



What happens in Holy Week?



Palm Sunday March 25 (Sat. 5pm, Sun. 9am and 11am)

This mass commemorates Jesus triumphal entry to Jerusalem.

- All masses begin with the blessing and procession of palms.
- Children are welcome to join the procession up the main aisle.
- The Passion Gospel is read at all Masses.



Holy Thursday March 29 - 7pm

This mass commemorates the Last Supper of Jesus with his disciples, when he washed their feet after supper, to show that service is the meaning of his life.

- 12 parishioner will have their feet washed at this mass, just as Pope Francis washed the feet of prisoners, or refugees each year in Rome.

DARKNESS MAY BE THRUST UPON US

Have you ever been stuck in the dark? In the dark, it is hard to see, perception is changed, we don't know where to turn and search for even a glimmer of light. At times, darkness is thrust upon us: we grieve when people we love die or are struck with life-threatening illness; we ourselves may face physical, emotional, or spiritual darkness; life at home or work may be tense and stressful; the world is filled with turmoil. We search for meaning in such challenging moments and seek light through the darkness.

AT TIMES, WE CHOOSE TO HIDE

None of us likes to admit it, but sometimes, we hide from the light. We give in to temptation, fail to live as we know we ought, and through lack of prayer or participation in the sacraments, we keep God at a distance. We may tell ourselves that we want to grow closer to God, yet our attitudes, actions, and inactions do not bear out this desire. It is easier to go with the flow, even when that

means being unkind, selfish, or harshly or fail to care for others. We choose to remain in the shadows and hide from the light of God's face.

COME INTO THE LIGHT

As we continue through this season of Lent, we are invited to see in Christ the light of God's love and mercy. Lent is about making an intentional decision to follow Jesus more closely, turning away from the darkness that is of our own making, and trusting in God's eternal light when life is difficult and uncertain.

JESUS SHOWS US THE WAY

Throughout this month, especially during Holy Week, we come face-to-face with the full extent of God's love, the love in which we are created, and to which we are called. Jesus shows us that the light of God's love pierces every darkness, that which we choose and that of life situation or circumstance. Not only did Jesus endure suffering and death for us, he helps us understand that by seeking and living in the light, we will know God's love more powerfully than our human minds and hearts can fathom.

Impact

"Amen, amen I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit." (Jn 12:20-33)



In what ways are you called to lay down your life for others? How does your faith strengthen you in challenging moments? How do others help you to follow Jesus' self-giving way of love? At first, Emily wondered how they would ever do all that was to be done. Their third child was diagnosed with profound physical and learning needs. For many months, their joy in parenting and in life seemed to be replaced by dark emptiness. Their time was filled with doctor's assessments and therapists' instructions. Most days seemed a stream of ways in which she was needed, and putting those needs before the things she wanted was not always easy. In time, however, the new routines became comfortable, small progress was celebrated, and love carried them through it all.

The care of family and friends mattered more than Emily could express. She shared in gratitude the love that was shared with her family, and in the sharing, she experienced the presence of God more deeply than she thought possible. Emily began reflecting on the model of Jesus who gave his life out of love for all. She also ponders the example of Mary standing at the foot of the cross. Her daily tasks have taken on new meaning. Her world has expanded as she has found herself drawn to the needs of the parents who do not have others nearby who are willing to help.

Last year at about this time, Emily joined a small community of parents at her parish with children who have some special need. They share their daily joys and trials through the perspective of faith at regular meetings, and often they simply linger together. This week they will gather with their parish community for Holy Week. With all of us, they will be reminded that suffering and trial do not have the last word: new life awaits those who place their trust in Christ Jesus who suffered and endured trial for us all. And they will be renewed in their commitment to give of themselves, not only for their children, but for all whom they can touch with love.

The Ups and Downs of Faith

The poet, Rumi, suggests that we live with a deep secret that sometimes we know, then not, and then know again. That's a good description of faith. Faith isn't something you nail down and possess once and for all. It goes this way: Sometimes you walk on water and sometimes you sink like a stone.

The Gospels testify to this, most graphically, in the story of Peter walking on the water: Jesus asks Peter to step out of a boat and walk across the water to him. At first it works, Peter, unthinking, walks on the water, then becoming more conscious of what he is doing he sinks like a stone. We see this too in the massive fluctuations in belief that Jesus' disciples experience during the "forty days" after the resurrection. Jesus would appear to them, they would trust he was alive, then he would disappear again, and they would lose their trust and go back to the lives they'd led before they met him, fishing and the sea. The post-resurrection narratives illustrate the dynamics of faith pretty clearly: You believe it. Then you distrust. Then you believe it again. At least, so it seems on the surface.

We see another example of this in the story of Peter betraying Jesus. In Mark's Gospel, Jesus tells us that there is a secret which separates those who have faith from those who don't: To you is given the secret of the kingdom, but to those outside everything exists in parables. That sounds like Gnosticism, that is, the idea that there's a secret code somewhere (e.g., The Di Vinci Code) that some know and some don't and you are in or out depending upon whether you know it or not. But that's not what Jesus is saying here. His secret is an open one, accessible to all: the meaning of the cross. Anyone who understands this will understand the rest of what Jesus means, and vice versa. We are in or out, depending upon whether or not we can grasp and accept the meaning of Jesus' death.

But, being in or out isn't a once and for all thing. Rather, we move in and out! After Peter denied Jesus, we're told: "he went outside". This is intended both literally and metaphorically. After his denial, Peter stepped outside a gate into the night to be away from the crowd, but he also stepped outside the meaning of his faith.

Our faith also bounces up and down for another reason, we misunderstand how it works: Take for example the Rich Young Man who approaches Jesus with this question: "Good master, what must I do *to possess* eternal life?" That's an interesting choice of a verb: *to possess*. Eternal life as a possession? Jesus' gentle correction of the young man's verb teaches us something vital about faith. Jesus says to him: "Now if you wish *to receive* eternal life", meaning that faith and eternal life are not something you possess so that they can be stored and guarded like grain in a barn, money in a bank, or jewelry in a box. They can only be received, like the air we breathe. Air is free, is everywhere, and our health doesn't depend upon its presence, for it's always there, but rather upon the state of our lungs (and mood) at any given moment. Sometimes we breathe deeply and appreciatively; but, sometimes, for various reasons, we breathe badly, gasp for breath, are out of breath, or are choking for air. Like breathing, faith too has its modalities.

And so, we need to understand our faith not as a possession or as something we achieve once and for all, which can be lost only by some huge, dramatic, life-changing shift inside of us, where we move from belief to atheism. "Faith isn't some constant state of belief," suggests Abraham Heschel, "but rather a sort of faithfulness, a loyalty to the moments when we've had faith."


And that teases out something else: To be real, faith need not be explicitly religious, but can express itself simply in faith-fulness, loyalty, and trust. Fox example, in a powerful memoir written as she as dying of cancer, *The Bright Hour*, Annie Riggs shares her strong, but implicit, faith as she calmly faces her death. Not given to explicit religious faith, she is challenged at one point by a nurse who says to her: "Faith, you gotta have it, and you're gonna need it!" The comment triggers a reflection on her part about what she does or doesn't believe in. She comes to peace with the question and her own stake in it with these words: "For me, faith involves staring into the abyss, seeing that it is dark and full of the unknown - and being okay with that."

We need to trust the unknown, knowing that we will be okay, no matter that on a given day we might feel like we are walking on water or sinking like a stone. Faith is deeper than our feelings.
