LOVE - THE GIFT THAT ENDURES

Over the past few months our local communities have experienced the tragic loss of two very special teenage boys, Sean Dixon and Joshua Mileto. Sean was a Patchogue-Medford High School student, a lacrosse player with an infectious optimism and parishioner here at St. Sylvester. Josh was a Sachem East High School Student, a football and baseball player and Homecoming King. Sean courageously fought a rare form of bone cancer for two years, having a leg amputated in the process, but always kept his faith and kept smiling. Josh went to football camp one day and never returned, suffering a fatal accident in front of his teammates right on the field.

The manner in which Sean handled his illness was an inspiration to all throughout the Pat-Med area, especially to those whose lives he personally touched. "Team Sean" held fundraisers like the Octoberfest in Medford Memorial Park and basket auctions at the school. Local pizzerias, bars and restaurants all pitched in, holding fundraisers or supplying food when needed. There were Easter egg hunts, hat and t-shirt sales, comedy nights and sports team and gym fundraisers — to name just a few. Community members organized vigils and offered support in a myriad of public and private ways. A "Go Fund Me" page raised over \$74,000 and many more quietly made donations of all kinds. There was something special, perhaps intangibly so, about Sean. Reflecting back, I believe it was his calming and peaceful presence and his strong will to live. Sean publicly journeyed with Christ, suffered with Christ and now shares in His resurrection. Jesus proclaimed, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die..." John 11:25-26.

Sean's presence changed his family and friends, his faith community and staff here at St. Sylvester, his school and sports communities and the Suffolk County Police Department (where he was sworn in as Detective for a Day) for the better. His healing Mass in August packed the church as if it was Easter Sunday; likewise his recent funeral Mass which included both the police and fire departments. All prayed for a miracle — that Sean's cancer would disappear. What we found in the end was that Sean was instead *our* miracle; bringing the community together in a profound and gentle way. At his funeral Mass, Fr. Tom asked those in attendance what Sean taught them as he journeyed with them. One of the responses was, "How to love and be loved." One cannot ask for a more beautiful, poignant legacy. He taught by example, forever changing hearts and minds.

Josh was a friend and classmate of my younger daughter. He was respectful and kind; the one with the great laugh; a student-athlete genuinely liked by his peers — no small accomplishment. The news of his sudden, tragic death on the football field sent waves of grief through the Sachem community. What I witnessed in the days and weeks that followed was also a miracle of the human spirit. The local fire department opened its doors without question to my daughter and her friends and schoolmates, offering them a place to gather together. Neighborhood delis, pizzerias and countless others brought food and desserts for them all. The Sachem East Cheerleaders held a car wash, memorial t-shirts and sweatshirts were sold by others and a "Go Fund Me" page set up online to raise \$15,000 for his family to help with expenses brought in nearly \$85,000 in just a few days!

Josh's friends surrounded his family and his girlfriend with love and support and worked out a plan among themselves where no teen would be left alone to grieve. No parent told them to do it, they just did it — it came from within. These 16-year-old young people were truly "Sachem Strong" for all! Large memorial bows in Sachem colors were hung (and still hang) all over the community, and the day of Josh's funeral hundreds lined the streets of his hometown, Farmingville, from the high school all the way to the church doors in Lake Ronkonkoma. In death, Josh too brought his community together to love and care for one another and that love and support continues.

In both cases, these two neighboring communities showed Long Island what Stewardship really means. They shared selflessly of their time, their talents and their treasure spontaneously, giving back without question for the gifts that had been received in knowing these two fine young men. May kindness continue to define these communities as a testament to them both.

What is Children's Liturgy of the Word?

Children's Liturgy of the Word is when right after the opening prayer, but before the readings, children are called up by the priest and accompanied by Catechists to the Worship Room in the Parish Center. There, they hear and reflect on the readings at an age appropriate level, sing the Responsorial Psalm, the Gospel Acclamation and recite a simple Creed before returning to the church to join the rest of the community for the Liturgy of the Eucharist. This will take approximately 20 minutes. During this time the adults and anyone else in the church will be hearing the readings as they usually do.

On Racial Justice and "Taking a Knee": Reflections from a Former Cheerleader

In my eight years cheerleading and additional three years as a coach, I always enjoyed the sidelines. One of the traditions I learned quickly and remember fondly is that of taking a knee when a player is injured—any player, regardless of which team. Both sides of football players and cheerleaders would take a knee for however long that player was down, until he got back up and we would all rise, applaud, and resume the game.

Again, we made mistakes here, too. Being on the sidelines in between fans with an elevated view of the whole field and a line of (usually) very tall football players, we cheerleaders (on average, not as tall, and unless we happened to be a flyer in a stunt at the time) did not always see every play on the field. Therefore, we would have the unfortunate, awkward moment at times of being mid-cheer when a player got injured, still cheering until we realized what had happened and quickly followed suit to take a knee. The cheer would wind down like a ripple, prompted either by dirty looks and shh's from the stands, or by reacting belatedly seeing other players and cheerleaders take a knee. We would follow, even if we couldn't see the injured player. Even if we didn't see the play. Even if we didn't know which team the player was from. Even if we didn't quite understand what had happened or how the injury occurred. Even if it wasn't convenient to kneel. Even in the rain, kneeling in the mud. We took a knee because someone was in pain. No matter what jersey they wore, what color they were sporting, which school they represented. We took a knee because, for a moment, humanity, empathy, compassion, were more important than the game. The game stopped and we were all one. And we all cheered when he got up.

Sadly, I'm not surprised but am deeply disturbed by the racism on display, and the recent disparaging remarks from leadership in our country about players' rights to express themselves and draw attention to grave racial injustices. However, I am a bit perplexed at how any football fan familiar with this tradition of taking a knee doesn't see the reverence and deep significance of what Colin Kaepernick and others are doing. To use football as a metaphor, with the field representing society, a player taking a knee recognizes that there is hurt and pain among us—that we ought to bow down to recognize that suffering.

The patriotic or team-player thing to do seems to be to take a page from our cheerleading mistake playbook and set the embarrassment, confusion, or temporary ignorance aside and just take a knee alongside your teammates, recognizing that someone is in pain and our humanity is more important at this moment in time. We may not have been on the front lines of the hurt and pain of the injustice, we may not have had a bird's eye view of it, we may be just catching up, not realizing the extent of the hurt yet, we may make mistakes and be embarrassed, but that doesn't mean we don't start by taking a knee and catching up on why after.

If you're still confused about the reason for the hurt and pain that Colin Kaepernick and others are acknowledging and calling attention to, let's listen to those who are on the front lines of racial injustice or who have a bird's eye view. Let's dialogue. Let's watch and read the news. Let's read and refresh our historical knowledge about racial injustice, and understand that there's a long, deep history of racial injustice in our country and in our world that is alive and well today. But let's not get defensive and pretend it doesn't exist just because we don't initially see it, or insist that it's disrespectful to take a knee or that the game, or the flag, or the song, are more important than the actual humans that all these symbols are really about and really meant to represent.

Because if we let the flag itself, or the anthem itself, become greater than our ability to relate to one another's humanity, pain, and suffering, are the flag and anthem really worth anything anymore? If there's anything I learned in cheerleading that's stayed with me, it's valuing that moment of solidarity, of reverence, and acknowledgment of the pain and suffering of another human being as being important enough to stop time, and to come together and cheer when they rise again.

But Wait, There's More!!!

As you can see from the picture below, the exterior work necessary on the parish center's two original cracks in the foundation has been completed. The crew excavated 10 feet down, sealed the cracks from the outside and refilled and graded the dirt. As the dirt settles, it may be necessary to add a little more. The final cost was \$17,000 which is not covered by insurance.

Unfortunately, we recently discovered another large puddle of water on the floor downstairs coming from the other side of the parish center near the men's room. The bad news is that there is a hole in the foundation which must be sealed. In order to do this we must excavate the area in front of the East Wing. Unfortunately this is not covered by insurance, and the final cost will be determined after further investigation. As a result of this latest find, we have decided to remove a strip of sheetrock along the entire bottom of the parish center lower level.

to ensure there aren't any other issues lurking unseen. This additional work will also not be covered by insurance, but at this point it needs to be done as a proactive measure to prevent more excavation bills in the future.


