

LIVES MATTER: When I was very young and growing up in Toledo, I was taught to be careful around black people. Later on I found out that they were taught to be careful around white people. We were taught to lock our doors and watch our money. They were taught to always follow orders and to never act superior. Since those days, race relations have had their ups and downs. Right now we are in a "down" period – probably the farthest "down" we've been since President Obama was elected. People are trying to find a way to come together and achieve some mutual understanding, but there are also voices of hate among whites and blacks both. I listened to a panel discussion on Fox News with about twenty people, both black and white, representing middle-of-the-road views and extreme views. Some sensible people spoke whose words were a challenge to white and black people alike. Others on the panel spoke messages full of hate.

I'm not sure what people in this parish think of President George W. Bush, but I thought he said something very wise at the public funeral for the five slain officers. He said, "Argument turns too easily into animosity. Disagreement escalates too quickly into de-humanization. Too often, we judge other groups by their worst examples, while judging ourselves by our best intentions. And this has strained our bonds of understanding and common purpose."

So how do we get to a state where all lives matter – black lives, Muslim lives, Putnam County lives?

- First, admit our own failings. We've turned a blind eye to minorities and their difficulties too long.
- Second, don't judge an entire group by the worst examples among their ranks. My experience in the central city was that black people want the same things we do: that they, their elders, and their children be treated with dignity; that their children have the education they need for a secure, happy future; and that their property be secure. Black people shouldn't be judged by the criminal element among them, or by some of their self-proclaimed "leaders" with radical messages.
- Third, teach your children well. Teach them to respect all people, and to speak of them as is fitting for God's children. Also show them what Christian marriage looks like: a man and a woman in a loving, perpetual, faithful commitment. Too often our problems today stem from kids having to raise themselves because the parents are too occupied with some private pursuit like money or sports. Or the parents are dealing with an addiction, and they have no energy left to deal with kids. Kids who raise themselves are prone to apathy, anger, and finding violent ways to cope. Many kids of this parish will eventually leave Putnam County. If they have the right ideals about marriage, they and their future spouses may be able to positively influence someone who grew up with the wrong ideals, or with no ideals at all.
- Fourth, pray. President Obama, whom I often disagree with, quoted the prophet Ezekiel and said that we need to ask God to take away our hearts of stone and give us hearts of flesh. Pray for families, pray for our country, pray for its leaders and for those who want to become leaders. Prayer will teach us all how to be on God's side, and He will give all of us the courage to change so that all lives matter.
