ONE MAN, ONE WOMAN: The Supreme Court may have let the genie out of the bottle when it made its ruling on same-sex marriage. Other qualities of marriage that people have always considered essential may now be up for grabs. There already is a lawsuit against the state of Montana by five people who claim that they have the right to all be married to one another. One of the arguments is "There's polygamy in the Bible, and so that must mean that it's allowed."

We have to admit up front that some of our ancestors in the faith had more than one wife, including Abraham, Jacob, King David, and King Solomon. The best that we can make of all this is that when God chose people, He didn't choose saints. He chose primitive tribesmen with a rough, unformed idea of what marriage meant. As time went on, polygamy became limited to rich men; most of the kings practiced polygamy. Only gradually did the practice take hold of one man marrying only one woman. Isaac, the son of Abraham, was married only to Rebecca. Aaron had only one wife, and it seems that Moses was married only to one woman (although scholars aren't sure, because of one ambiguous passage). The prophets who mentioned their wives seem to have been married to only one woman. (Did you know that Jeremiah remained unmarried in order to dedicate himself full-time to announcing the word of the Lord?) By the time the Books of Maccabees were written (150 BC or so), the writer makes it very clear that polygamy was a pagan practice that he found disgusting.

The early history writers who mentioned the plural wives of Abraham, Jacob, David and Solomon also make it clear that polygamy resulted in jealousy, factions in the family, violent behavior and all kinds of uproar. Sarah became very angry when she saw her son Isaac playing with Abraham's other son, and had them both driven out into the desert. Jacob favored Joseph because he was the son of the wife that Jacob loved most, and the other brothers sold him into slavery. David's sons conspired against one another over succession to the kingship. And some of the behavior was much worse than that.

On the other hand, we find beautiful stories of the love of one man for one woman in the books of Ruth and Tobit. In my opinion, the Song of Songs is best understood as a poem about the love of one man for one woman. So what do we find in the Old Testament? We see that polygamy was the practice of many of the primitive tribesmen whom God chose, but over the course of centuries, this practice slowly was discarded. We also are given angry, and even violent examples of the family discord that came from polygamy. We find that by the time of Jesus, the Jews despised this practice. And we find other Old Testament histories and poems that show how beautiful the love of one man for one woman can be in God's plan.

What do we find in the New Testament? By New Testament times, polygamy seems to have become a nonissue. The Church went out into the Greek and Roman world where polygamy was not practiced. (The Greeks and Romans had plenty of other problems, but not that one.) In Saint Paul's letters to the Colossians and Ephesians, he uses the love of husband and wife as a human example of Christ's love for the Church: a faithful and perpetual love, and a love that becomes fruitful in the waters of baptism. And the Book of Revelation ends with a wedding banquet: the wedding banquet of Christ the Bridegroom with His bride, the Church. The Bible may give us stories about some of our ancestors in faith going "off the rails," but from beginning to end the Bible is the story of God's faithfulness to us, and how it is possible to understand a little something of God's love by considering the love of one man for one woman.

ONE WEEK TO GO: It's hard to believe that the festival will be here in one week. A hopeful sign is a partially blacktopped West Sycamore Street (as of Tuesday afternoon). Maybe the work on DeBlanche isn't far behind! Next week, be sure to make our guests welcome, keep smiling, help one another even if it isn't in your job description, and pray for happy crowds and pleasant weather.
