Treasures From Our Tradition

Long ago, the custom of sending some pieces of consecrated bread from the Lord's table began to take hold. Originally it was a way of assuring the sick and imprisoned of their bonds of faith and affection with the community from whom they were separated. By the third century, at least in Rome, we have evidence that the bishop would consign some of the sacred elements to presbyters or deacons.

There was a crisis in the unity of the church early on, called the quartodeciman controversy, since some people wanted to celebrate the Pasch on the fourteenth day (quartodecima) of the Jewish month Nissan, even if it didn't fall on a Sunday. The debate so fractured the church that the historian of the era, Eusebius, reported a new development to the pope. He wrote that the churches holding to the Lord's Day sent out consecrated bread to the disgruntled people of the quartodeciman pastors with whom they were quarreling. Meanwhile, bishops complained about people taking the Eucharist home. St. Cyprian told a cautionary tale of a sinful woman who tried to open the "casket" containing the consecrated bread in her home. She was deterred from receiving, he said, by flames erupting from the box. Clearly, he wanted people to think twice before bringing Communion home!

The Council of Nicaea defined the "old rule of the church" as allowing for reserving the eucharistic bread for the sake of the dying. The same council could foresee circumstances of persecution when people might have the Eucharist on hand to administer to one another in a time of great danger, literally, at the point of a sword. The first and enduring purpose for reserving the Eucharist is viaticum for the dying.

From the desk of the Administrator

These past few weeks have had me reflecting on the RCIA, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. Journey with me for a moment.

On the 12th and today the Diocese is celebrating the "Rite of Election and Call to Continuing Conversion". The former is for those preparing for Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion at the Easter Vigil. The latter is for baptized non-Catholics being received into the Church or Catholics completing their sacraments. Between the two groups on the two Sundays, some 500 individuals are doing something at the Easter Vigil. It's a reminder of our growing Church.

Earlier this week I was in Cherry Hill, NJ, for the annual spring meeting of Region III of the Federation of Diocesan Liturgical Commissions. It's always nice meeting with my Worship peers from PA and NJ. One of our discussion topics was a recent national survey on the RCIA. It's always amazing how people can look at the same text, yet implements it so differently. It will give me good impetus to work on RCIA at large in the Diocese.

I have often confessed that the RCIA is the weakest of the tools in my liturgical toolbox. I did have a course on it in the seminary. However, that's just not enough to capture the beauty that is this process of formation. I really DO need to do more study!

While these pieces of the RCIA held my attention, the entire process has been simmering on the back burner of my brain for some time now. The RCIA process is about accompanying an individual into the life of faith as a life-long disciple. Sometimes these folks make better Catholics as they have chosen the faith and learned it as an adult; there is nothing presumed.

What simmers is how do we use the RCIA process of accompanying individuals across the spectrum? This is what has made me change the marriage preparation process. Of course, I still need to work on the process for the couple's continued discipleship. This accompanying is why I ask Sr. Susanne to join us at the parish. Can we accompany our elderly as the Kingdom comes closer for them? What about parents and infants? What about First Communicants or Confirmation candidates and their parents? There is need for this.

The pot needs to simmer some more. What do you think will help to bring a final product to fruition? I'm open to ideas.

BOX

When we started this season of Lent, we began with imagery of dryness. Ashes and the hot and inhospitable desert both signify the absence of water, a necessary element of life. Our thirst for water is symbolic of our need for the salvation of Christ and the cross. Today's Gospel, the first of three associated with the Scrutinies of the RCIA process, introduces us to the Samaritan woman at the well. She was at the well to collect the water that she needed for the day. Her interaction with Jesus led her to desire the living water that only Christ can provide. Just as he led the Samaritan woman to his living water of eternal life, he leads us to desire it as well. We receive the living water at the baptismal font. Some receive it shortly after birth, while others are led to it later in life. The catechumens who will be baptized this Easter are being led to it right now. Even for those of us who have already been baptized, we must strive not to lose our desire for the living water of Christ. It is this water that leads us out of the dryness of the desert, into the oasis of faith that gives us eternal life!

Easter Flower Envelopes




