Treasures from our Tradition

By now, the first Christmas carols are heard in the home, but usually not yet in church. What is a "carol" anyway? Originally, a carol was any kind of communal song sung at a festival such as a harvest. By the thirteenth century or so, carols were associated with household celebrations. "Carol" comes from the Old French carula, meaning a circular dance. Carols weren't for church, since the language of liturgy was Latin and the carols were in the common language. Their characteristic sound comes from medieval chord patterns, and they often have strong refrains for everyone to sing. Even in the churches of the Reformation, carols didn't make it into church services until the 1870s or so, since there was a preference for psalms. Anglicans resisted popular carols; most of our beloved carols came via the Methodists, an offshoot of the Church of England. The Catholic Church generally didn't admit carols to liturgy either, but we didn't make laws against them.

We are told that the beloved carol "Silent Night" comes from Catholic Austria and a harried parish music director. Joseph Mohr, the priest of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf, had written the words in 1816, but offered them to his music director, Franz Gruber, when the church's organ broke. Mohr asked him to write a melody that could be played on guitar as a prelude to Mass. Gruber finished the tune just hours before midnight Mass in 1818. The people were shocked to hear a guitar in church, but were charmed by the sweet lullaby. The church was swept away by a flood in the 1990s and the village later relocated, but the townspeople have set up the "Silent Night Memorial Chapel" at the site. Today the carol is in print in some three hundred languages. How wonderful that the pipe organ broke on that night!

From the Desk of the Administrator

There are still On Mission questions. I offer two this week.

Why is there special consideration given for the Korean Community and seemingly not for other ethnic communities? Good question. Pittsburgh has been a great melting pot of peoples. Yet, it might hurt to hear that a lot of our ethnic heritage has literally died off; the melting pot has melted us together. However, for the Koreans, the Vietnamese, and even the Latinos, their immigration is current. Their needs need to be met, just as it was for our ancestors. In due time they too will melt into the pot. At the moment, they need our pastoral support.

I don't understand the location for hospitals and visits when that is always taken care of. Hospitals and nursing homes are all over. How can that be evaluated? Another good question. If you didn't know, currently non-trauma hospitals have no chaplains assigned. Further, sometimes we have no clue that a nursing home is in the area. The hospital in particular relies on the neighboring Priests to care for emergencies. Just about every Saturday when I'm available, I cover UPMC St. Margaret's emergencies for 24 hours. Sometimes there are no calls, and other times, well, I WISH they weren't calling so much! Because of the HIPPA laws, I seldom know that parishioners are in the hospital, unless someone calls to tell me. To have a full time chaplain assures that the folks receive pastoral care while in the hospital. I'm all for it!

In other news, the other week I received the most recent distribution from the *On Mission for the Church Alive!* Capital Campaign. It was good news. The dividend was **\$9,371.44**. In some analysis that was completed, I can say that of the 171 pledges: 37 (22%) of parishioners are done with their payments; 41 (24%) are ahead of schedule; 58 (34%) are on target; and 35 (20%) are behind. Of those behind, the campaign has never received anything from five [5] pledges and sixteen [16] (monthly and quarterly pledges) did not make any payment during the quarter reported. So: to those of you who are completed, thanks! To those of you still working on it, keep going! To those of you who are having difficulty, let me know how I might be able to help or if your financial situation has changed. May God bless us all for our returning to Him what He has entrusted to us!
