**THE BIG WEEKEND:** In one sense, every weekend at St. Anthony is a big weekend, because we get to celebrate the Eucharist, Christ among us in the assembly of our fellow Catholics, Christ instructing us in His Word, and Christ offering His sacrifice for us, and allowing us to partake in it. No Sunday is "just" an Ordinary Time Sunday that is known by a forgettable number. Whether it's blazing hot in August, or a January wind is howling at us from the Yukon, it's still a little Easter. In another sense this is a really big weekend. We get to welcome lots of guests, many of whom join us for Mass. We hope that they feel treated royally. Ever since last year, we are able to both wine and dine them. Lots of entertainment and lots of socializing happen.

Of course it's an effort to send people home happy, rather than let them think we're taking them for granted. Thanks to everyone who has been working since many weeks ago, and who will continue right through the weekend, and until tomorrow, when we put everything away for Festival 2018.

**TRANSFIGURATION:** Today the Ordinary Time Sunday is pre-empted by the Feast of the Transfiguration. Why do we celebrate Jesus' transfiguration on August 6? The Eastern Church started this custom because on August 6, three churches were dedicated on the Mountain of Transfiguration in the Holy Land (perhaps in memory of the "three tents" that Peter offered to build.) Then in the 1400s, the Battle of Belgrade was fought between the Christian armies and the Turks. On August 6, the King of Hungary broke up the Turkish siege of Belgrade and won the battle. In thanksgiving, Pope Callistus III ordered the Western, Latin-speaking Church to celebrate this feast too. He also ordered every church to ring its bell at noon to remind people to be grateful for God's protection. (In heaven, I want to have a word with the Pope who ordered the bell to be rung at 6 a.m.!)

Why is this an important episode in the Gospel? First of all, it reveals that Jesus is not just another human teacher and healer. He shines with the radiance of heaven; He is the go-between between heaven and earth. He is God's beloved Son, and also true God. It is more important than anything to "hear Him." Second, Moses and Elijah appear with Him. He completes the teaching of Moses (the Law) and Elijah (the prophets.) Third, He is on the way to Jerusalem after many run-ins with Jewish authorities. He assures the Apostles that the way to Jerusalem, with all its dangers, is the only way to the glory of God. Maybe that is the lesson we need most, since we are exposed to dangers and evils of every sort along our way. Only by being faithful in the struggle, as Jesus was, do we come to the glory of Easter.
