



The SAFE Homes Program is a home modification program that offers a basic home safety evaluation, education, environmental modifications and adaptive equipment to older adults who are concerned about falling. 



Religious Has anyone ever asked you what you believe about your faith and you weren't sure how to answer them? Recite the Nicene Creed. In 325 AD at the Council of Nicea the Nicene Creed was adopted as the true expression of our faith. Our faith is Trinitarian, we believe in the

Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit which is stated in the creed, Incarnation, Paschal Mystery, Eschatology (death, judgement, heaven and hell), the Four Marks of the Church. It's all there in the creed.



Dear Padre'

Question: What's the big deal over mortal sin? Mortal Sin, in Catholic theology, is a gravely wrongful act, which can lead to eternal damnation if a person is not absolved of the sin(s) before death. A sin is considered to be "mortal" when its quality is such that it leads to a separation

of that person from God's saving grace. In Roman Catholic moral theology, a mortal sin requires that the following conditions are met:

- 1. Its subject-matter must be a grave (or serious).
- 2. It must be committed with full knowledge (and awareness) of the sinful action and the gravity of the offense. It must be committed with deliberate and complete consent

St. Louis IX, King of France, once asked a friend, "Tell me, what would you rather do, commit a mortal sin or become a leper?" The friend replied, "Your Majesty, I would sooner commit thirty mortal sins than be a leper." The king responded sadly, "My poor friend, that just goes to show that you really don't understand what a mortal sin really is."

It's ironic that in one sense there is this similarity that they both corrupt and kill, so mortal sin is the leprosy of the soul. Without repentance, just one mortal sin is all it takes to separate one from God. Despite its gravity, a person can repent of having committed a mortal sin... that is confession of that sin. Such repentance can, in turn, enable a person to obtain absolution and come back into God's graces. This is why the common theme of seeking God's mercy is always the most important..."Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." ~Padre' Jerrv

Matthew Bible Study: The King and His Kingdom is an exciting study that explores the life and mission of Jesus as recorded in the Gospel. Matthew demonstrates how the promises and prophecies of the Old Testament are fulfilled in Christ, who establishes a New Law and inaugurates the Kingdom of Heaven on earth. This liturgical year we are hearing from Mathew at Mass. This DVD study will help us understand more of what we hear. As participants we will see Jesus as the awaited Messiah who relives the life and struggles of Israel to become the faithful and victorious King. This study is set in the rich context of Jesus' Jewish culture and will help participants understand who Jesus is and what his life and teachings mean for us today.
