Follow-Up to "Forming Intentional Disciples"

Seven parishioners attended the presentation "Forming Intentional Disciples: The Path of Knowing and Following Jesus" held at St. Monica's Parish in West Wyoming on October 24th. Speaker Sherry Weddell talked about the importance of transmitting a living, personal Catholic faith to future generations by coming to know Jesus Christ, and following him as his disciples. She led participants through steps that will help Catholics enter more deeply into a personal relationship with God and discover the particular gifts and vocation that flow from that relationship for the sake of the Church and the world. Participants learned of effective ways of opening conversation about faith and belief with those God has placed in our lives. Parishioners who participated are planning to gather soon to discuss ways to implement these ideas here at Sacred Heart Parish.

Cardinal Peter Turkson on Laudato Si

Cardinal Turkson, president of the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace, opened a two-day conference on Tuesday at Santa Clara University in California, which centered on Silicon Valley's response to Pope Francis' latest encyclical.

Pope Francis encouraged American leadership at the political level to support an agreement to curtail climate change; and at a personal level, to develop those deep-rooted ecological virtues necessary for healing, protecting, and preserving our planet.

In encouraging this ecological conversion, the Pope is calling on America to honor its traditions and founding principles as well as its great stream of environmental reverence in American sensibility and thought, going back to the writings of Emerson, Thoreau, and Whitman. In the early 20th century, President Theodore Roosevelt even championed the idea of "conservation".

The Pope also asked about the wise use of technologies. What about the "tremendous power" they provide to "those with the knowledge and especially the economic resources to use them"? Thinking of constantly improved technologies to torture and kill on a massive scale, the Pope asks, "In whose hands does all this power lie and where will it eventually end up? Who considers the grave moral questions about technowarfare, human rights, and international humanitarian law?"

The underlying error is the naïve confidence that "goodness and truth automatically flow from technological and economic power as such." We lag in "development in human responsibility, values and conscience," so we advance in technical power without understanding its consequences and limitations. Ultimately this diminishes human autonomy: "Our freedom fades when it is handed over to the blind forces of the unconscious, of immediate needs, of self-interest, and of violence" (§105). In the succinct words of Honduran Cardinal Oscar Rodriguez Maradiaga, "Man finds himself to be a technology giant, but a child ethically." We have succumbed to the technological paradigm – an attitude of efficiency devoid of morality, with profit as the unquestioned goal and the uncritical use of power.



On Veteran's Day, Nov 11th we remember and honor all who gave their lives in service to our country that we might live in freedom and peace. At the same time, we pray for those currently serving in our Armed Forces, that God continue to bless and protect them in their efforts to preserve our heritage.


Sands Casino and Outlet Shopping Bus Trip
