BACK TO SCHOOL: I spent the week in Wheeling WV at a seminar sponsored by Franciscan University on priesthood in the New Testament. So I'm writing my July 16 column on July 5-6 because I don't know if I will have time to write while I am away. Since my crystal ball is out of order, I don't know what's going to happen in the parish from July 10 to 14, and so I can't comment on it. If there is space next week, I'll fill you in on what happened in Wheeling. So I'll just write something on the July 16 Gospel, and then turn my space over to others.

HE TAUGHT THEM IN PARABLES: Jesus was a master storyteller. Some people rank the parable of the Prodigal Son as one of the greatest short stories of all time. But Jesus didn't write stories in order to earn a Pulitzer Prize or polish up his résumé. He told stories in order to give people a memorable insight into God's Kingdom.

All Jesus' stories are scenes from everyday life. There are stories about farming (like today's Gospel), about commercial fishing (what the apostles and many others like them did on the Sea of Galilee), about people looking for lost sheep or coins, about fathers who have trouble with their sons, and about women kneading dough and making bread. Usually the stories are set among working people, although occasionally Jesus gives us a peek into the homes of the rich. Sometimes Jesus acted out a parable, for example when He drove the moneychangers out of the Temple, or when He washed the disciples' feet.

So what is a parable? It's a short story, lifted from people's everyday experience, which challenges us to accept some aspect of the Kingdom of God. Some of the parables aren't completely clear. Jesus does that to force you and me to ask how we fit into the Kingdom – or what we have to change to make ourselves fit. Sometimes there is a surprise at the end of the story. It makes you say, "Aha! This isn't just a human event; God is at work here!"

Today's Gospel is a perfect example. When the farmer plants seeds, everything imaginable goes wrong. Birds eat the seeds. Some of it falls on the road (pretty unlikely today). Some of it falls among thorn bushes (no Roundup back then). Some seed sprouts in shallow, thin topsoil and withers (they were on the edge of the desert, not Northwest Ohio). But at the end, even though the farmer's technique is primitive and his soil is poor, some of the seed yields 30-, 60- or even 100-fold.

Now even with all of our scientific advances, we still know that in the end, the harvest is in God's hands. And so is the Kingdom. We cook for funerals, we go to adult classes, we invite people for RCIA, we volunteer in the school and CCD, we minister at Mass, we help with YES, but our human efforts can't create success for the Kingdom. Sometimes things go nowhere; sometimes things fall off the rails totally. But sometimes, somebody catches on to the message of God's love; sometimes somebody is moved to forgive an old quarrel; sometimes somebody gets a profound experience of Jesus' real presence at Mass. That means that God was at work in our human efforts. I think that in today's parable, Jesus is challenging us not to give up when things go wrong, but to look for the ways in which God is at work.
