

PASTORAL PONDERINGS

Take it from the person who just finished a healthy lunch and automatically knew where to find the sliver of chocolate cake to top off the meal. I'm no authority on building good habits.

I've often heard it takes 21 days to build a habit and recently, someone told me it can take 40 days. "Yikes!" I thought. So imagine my despair when, in preparing for this writing, the research revealed the average number of days to build a habit is 66! Apparently, building a habit in 21 days might be one such as drinking a full glass of water first thing every morning. More difficult to change is the immediate and automatic search for chocolate after a meal. Even more arduous is changing negative emotions such as worry, fear, anxiety, and regret, or unproductive behaviors and lifestyles.

Aristotle posited that "the good of a man is the working of the soul in a way of excellence in a complete life."

In his *Nicomachean Ethics* (Book II, 4; Book I, 7), Aristotle continues "Excellence...is not an act, but a habit." In other words, we are what we repeatedly do.

No one is alone with their list of ought-tos and shoulds. In our humanness we are susceptible to triggers we wish to avoid, and change to better habits for our own good and the good of others.

The new year is as good a time as any to try.

Ask for help and don't be wishy-washy. Identify what you wish to change, make a commitment to replace a bad habit with a good one, and then get started. Two are stronger than one, and our gracious God loves us more than we can love ourselves. He will support us. Taking time to prayerfully quiet our minds, gives us clarity and opens us to the new way God has for us.

Perhaps the time you take to quiet yourself in prayer will develop into one of those habits you'd like to continue building. Gradually you may find yourself naturally calm and with increased clarity in all you do. You may be able to handle a greater workload, respond steadily under pressure, uncover more joyful moments and renew your enthusiasm. EPIPHANY In gratitude... 

Sunday, December 31, 2017 Wisdom

Today's Readings: Sirach 3:2–6, 12–14 or Genesis 15:1–6; 21:1–3; Psalm 128:1–2, 3, 4–5 or Psalm 105:1–2, 3–4, 6–7, 8–9; Colossians 3:12–21 or Hebrews 11:8, 11–12, 17–19; Luke 2:22–40. In today's Gospel, Simeon announces that Jesus is God's salvation for the world, and that many will oppose him. He even tells Mary that she, too, would be pierced, foreshadowing the sorrow that overcomes her during the Passion. On this feast of the Holy Family, the Church is asked to ponder the mystery of salvation. Jesus, who is the Light of the World, will suffer so that all can share in salvation. In this Gospel, we hear again of the fulfillment of God's promise that the prophets foretold. While today's Gospel is certainly joyful, it also reminds families that suffering is part of the journey. Following the Gospel and working to reveal God's love and mercy in our world are often met with persecution and ridicule. The Holy Family teaches us that faith in God is necessary to endure suffering and to share the light of Christ.

As you discern the ways in which your family lives out the Gospel, take time to identify wisdom figures in your community and family. Listen to their stories and learn the ways their faith grew in the midst of joy and suffering. What can these wisdom figures teach you? Pray that your family remain strong in faith and trust in God's mercy.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, January 1 Mary, the Holy Mother of God

Today is the octave day of Christmas and the oldest Marian celebration in the Roman Catholic Church. The readings help us reflect on Mary's role in the Incarnation. Mary teaches us what it means to keep and contemplate the mystery of Christ within our heart. Because of her yes, we are no longer slaves but heirs to the Kingdom. Spend time in active, imaginative prayer today and dialogue with Mary to learn how to contemplate Jesus. *Today's Readings: Numbers 6:22–27; Psalm 67:2–3, 5, 6, 8; Galatians 4:4–7, Luke 2:16–21.*

Tuesday, January 2 Sts. Basil the Great and

Gregory of Nazianzen

Do you know when you fell in love with Christ? The First Reading tells us to keep within us what we heard from the beginning. What did you hear and when? Like Basil and Gregory, we rely on God's grace to help us witness to the truth of Christ and remain faithful. If the Gospel has taken root in our heart, then when it is proclaimed, we are roused to confess that Jesus is Lord. *Today's Readings:* 1 John 2:22–28; Psalm 98:1, 2–3ab, 3cd–4; John 1:19–28.

Wednesday, January 3

Behold

We hear the second line of today's Gospel just before we process to Communion. The words are a beautiful command to gaze upon Jesus and recognize him. John the Baptist knows that Jesus is the Messiah and wants others to encounter Jesus. Do you "behold" Christ in your daily life? Gather some friends and family to go Christmas caroling tonight to a nursing home or soup kitchen to help others behold the joy of the Incarnation. *Today's Readings: 1 John 2:29–3:6; Psalm 98:1, 3cd–4, 5–6; John 1:29–34.*

Thursday, January 4 St. Elizabeth Ann Seton

"Come and see" is the message found in today's Gospel. Jesus invited Andrew and the other disciple to follow him. Like the two disciples, we too are invited to follow and learn from the Teacher. St. Elizabeth heard this call and responded by opening schools and orphanages to aid her community. Christ has shown us how to live, but do we have the courage to follow him? Consider researching the Sisters of Charity today and preparing gift baskets for the poor in your community. *Today's Readings: 1 John 3:7–10; Psalm 98:1, 7–8, 9; John 1:35–42.*

Friday, January 5

St. John Neumann

The First Letter of John continues to preach about God's love and the need to love one another. In the Gospel, new disciples continue to respond to the invitation to "come and see." In Baptism, we made our initial response. This response requires the type of love and action the saint we celebrate today personified. The love of Christ leads us to share the Good News. Reach out to the unloved in your community and see the face of Christ. *Today's Readings: 1 John 3:11–21; Psalm 100:1b–2, 3, 4, 5; John 1:43–51.*

Saturday, January 6 Faith

In the First Reading, John turns his attention from the theme of love to the topic of faith. He tells his listeners that Jesus is truly God's Son, to which the Spirit, water (Baptism), and blood (Eucharist) continue to testify. When we look at this in light of the entire Epistle, we learn that those who have faith in God's Son, have eternal life. The Gospel affirms that Jesus is God's Son and so like Jesus, our Baptism calls us to proclaim God's Kingdom. Find a hymn in the parish's hymnal that speaks to the mission of Baptism and faith. Use this for prayer today. *Today's Readings: 1 John 5:5–13; Psalm 147:12–13, 14–15, 19–20; Mark 1:7–11 or Luke 3:23–38.*

WORLD DAY OF PEACE 2018 "MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES: MEN AND WOMEN IN SEARCH OF PEACE"

On January 1, 2018, we celebrate the 51st anniversary of the World Day of Peace. In his annual Peace Day message titled "Migrants and Refugees: Men and Women in Search of Peace," Pope Francis reminded us that there are over 250 million migrants worldwide, of whom 22.5 million are refugees. He asked Christians everywhere to embrace those who risk their lives, often on long and dangerous journeys, who experience hardships and suffering, and who encounter fences and walls built to prevent them from reaching their goal of finding peace.

Pope Francis identified four "mileposts for action" necessary to give migrants, refugees, asylum seekers, and trafficking victims the opportunity to find peace. These include:

- 1. **Welcoming:** expanding legal pathways for entry that better balance national security and fundamental human rights concerns.
- 2. **Protecting:** recognizing and defending "the inviolable dignity of those who flee."
- 3. **Promoting:** providing the fundamental components for human development of migrants and refugees, e.g. education.
- 4. **Integrating**: allowing migrants and refugees to be full participants in the society that is their new home. This will enrich both those arriving and those welcoming.

The Pope reminds us that it is not enough just to open our hearts to the suffering of our brothers and sisters. Much more must to be done to allow them to live peacefully in a safe home. Welcoming them demands a concrete commitment, a network of assistance and goodwill, and vigilant and sympathetic attention..."

WHAT WE CAN DO?

- **Pray** for the grace to approach issues around migrants and refugees from a starting point of faith, compassion and justice.
- Learn how our community might learn from other faith communities who are welcoming migrants and refugees.

SCHOOL SCENE By Julie Lemke, 2nd Grade Teacher

During this Advent season, St. Joseph Parish School students have been collecting new toys to donate to those in need. In addition to that, many classrooms have also been collecting various other donations. In the second grade classroom, we partnered with Scholastic Book Clubs to participate in a pajama drive. Since 2009, classrooms nationwide have collected and donated over 600,000 pajamas to at-risk children through Pajama Program, and Scholastic Book Clubs has matched that number by donating nearly one million books.
