A LITTLE BIT OF DOWN TIME: It's been a quiet week at Saint Anthony (to borrow a phrase from the radio). The county fair is a memory, and our festival preparation isn't yet in high gear. The School Future Committee is meeting (see below), and we're readying the financial report for the year that ended June 30. But even as festival tickets slowly arrive, country store prizes accumulate in the rectory dining room, and numbers from bank statements get reconciled and posted to our ledger, life for once is at a slower pace.

The Church year is also moving at a slower pace. We call it Ordinary Time. It's a time when we don't celebrate any of the great mysteries of the Lord's life; we simply absorb His teaching as it's given to us in St. Mark's Gospel. Last week we heard about the cold reception that Jesus received in Nazareth when He taught in the synagogue. This week it's about Jesus' preaching project in the nearby villages. There are too many places that need to experience the Kingdom, and so Jesus summons the Twelve and sends them out two by two. They are to have Jesus' own authority over unclean spirits and sicknesses. They are to take nothing for the journey. There isn't time to pack their bags; they are simply to trust God for their needs.

Saint Mark tells us that in the villages where the Twelve preached, people were more ready to receive the message than was Nazareth. He tells us that the apostles expelled <u>many</u> demons and cured <u>many</u> sick people; compare this to the situation at Nazareth, where Jesus healed only a few because so many lacked faith. Unfortunately the apostles' preaching mission caught the attention of King Herod, and he didn't like it. I suppose anything he didn't control was suspect in his eyes. To help us recall what kind of person King Herod was, Mark then backs up and tells the whole depressing story of what happened to John the Baptist, and how he was unjustly put to death. Jesus realizes that the Twelve need some time away from this tense situation, and so He tells them to "come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while." A great crowd follows, which leads to Jesus feeding five thousand of them.

The first lesson from this Gospel is that with the power of Jesus, ordinary people were able to accomplish extraordinary things. Now I don't demand that any of us expel a demon or perform a miracle. But with the power of Jesus, we become able to give extraordinary witness to people. We don't convert anyone by dumping Scripture verses on them, or by pounding them over the head with our *Catechism of the Catholic Church*. We convert people by our charity, our generosity, our willingness to listen and our willingness to forgive. Possibly the greatest thing that has been done recently for the conversion of the United States is the forgiveness that the congregation in Charleston, SC showed when nine of its members were murdered.

The second lesson is that King Herod is alive and well and living not far from here. If we witness to the Gospel, we will stir up opposition, maybe even the opposition of powerful people. We may have to pay a price for the Lord. But let's continue to be confident in Him, and confident in sharing the gifts He has given us.

COMMITTEE FOR THE SCHOOL'S FUTURE met last Wednesday evening with Mr. Christopher Knight, the diocesan superintendent of Catholic schools. He asked each person sitting around the table what their hopes were for Saint Anthony School, and what had to be done better. The main focus was on improving teachers' pay, with additional talk about improving internal and external communication in the school. Improved teachers' pay will lead to reduced turnover in the upper grades, which in turn will improve the quality of our instruction, and free Mrs. Schimmoeller from having to "reinvent the wheel" every year as she brings new faculty members on board. The Diocesan Schools Office has resource persons and programs to help us in both these areas.
