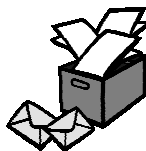

## A Note from Fr. Tom

**COMPLIMENTS:** Bishop Thomas had compliments for everyone after last Saturday's celebration. He talked about how beautiful our church is, how well maintained our grounds are, how well the servers and choir were trained, how interesting the exhibits in the school were, and how delicious the dinner was. I would like to pass these compliments on to all persons who were involved. I would also like to specially thank our principal, Mrs. Jan Schimmoeller, who coordinated all these aspects of our centennial Mass and dinner.

**WELCOME, FR. BROWN:** Father Harold Brown, CPPS, retired pastor of St. John in Glandorf will preach at all Masses this weekend. His topic will be Marriage Encounter, a program for married couples that endeavors to improve communication in the home and to turn a good marriage into a great marriage. I'm sure his message will be important for almost all of us.

**BIRTHDAY:** Thanks to everyone, young and young at heart, who helped me celebrate my birthday. In the evening I found out that I have to share my birthday with Vladimir Putin, which I am not happy about. I am writing our Congressman to ask what the Government can do about that.

**JESUS AND THE RICH MAN:** There is a very famous painting by Caravaggio of Jesus stepping into the tax collector's office to call Saint Matthew to be a disciple. The tax collector's office is dark with the darkness of sin. With Jesus' entry, the light shines into the darkness. Matthew seems to be asking, "You want me?" Some of Matthew's associates seem to be saying, "You want him? Jesus, You've got to be kidding!" And another tax collector's reaction is to hug the money on the table, as if he were a quarterback protecting the football. He knows what you have to give up to follow Jesus, and he wants no part of it.

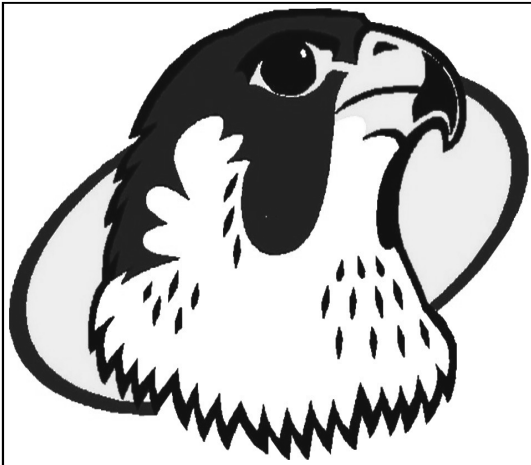
Matthew said "yes" to Jesus; the rich man in today's Gospel says "yes" to his money. For a disciple, money is just a tool to bring people to the Kingdom. You use it for people in need and for the sharing of the Gospel message, and you use it unsparingly. For some other people, life is about having money and control over others; Jesus is a leisure-time activity that you can take or leave as you wish.

In the end, what happens? We come to a Kingdom where we can't enter unless we let go of everything, so that our hearts accept God fully. Have you and I been practicing at letting go? Peter doesn't understand this. He thinks that the rich became rich because they are God's special pals, and the poor became poor because God is punishing them for something. In the disciples' view, the rich have the inside track when it comes to getting into heaven. If it's hard for a rich man to enter the Kingdom, what chance do ordinary guys like the disciples have? Jesus tells them that heaven is pure gift. Human beings can't earn their way in; with our limited vision we can't tell who is out and who is in. "For human beings it is impossible, but not for God. All things are possible for God."

**HOG ROAST FOR CHARITY:** The Knights of Columbus annual hog roast is next Saturday, October 17 after the 4:30 Mass. This year all proceeds will be for charity. The Knights have committed \$200.00 to the Rosary Guild, the group of mostly young people who make rosaries for the foreign missions. Last year they shipped 500 rosaries to missionaries in Nigeria and India. The balance will go to a fund to help refugees from Iraq and Syria. The Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus has committed \$4.5 million to provide food and other necessities to people who are fleeing their homes with nothing but the clothes on their backs. Many of these people are our brother and sister Catholics who are threatened with the most serious persecution. Local Catholic bishops, who in some cases are refugees also, will oversee the distribution.

By the way, this is one more good reason to join the Knights of Columbus. The Knights have had a history of helping persecuted Catholics, going all the way back to people in Mexico who were suffering for their faith in the 1920s. It's a faith commitment that more men should be part of.

## About Our Faculty

Some of the reasons we received for withdrawing students last spring were because of faculty turn-over. We not only have a difficult time keeping good teachers, but it is just as difficult to hire good teachers. Salary is the issue. I have been trying to get a salary scale adopted for 2 years. For the last few years, we have gotten very few applicants and then when they find out the salary, many drop out of the interview process leaving us with candidates that aren't as strong. Our starting salary is \$22,500. This past spring I interviewed a young man with a wife and 2 children. He had two years experience. When I offered him the position, he turned it down. The salary I was given to offer him was \$23,467 for 2 years experience. Poverty level is \$24,250. We have a teacher here with 31 years experience. She could go to a public school, claim 0 years experience and still get a \$1,000+ raise. I was allowed to offer a little more money to fill our open positions with more good teachers with experience this summer. This year's staff is stellar, but they are way under paid. We can't continue to have good academics if we don't have continuity in our teaching staff. Any administrator will tell you that. The diocese has put together a 3 year plan to bring our teachers up to about 80% of a public school teachers pay. I hope you will support the plan when it is presented to you. Sincerely,

## About the Math Rumors

I recently sat down with Mr. Verhoff, Mr. Best and Brian Schroeder to try to get to the bottom of these rumors. They were all reassuring. What you need to understand is that a Catholic School cannot be compared to a public school. We are different by design. We are not held accountable in the same ways. We do teach the same standards but the emphasis is different. It is an adjustment to switch schools so if there are struggles, many are because of that. We give second chances and extra help when we can and work to help our students be successful. We will continue to keep the lines of communication open between the 2 schools so our students continue to be as well prepared as they have always been. Our scores from our NCEA MAP Testing are as good as many Diocesan Catholic Schools and better than some. We always strive for improvement. On a side note: of the 8 sixth graders that left St. Anthony, the parents of 6 of those students were confident enough in our math program to enroll their child in Pre-Algebra as 7th graders.
