REFLECTION ON TODAY'S GOSPEL

Jesus took Peter, John, and James and went up the mountain to pray. While he was praying his face changed in appearance and his clothing became dazzling white...Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good that we are here; let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." But he did not know what he was saying. While he was still speaking, a cloud came and cast a shadow over them, and they became frightened when they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my chosen Son; listen to him." Lk 9:28-35

Reflection: Think about/share about the voices which clamor for attention in your life. Where is Jesus' voice among those? What can you do to allow Jesus' voice more attention? How can you better "listen to him?"

Alternative: Tell about someone who helped you learn the difference between right and wrong in your life? How is this like listening to Jesus? How can you listen better?

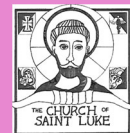

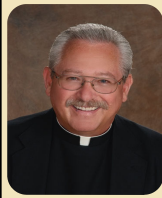

FROM: THE PASTOR

PREVIOUS COLUMN FROM 1-18-15



Dear Parishioners,

Every once and a while a parent will tell me about, or ask about, discussing the Sunday Mass readings with their kids. It is amazing, at times, how well young people have heard the readings and how insightful their comments can be. I highly recommend the practice of families discussing the readings and have what I hope will be a few helpful ideas.

The first helpful hint I have is don't overdo it. Children, depending on their age, have a very straightforward way of dealing with life. The depths to which adult minds like to go, oftentimes make no sense to children. For example, a child who wants to know where rainbows come from will probably be more satisfied to hear that it's the way the Sun shines on moisture in the air than to hear an in depth discussion of refraction.

For the beginning your discussion, you might want to review the content of the Gospel with your children. You might start by asking them what they remember from the Gospel. Be prepared to help them get started or to help them fill in the missing pieces from what they initially remember. This means that you have to know the Gospel for that Sunday pretty well.

You might prepare yourself by reading the Gospel before Mass and familiarizing yourself with the basic elements of that Sunday's selection. You can do this by referring to Scriptural meditation books like *Give us This Day or the Magnificat*. You can also use one of the *Lectionary apps* for you smartphone or iPad (I use *iMissal* on both my Android phone and my iPad). Or, you can go to the USCCB website <http://www.usccb.org/bible/readings/>.

I think it is enough for young people to simply know the content of the stories. As they get older they will discover the connection between the stories and their day-to-day lives. Also, the translation we use at Mass may be difficult for younger children. It is probably better for younger children to go out for Children's Liturgy of the Word, offered during the Sunday Masses, which uses a translation more oriented toward children's abilities.

The Gospel selections are either stories about Jesus, what he said and did, or stories which Jesus told and through which he taught. You might want to help your child distinguish between the two and learn that the teaching stories are called parables. Each Gospel selection, though, has some application to our day-to-day lives and teaches us how to live as true disciples. Hopefully, our homilies at The Church of St. Luke will help us discover those connections.

If you want to go to more depth with your child you might ask why they think they remembered whatever part of the Gospel they did remember. Or, in the case of parables, ask why they think Jesus told a story about a person who did... If it's a story about what Jesus said and did, you might ask why they think the Church picked out this story to remember and hand down. I don't think the questions we ask are anywhere near as important as what is lingering in their minds and hearts after they have heard the Gospel.

I'd like to emphasize that I think what is remaining in their minds and hearts is what is important. I think it is better for us to help them reflect on those things than to replace those things with what was important to us. I think those things are part of the dialogue God is having with your child and I think our job is to facilitate that dialogue.

That said, I think it is also important for us to share the dialogue we are having with God. I think one of the best ways to help children engage Scripture is for a parent to share how they have engaged Scripture. You might start with something like "You know, what struck me in this Gospel passage was...", "It made me think about..."

Good luck. Let me know if any of this helps you. If you have been sharing Scripture with your child and have some tips for the rest of us. Let me know. I'll try to pass it along.

PARISH FINANCES

In order to fulfill our budget, we need to collect an average of \$12,722 in the collection basket each week. Some weeks may be higher and some lower but we need to maintain that average. Additionally, we have budgeted for an average of \$12,802 to be contributed monthly through our Online Giving contribution program.

The total amount budgeted through these sources is \$660,095 this year. Our budget includes another \$106,384 expected income from other sources; (Annual Catholic Appeal rebates, Christmas & Easter collections, Sacramental Donations, Interest, One-time gifts & bequests, etc.).

WE ARE TO BE TRANSFORMED

Today's showing forth of God's glory is filled with a light that astonishes and reveals. Jesus transfigured on Mount Tabor energizes even the sleepy apostles, who see but cannot get hold of it. They can be forgiven for not apprehending the full meaning of this extraordinary vision of a transfigured Jesus with Elijah and Moses. The whole of the Law and prophets is summed up here on this mountain.

The transfiguration on Mount Tabor is handed over to us this Sunday. As Paul reminds us, it is we who are to be transformed. The light and life of the Resurrection are set forth here so we do not lose heart and fall entirely asleep. This Sunday looks to Easter. It looks to transformation. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The treasures of our tradition can often be traced to one source, but like the waters of a river branching out on its way to the sea, are received differently as they filter through various cultures and customs. Long ago, mostly because of the preparation of candidates for baptism, the annual feast of the Lord's death and resurrection was preceded by a period of preparation. In the West that comes to us as Lent, a word drawn from the Old English word for springtime, referring to the lengthening hours of sunlight in this hemisphere.

In the East, the tradition of preparing for Easter is received as "Great Lent," to distinguish it from a secondary "Lent" preceding Christmas, and a two-week period, a kind of "pre-Lent," that gradually introduces the faithful to the austerities of Great Lent. One of the major differences between East and West is in the vigor of the Lenten fast. In Great Lent the customs of fast and abstinence are far more strict than we are accustomed to. For us, meat is off our Lenten tables on Friday, but in the East, meat disappears from the diet completely, along with dairy products.

Giving , Cooperating, and Sharing

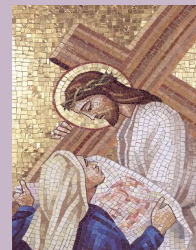

Hungering for Opportunity in Laos: A Story of Hope:

Hongkam lives close to where she grew up in Nongdeune, Laos, with her husband and their five boyw. Her husband is a farmer, and her family relied on his crops for food and income. When Hongkam's husband got sick, the family had to sell a low of what they owned-including their land-to -pay for medicine, Soon, the family faced real hunger. Then Hongkham found an opportunity to use her love of cooking to help her family and community through CRS's school literacy and hunger program. She volunteers as a cook at her children's school, which provides free school lunches for students, literacy training for teachers and principals, and nutrition training. Hogkham uses that training tin the school kitchen-and when she's cooking for her family at home. She also receives a monthly ration of food to take home, which helps her family grow and thrive. But the best part about CRS' program is that students are learning to read and write. The children return to school after morning classes to receive their free and nutritious lunch. She sees the change in her own children-in their studies and their health. As human beings, we have the right to live and grow in peace. Because we have that right, we have the responsibility to make sure others too, enjoy the same opportunity.

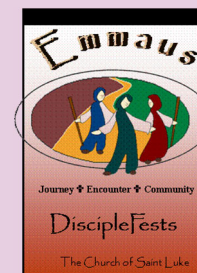
