LAST FRIDAY AT SCHOOL: Friday a week ago (October 6) was picture day at St. Anthony School. The photography team complimented our kids on their cooperativeness and politeness. They also let us know that such is not the case in every school they serve. It's always good to hear compliments from outsiders. Thank you, students, parents and teachers!

That same day we also had my birthday party at lunchtime. Again, I was struck by our students' politeness toward one another, and toward the moms who were serving lunch. I noticed what a good job the 6th-graders did who were helping the kindergarten kids. We had some of the kids' favorites: chicken strips with Italian-style breading, pasta with tomato sauce, lettuce salad, canned pears, and ice cream and cake. The teachers were pretty busy serving ice cream and cake, so it wasn't heavy-handed supervision on their part that made the students behave; it was the kids' own sense of how to act when eating with friends. I noticed that not that much food was wasted. Of course, the younger ones got a little over-excited once they had sugary desserts, but that was to be expected.

I am working my way through the cards that the kids made for me. All of them are memorable; some are highly memorable. And a seventh-grade boy said that it was so much fun that I should have a birthday every month. I told him that I planned to spend a whole year getting to be 71, and that I was no longer in the mood to rush things.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CATHOLICS AND PROTESTANTS: When I was in grade school, I believed we were supposed to stay far away from Protestants. I remember once sneaking a peek inside a Protestant church, and then mentioning it as a sin the next time I went to Confession. Then in the 1960s, we entered an era of dialogue. Both sides found that the others weren't as horrible as we thought they were, and that while we were definitely different, we could pray together and listen to one another's clergy preach. We found that Jesus' prayer for all His followers to be one was something we could work toward.

Maybe now we've swung a bit too far to the other side. Too many times I have heard, "It doesn't matter what church you belong to; we're all going to the same place anyway." When I have time, and when there's space in the bulletin, I'm going to write a few articles on what makes Catholic teaching different. For my source books I will use the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* and *This Is Our Faith* by Michael Pennock. The second book is our textbook for RCIA.

Let's begin with differing views of the Bible. Catholics and Protestants read the same New Testament; we acknowledge the same 27 books. The Catholic Old Testament is 7 books longer than the Protestant version. Besides the books that Protestants acknowledge, we acknowledge Wisdom, Sirach, Baruch, Judith, Tobit and the two books of Maccabees. We also read longer versions of Daniel and Esther, following the ancient Greek translation rather than the Hebrew. Sometimes hostile Protestant writers will say that the Catholic Church didn't make that list up until the Council of Trent in the 1500s. The truth is that in 382, Pope Damasus I made the list, and so did several regional councils of bishops in the fourth century. The Pope and the Councils said that they were listing the books that were handed down to them from earlier centuries. These lists basically agree with one another; they include the above Old Testament books, but don't always agree about the Letter to the Hebrews and the Book of Revelation, both in the New Testament. The Council of Trent basically said that "this is the tradition that was handed down to us and everyone should abide by it."

The next time I have time to write an article, I will write about Tradition, and why we don't follow both the Bible and Sacred Tradition.
