A Note from Fr. Tom

THE GOOD SAMARITAN: Jesus' parables are spiritual dynamite, including this one. We might think that Jesus is telling us that sometimes you've got to go out of your way for people in trouble, but He is really demanding a lot more. The man in the ditch looked horrible. He was bleeding and dirty. Most of his clothes had been stolen along with his money. Evening was coming and it would be cold in the desert. He could die out there. He didn't need a handout; he needed everything. People who have no one to turn to are often not very appealing people. If we are part of Jesus' Kingdom, we don't define "neighbor" as "someone who makes me feel comfortable.

The man bleeding in the ditch has to accept help from a Samaritan. Nowadays, the word "Samaritan" has a positive sound to it. There is even a charity sponsored by Rev. Franklin Graham (Billy's son) called "Samaritan's Purse." But in Jesus' day, Jews hated Samaritans, and Samaritans returned the favor. Samaritans had pagan blood in them. Their religion was suspect. They had their own temple, and never went to Jerusalem. The man in the ditch might have thought, "Oh no, do I have to let this filthy person touch me? Do I have to be indebted to this half-breed?" The challenge to you and me is that in the Kingdom, we have to accept help from whomever God sends our way.

And the Samaritan didn't just make a nice donation. He paid for the man's care, and promised that whatever the man's care cost, he would foot the bill. What Jesus is asking for is not just a nice gesture, but boundless generosity. Can you and I say "yes" to that?

FORTNIGHT FOR FREEDOM: The Fortnight for Freedom has come and gone, and I didn't even notice it. There probably was an e-mail from the Diocese. Maybe it arrived on a day when I was wildly discarding e-mails, even the important ones. The Fortnight began on the feast of Sts. John Fisher and Thomas More, and continued until the Fourth of July. In other years we had Rosaries after weekday Masses, and some special petitions recommended by the Diocese, but this year I totally neglected it.

The Fortnight is important because it keeps the whole issue of religious freedom before our eyes, and asks God to strengthen our witness and to correct the direction our country is taking. There are more and more voices calling for religion to be restricted to the four walls of the church, and to have no influence in public affairs. The best-known instance is probably the court case that would order the Little Sisters of the Poor to provide abortifacients in their health care coverage for employees.

Now I see that the Iowa Civil Rights Commission is ordering that no public facility ever allow speech that is offensive to LGBT people. Well, I'm against that too, but their definition of "offensive" includes our Catholic teaching on the nature of Christian marriage, even when it is presented in a positive, non-threatening way. In the other 49 states, a minister can teach anything he or she wishes from the pulpit, but not in Iowa. The Iowa Civil Rights Commission claims that it is a criminal offense to give that teaching in a church service that is open to the public. Fines and mandatory re-education can be the result. (Tell me: have you ever heard of anyone holding a church service that is <u>not</u> open to the public?)

We aren't persecuted like Christians in Iraq; we don't even face the threats that US Catholics once faced from the Klan and the American Protective Association. But threats are growing. We need prayer for our public officials to uphold freedom of speech for everyone, and for religious leaders to take courageous stands both in church and in civic activities. Saint Thomas More stood up to a tyrannical king; we will need to act as citizens of "the home of the brave" if this is to remain "the land of the free."
