"He called them, and immediately they left their boat and their father and followed him." Peter, Andrew, James, and John's lives would never be the same. They were going about

their usual business fishing on the Sea of Galilee when Jesus approached them and said, "Come after me." And that's just what they did. "At once they left their nets and followed him." Such a quick response to such a radical request! What compelled these men to leave their livelihood to follow the Lord? His promise to them was that he would make them "fishers of men." Perhaps they thought that promise sounded fabulous. But it seems more likely that it was Christ himself who drew the men. There must have been something utterly attractive about him, and completely trustworthy. Otherwise, it seems unbelievable that these men would have been so quick to respond to his call.

This compelling man is the same Christ who calls us. We hear his voice in a different way, of course, through the Church and through the Bible, through his Spirit in our hearts, but it is nonetheless the same Jesus of Nazareth who asks us to follow him. Have we allowed ourselves to be drawn by his voice? Are we open to a real encounter with the Lord who changes lives?

If our relationship with Jesus does not transform us, if it does

not change us into different, better people moment by moment and day by day, then chances are that we are not truly encountering him. He is too powerful to be inconsequential. It might take some courage and commitment to come into authentic contact with the Lord, but when we do, our lives will never be the same.

Catholics Donate \$7 Million-Natural Disaster Collections

In 2016, dioceses across the country participated in three emergency appeals, donating over \$7 million for support in response to natural disasters. They included the 2015-2016 Calamities Collection created after storms that hit the south and mid-west regions of our country, the Louisiana Floods Collection in response to the extraordinary flooding occurring in southern Louisiana, and the Hurricane Matthew Collection in the aftermath of the disastrous category 4 hurricane that struck large portions of the Southeastern coast of the United States and countries in the Caribbean, especially Haiti. These collections funded humanitarian efforts in the form of water, food, shelter, and medical care, as well as long-term recovery efforts for pastoral needs. Faithful in the Diocese of Scranton contributed nearly \$273,000 to these three special collections. "When disaster strikes, the Church responds with compassion, prayers and material support," said Bishop Joseph C. Bambera. "I am very grateful to everyone here in our Diocese who has been so generous in contributing to these special collections. You are bringing the comfort of Christ to our sisters and brothers during their most urgent time of need."

Diocese to Observe Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

"Reconciliation - The Love of Christ Compels Us" is the theme for the 2017 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which is observed annually in January. Pope Francis, in his 2013 Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium* (The Joy of the Gospel), cited the quote from 2 *Corinthians* 5:14-20: "The Love of Christ Compels Us". The biblical text emphasizes that reconciliation is a gift from God, and those who have been reconciled in Christ are called in turn to proclaim this reconciliation in word and deed. This year's Week of Prayer for Christian Unity coincides with the commemoration of the 500th anniversary year of the beginnings of the Lutheran Reformation. In that context, it provides an opportunity for us to reflect upon the concerns and divisions that have afflicted the unity of the Church, and encourages us to take steps toward reconciliation.

Ecumenical Celebration - The Diocese will host an Ecumenical Celebration of God's Word on Wednesday, January 25th at 12:10pm at the Cathedral. There will be no 12:10pm Mass that day. All are welcome to attend. In addition, Catholic Television will broadcast the service live. The Most Reverend Joseph C. Bambera will preside, and Rev. Dr. Robert Zanicky of First Presbyterian Church in Wilkes Barre will deliver the homily. Clergy and representatives from various Christian traditions and ecumenical agencies will be present. Liturgical music will be provided by Saint Clare/Saint Paul School.

Catholic Campaign for Human Development



The annual national collection for the CCHD will be taken up in parishes in the Diocese of Scranton next weekend, Jan 28-29. An estimated 43 million people live in poverty in the United States. The Catholic Campaign for Human Development

(CCHD) aims to help people break the grip of poverty and enhance their lives. The theme, "Working on the Margins," focuses our attention on the poor and vulnerable who can often be overlooked. This campaign is the primary source of funding for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' anti-poverty grants and education programs aimed at fostering a culture of life and hope in communities across the nation. The collection supports the work of groups that empower low-income people to participate in decisions that affect their lives and break the cycle of poverty. Many of the projects supported by CCHD embody the corporal works of mercy, including the protection of worker rights, expanding access to healthcare and reforming the criminal justice system. Twenty-five percent of funds collected through the CCHD remain in each diocese to support local human development projects. The CCHD continues to operate within the 2010 guidelines established by their governing bishops in The Review and Renewal of CCHD. This ensures that the recipients of these grants are providing programs and services which are in keeping with Catholic social and moral teaching. 
