by Christ in his birth. It was a living scene: an ox from the barn, an ass from the stable, and peasants standing in for shepherds and kings. The night of the celebration was beautiful, the weather was warm, and people came in crowds, bearing candles and singing hymns that echoed through the forest. Francis himself chanted the Gospel and preached. The custom spread quickly, and by the sixteenth century cribs were seasonal features not only in church, but in the home.

On December 17, the liturgy begins to unfold the Lord's birth before us, and it's the right time to follow this beautiful tradition. In Germany, each night throughout Advent children prepare a bedding for the manger. At bedtime prayer, a child places a single straw in the manger for each act of devotion or virtue performed during the day. If the children are good, then the Christ child will have plenty of soft bedding when he is placed in the manger on Christmas. --Rev. James Field, Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co.





The Giving Tree

One of our parish traditions in preparing for Christmas is our community of disciples helping to bring comfort and joy to our brothers and sisters in need. Our annual Giving Tree effort primarily serves families in our local community as well as families across the border in Tijuana.



As many of you know, The Church St. Luke also sponsors the East County Christmas for Kids outreach effort that serves thousands of children attending Cajon Valley schools. This endeavor has grown over the past few years and continues to be a much needed source of joy to the families we serve. We are blessed to have many St. Luke disciples commit themselves to ensuring the fruitfulness of this labor and we look forward to spreading joy



Administering the Giving Tree project over the past twenty-five plus years has proven to be fruitful as well, but becomes more challenging in that our volunteer resources and the time demands placed on our parish families can be overwhelming. We seem to struggle more each year in getting the gifts purchased, wrapped, and delivered into the hands of the families by Christmas Day. To discontinue this particular effort is not something we would even consider because we know there is a tremendous need, not just at Christmastime, but throughout the year.

So here is our new plan:

We will continue to provide designated schools, organizations with the assistance they need. This year we are partnering with a select number of Cajon Valley schools, Crisis House, EJE Academies, El Nido (a project of the Interfaith Shelter Network) and Friends of the Poor.

In the baptistery, you will find gift tags with labels identifying the following specific needs:

- **Knit gloves/hats/scarves** (DO NOT WRAP). These gifts are for the "Friends of the Poor" ministry.

The messaging utility gives ministries, religious education, and other groups the ability to send out instant messages to fellow app users. This new tool will greatly improve inner-parish communications! All parishioners are welcomed and encouraged to sign up.

Here's how to get started:

From the text/message application on your smartphone—

-for apple devices Text stluke1 to 555888
-for android devices Text stluke2 to 555888

(no spaces between letters or number)

You will receive a message instructing you to download our app, just tap on the link and a new app icon will appear on your home screen bearing the face of St. Luke as you know him from our parish logo. It's easy!


