How Do You Fall in Love?

Have you ever watched two young people fall in love? Better yet, have you ever watched two young people fall in love whom your overriding thought when looking at the two of them is, "what do you see in him/her?" Or maybe your thought has been, "they are so young and have a lot to learn before they could ever think about getting married," and then you receive notice that they got engaged last night and the wedding is probably going to be within the next six months. We have probably all witnessed a young couple fall in love way too fast and then get married way too fast (maybe that couple is you and your spouse).

Have you ever stopped, taken a step back, and slapped yourself for thinking that?!

Love is funny like that isn't it? It sneaks up, starts strong, makes one do crazy things at which any rational person would cringe, it surprises and fills lives with joy, and we (the sane ones) sit back from a distance and look with judgment because we have been hardened by the world. Now, you might think I am advocating for irrationality when it comes to getting married, and you might be right, but you would be missing the point (by the way I don't advocate for that, marriage should be discerned just as any vocational commitment should).

However, look at the way people fell in love with Jesus. It was immediate for so many. Today it is the very first disciples who left everything and followed him, who changed their name, Simon, (without getting a "prenup"), who didn't even ask where they would be staying beyond that very night, who could not help but tell others about this person with whom they have fallen in love, with whom they wanted to spend all their time. As we move toward Lent and Easter we will hear of others who loved him so much they pushed through crowds, climbed trees, sold all their stuff, ripped off roofs, risked being stoned, and more after simply hearing about him. Can you imagine? They were crazy... right... nobody in their right mind should do such things for another person, let alone a feeling! Or should we?

Now imagine this, you are on your way somewhere, you pass by a man, your eyes meet and time... stops. He looks at you like no other person ever has... like no other person ever could. In his gaze you see... everything, you understand... everything. He looks at you and sees who you truly are and he loves you in spite of that truth. The most gentle eyes you have ever seen captivate you and stir in you a fire that cannot be contained. You cannot help but reach out and touch his face... the face of God who created everything, who created you, and knows you, who wants simply to give you everything, be with you, and love you. You lose sight of what it was you were doing.
