Trinity Sunday



Jesus says in today's Gospel that "The Spirit of truth... will take from what is mine and declare it to you." We actually share in the blessed life of the Trinity through this spiritual declaration. God gives us the gift of his truth. The Blessed Trinity is the source of all truth, beauty, and goodness. Today's reading reminds us

that truth exists, that it comes from God, and that we can know it, hear it, and live according to it. "But when he comes, the Spirit of truth, he will guide you to all truth."

This is so important to remember in today's cultural climate where the very idea of truth is a touchy subject. Because there is so much focus on tolerance and not offending anyone, we tend to shy away from discussions about truth in any absolute sense. Instead, we hear much about "what's true for me" or "what's true for you." Too often we are confused about how to respect others' differing beliefs while still

maintaining our own. Instead of embracing the fact that there is real truth, for example in the truth that God became man and was born of Mary, we find it more popular to refer to "beliefs" and "traditions" and "practices," emphasizing that these things differ among peoples. Although such things differ among peoples, truth does not change. Either Jesus is God, or he isn't. Either his claims were true or they weren't. It's not a matter of personal opinion. The Holy Spirit helps to convince us of what is really right. We need not fear that this will lead us to be intolerant because it is this same Spirit within us that brings the fruits of love, peace, patience, kindness, and generosity.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being.
