"Why Do Catholics..."

Why do we believe the Catholic Church contains the fullness of faith? According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), we are united with Christ as the head of the Catholic Church and receive from Him the fullness of the means of salvation: correct & complete confession of faith, full sacramental life, and ordained ministry in apostolic succession (Acts 1, Rev 21, CCC 830). Jesus did not relinquish, but 'delegated' his authority to Peter as head of the church (Mt 16:18-19) by saying "on this rock I will build my church". Thus, the apostles alone, especially Peter, had the authority to speak on the church's behalf (Luke 10:16). This apostolic authority of direct succession from Christ to Peter is continued until today by the choosing, laying on of hands and anointing of each successive Pope.

CCD News ~ CCD registration will take place after the weekend Masses next Sunday, August 27th down in the church basement. A primary and God-given responsibility of you, the parent, is to provide for the spiritual formation of your child. We, the Church community, will help you with this duty through the Christian Formation program (CCD) by providing instruction in the Catholic Faith and prayer. The sacraments are very important because they give us God's grace. For your child to be able to receive the sacraments of Reconciliation, Holy Communion, and Confirmation, they must be enrolled the year before in CCD class. Regular attendance is necessary for your child to be properly prepared to receive the sacraments. If your child was not baptized here at St. Anthony's, we will need a copy of your child's baptismal record. If you are not yet registered with our parish and would like to have your children participate in CCD, please register as soon as possible. All children age Kindergarten through eighth grade are welcome to attend.

RITE FOR THE CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS will begin in our parish on Thursday, September 7 at 7 p.m. in the rectory. We will probably finish a little after 8. We will meet most Thursdays, except at holiday times. We have a textbook, and will occasionally supplement it with videos and other materials. Our typical session will begin and end with prayer. We will talk briefly about the Saint of the Week, and situate him or her within Church history. Sometimes he or she will be a well-known saint, and sometimes not, because saints come from a great many countries, and from every century. Our textbook presents Catholic teaching thoroughly. This is important because if people join the Church, they will need to know exactly what they are saying "yes" to. Right before Christmas and Easter, we will have spiritual preparation for the great feast rather than our normal class.

Several times during the year, we present the inquirers to the congregation at Sunday Mass, where we pray over them. It is important for the inquirers to get to know the community they are joining, and it is important for the community to get to know them. And it is crucial for the inquirers to become more familiar with Sunday Mass, the most important of Catholic celebrations.

We study together, we pray together, and we laugh together. I enjoy making new friends every time I go through it. For those who come to RCIA, there is no obligation to join the Catholic Church unless you feel ready to join. If someone comes to RCIA and decides not to become Catholic, I do not feel that we have wasted our time. We will have spent time praying and talking about Jesus Christ, and that can never be wasted time. So please come, and bring a friend.

CHARLOTTESVILLE: I have a folder in my desk labeled "World War II." It contains Dad's and Uncle Andy's overseas service records. For Uncle Andy, who was a medic in the 82nd Airborne, the last mission was the liberation of a death camp in Ludwigslust, Germany, a few days before the war in Europe ended. It was a small death camp. The division's mimeographed newsletter, distributed to the troops, says they "only" found 1000 bodies, some of them unburied, and stacked 4-5 feet high among the living prisoners. There were no gas chambers, no ovens. People were simply starved to death either because they were mentally ill or because they were political opponents of Hitler. The local population, POWs (among them German generals) and US troops attended a burial service at which the division chaplain spoke. His remarks were then repeated in German. He concluded, "Protestant, Catholic and Jewish prayers will be said by Chaplains Wood, Hannan and Wall... for these victims as we lay them to rest and commit them into the hands of our Heavenly Father in the hope that the world will not again be faced with such barbarity." Not everyone in our society has learned from the past, because the barbarity continues. As Bishop James Conley of Lincoln, Nebraska wrote, "Last weekend, white supremacists and neo-Nazis demonstrated in Charlottesville, Virginia. It was the largest such gathering in the United States in decades. They marched across the campus of the University of Virginia, carrying burning torches. They carried vile signs and chanted Nazi slogans. They engaged in violent fights with counter-protestors – in some cases punching or beating black onlookers. And one participant in the protest drove a speeding car through a crowd of people, injuring dozens, and killing one young woman...."Racism, white supremacy, and anti-Semitism are absolutely opposed to the truth of the Gospel. Racism is a dangerous evil: a lie sown by Satan, which seduces, and confuses, and ensnares. The Evil One seeks to divide us from one another and from the Lord, by sowing and exploiting prejudice, stereotypes, and fear. "Regrettably, the white supremacists were not the only ones sowing violence in Charlottesville. A small number of the counterprotestors, but not most of them, were violent, anarchist members of the "antifa" movement, who opposed their racist counterparts with violence. "We should all be disgusted by the racism of white supremacists. But hatred, expressed in anarchic violence, is the wrong response to injustice. Hatred begets hatred. Violence begets violence. Christians know that evil cannot overcome evil. Only grace can conquer evil. "This weekend, Archbishop Chaput (archbishop of Philadelphia) wrote that 'Charlottesville matters. It's a snapshot of our public unravelling into real hatreds brutally expressed; a collapse of restraint and mutual respect now taking place across the country... If we want a different kind of country in the future, we need to start today with a conversion in our own hearts, and an insistence on the same in others. That may sound simple. But the history of our nation and its tortured attitudes toward race proves exactly the opposite." Today, our call is to oppose the evil of racism, and the violence begotten by hatred, with the Gospel of Jesus Christ – with the love of the One who came to redeem every human heart. Jesus Christ can free the captives of racism, and Jesus Christ can heal racism's victims. Our job is to proclaim the truth, mercy, and freedom of life in Jesus Christ. We should not be naïve about how difficult that job really is. "It should be absolutely clear to us that without a massive spiritual renewal in our country, violence, hatred, and chaos will continue unabated. In fact, each one of us must guard our hearts, to ensure that Satan does not sow within us the lie of racism, or use our disgust for racism to make us hateful, vengeful, or violent. "The only Christian response to the evil that unfolded in Charlottesville is to redouble our prayers for our nation, and to redouble our efforts to build a civilization of love."
